As required by Executive Order 13256, President's Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities, I am enclosing the Department of Energy's (DOE) Fiscal Year 2008 Annual Performance Report on Executive Agency Actions to Assist Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

The Department provided \$31.5 million in support, an increase of \$14.5 million from FY 2007. The Department FY 2008 accomplishments included \$2.2 million to Morehouse College to enhance graduate and undergraduate programs in science and mathematics and \$1.9 million to Claflin College to increase the number of African-American scientists holding degrees in engineering and bioengineering disciplines. These programs were funded through a Congressional earmark to the National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) appropriation.

We look forward to working with you to ensure HBCUs receive the support necessary to provide high quality educational opportunities for the next generation of scientists and engineers.

# PART A: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF AWARDS TO HBCUs: FISCAL YEAR 2008

#### OVERVIEW

In Fiscal Year 2008, the Department of Energy (DOE) provided \$31.5 million to support programs with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

During Fiscal Year 2008, the Department supported a wide range of programs and activities:

- \$2.4 million to Allen University (Columbia, SC) for its curriculum development to enhance quantitative and problem solving skills and to strengthen basic math and science curriculum;
- \$2.2 million to Morehouse College (Atlanta, GA) to enhance graduate and undergraduate programs in science and mathematics;
- \$1.9 million to Claflin College (Orangeburg, SC) to increase the number of African-American scientists holding degrees in engineering and bioengineering disciplines;
- \$1.9 million to South Carolina State University (Orangeburg, SC) to train nuclear
  engineers and radio chemists and to do research on the safe and secure transport
  of radiological sources, spent fuel, tritium, nuclear fuel and hazardous materials.
- \$1.4 million to Central State University (Wilberforce, OH) to expand and enhance its student science/engineering scholarship and internship program and partner with Ohio State University to create a distance learning program in STEM disciplines;
- \$1.2 million to Denmark Technical College (Denmark, SC) for its curriculum development to include cyber security, nuclear and transportation technology;
- \$984,000 to Benedict College (Columbia, SC) to conduct an analysis of materials as barriers to radiation, feasibility of photocatalysis for decontamination and advance computing – mobile communications adaptation.
- \$984,000 to Voorhees College (Denmark, SC) to expand the computer science and mathematics faculty's knowledge and skills in cyber security and integrate cyber security workshops and activities into the universities annual technology week activities; and
- \$984,000 to Morris College (Sumter, SC) to recruit ten highly qualified Morris
  College students at the junior level to complete two years of specialized study and

training in the critical fields of nuclear safety and security and the management of nuclear materials;
