This subcommittee has had a long interest in working with departments and agencies in reducing the amount of improper payments they make and increasing the amount of overpayments collected through recovery auditing activities. To that end, we have reviewed the Department of Energy fiscal year 2007 Performance and Accountability Report which noted reported \$15 million in improper payments identified for recovery through the department's recovery audit program. Given the high value of recoveries identified, it seems that the department may not have made an accurate reporting of its improper payments under the Improper Payments Information Act. I have several questions about the department's work in this area:

- How did the department determine its estimated improper payments?
- How do you explain the low improper payment estimates reported in light of such a high amount of overpayments identified through recovery auditing?
- Did the recovery auditing program at the Department of Energy include all of its contract payments?

We write to support the Department of Energy's (DOE) recent announcement that it plans to issue the final round of loan guarantee solicitations later this summer. We urge DOE to comply with the announced schedule and to issue the solicitation in an expeditious manner. In addition, we urge DOE to give special consideration to alternative energy projects relying on domestic, secure energy sources that can help the U.S. meet its transportation fuel and electricity demands.

The prompt issuance of the next round of loan guarantee solicitations is essential for three reasons. First, under current law, DOE's authority to issue the loan guarantee solicitations is scheduled to expire in 2009. Second, it is widely acknowledged among policymakers, scientists, and industry representatives that, even if we started today, the U.S. is at least three to five years away from the development and deployment of large scale commercial sources of alternative energy that will seriously compete with traditional sources of fuel. The sooner DOE issues the loan guarantee solicitations and selects projects to support, the faster these new alternative energy technologies can be deployed to meet a significant portion of U.S. energy demand. Third, it will take a wide variety of alternative energy sources to meet U.S. energy demands that are currently being met through traditional sources of energy. Therefore, it is crucial that a range of potential applicants have the opportunity to respond to the upcoming scheduled round of solicitations, which will include advanced fossil energy projects.


We strongly recommend that DOE, through its upcoming Title XVI solicitation for loan guarantees, support the development of advanced fossil energy projects that utilize a wide variety of domestically available feedstocks such as coal. Industrial wastes that can co-process renewable resources such as non-food cellulosic materials and municipal sludge in the development of fuel should also be considered, as they could meet the emission level criteria specified in Section 1703(d) of the Energy Policy Act of 2005.


For example, the Department of Defense (DOD), through the Air Force, has announced its Assured Fuels Initiative, which is designed to establish an alternative domestic source of fuel for ground and, more importantly, aviation use. An alternative domestic source such as coal would be less vulnerable to supply disruptions associated with weather and geopolitical events; would be more affordable and predictably priced; would reduce emissions of criteria pollutants and greenhouse gases; and, could be used across multiple weapons systems and vehicles to reduce the number of fuel types and associated logistical problems. DOE loan guarantees should encourage the development of alternative domestic sources of such fuels for military use. The use of coal to liquids is a critical source of domestically available, secure transportation fuels.


Our Armed Services will require fuel for the foreseeable future, and the development and use of clean domestic alternative fuels will go a long way in not only helping to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the U.S., but also in reducing the military's dependence upon imported crude oil.



Thank you for your July 29, 2008, letter to Secretary Bodman regarding your support for NRG Energy Inc. and its application for a loan guarantee application from the Department of Energy (DOE) under Title XVII of the Energy Policy Act of 2005. The letter has been referred to me for reply.

On June 30, 2008, DOE announced three solicitations for a total of up to \$30.5 billion in federal loan guarantees for projects that employ advanced energy technologies that avoid, reduce or sequester air pollutants or greenhouse gas emissions. The three solicitations are in the areas of efficiency, renewable energy and electric transmission projects, nuclear power facilities and nuclear facilities for the "front end" of the nuclear fuel cycle.

In order to encourage submissions under the nuclear power facilities solicitation, the Department will be reviewing all received applications and evaluating them on a continuous basis as they are received. Based on a preliminary review and approval by the Department's Credit Review Board, the initial rankings will be published on or around October 29, 2008. This initial ranking will provide applicants information to assist in their making a self selection decision as to whether to proceed with the cost and effort of completing a full application. If an applicant decides to proceed with the application, the applicant must complete its submission by December 19, 2008.

During this period of time, the Department is not at liberty to discuss individual applications due to the sensitivity of the application process.


The successful deployment of the ACP will provide significant savings in energy consumption and reduced carbon emissions. In addition, the plant will enable the United States to continue to produce enriched uranium domestically. Equally important, the facility will create more than 3,000 direct and indirect jobs to a region that is in desperate need of an economic revival.

I write to bring to your attention a program that is important to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and thousands of autoworkers across my state. As you know, the Fiscal Year 2009 Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act appropriated funds for the expedited implementation of the Advanced Technology Vehicle Manufacturing Loan Program. This program was authorized last December by the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 and aims to assist manufacturers with the increased production of fuel efficient vehicles.

To ensure that this program is promptly implemented, the Continuing Resolution directs the Department of Energy to issue regulations necessary to administer this program within 60 days of enactment. Recently, Ford Motor Company announced plans to transform the Louisville Assembly Plant, which produces the Ford Explorer and the Mercury Mountaineer, to build the next generation of fuel efficient vehicles. On October 9, the Manager of the Louisville Assembly Plant wrote me to emphasize the importance of timely access to low cost capital for the transformation of the Louisville production facility.

I believe that it is vitally important that the Department of Energy comply with the 60-day rulemaking obligation in order to accelerate the retooling of existing American vehicle manufacturing facilities, such as the Louisville Assembly Plant, for the production of new fuel-efficient vehicles. This loan assistance will help protect the livelihood of thousands of Kentucky autoworkers and can also serve as an important stimulus to the American economy.

Expedited implementation of this loan program is essential. In light of the economic importance of this program to the Commonwealth, I ask that you give my request for swift action appropriate consideration.

As you are aware, Congress appropriated funding for the Advanced Technology Vehicles Manufacturing Incentive Program (ATVMIP) in the Fiscal Year 2009 Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act. The program, which was authorized in the Energy Independence and Security Act (EISA), will receive \$7.51 billion in funding to support up to \$25 billion in low-interest loans to U.S. automakers and parts suppliers.

As you know, the federal auto loan program was originally created as part of the *Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007* (Public Law 110-140). This program authorizes the Department of Energy to provide a total of \$25 billion in direct loans to help the automotive industry retool plants to produce fuel-efficient vehicles to comply with the higher Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards. As part of the *Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act, 2009* (Public Law 110-329), Congress provided \$7.5 billion to fully fund the loan subsidy for this initiative.

I join with many of my colleagues in strongly urging you to proceed with implementing this new program as quickly as possible so that we can have a viable auto manufacturing sector in the United States making the cars of the future. I am proud to represent more than 2,000 workers who are employed at the Belvidere, Illinois Chrysler assembly plant and the associated suppliers surrounding the plant. I also represent many other suppliers to the entire auto industry, such as fastener manufacturers.

However, I am concerned about the source of the new tooling that would be purchased under this program. I also represent many small tool & die makers and industrial mold builders. I have heard and seen too many anecdotal stories where the Big 3 automakers buy foreign made tools and molds priced even below the cost of the raw materials. These small firms are rapidly disappearing, particularly those that were reliant on the automotive industry, and are too cash-poor to challenge these practices through the filing of trade cases. The U.S. is losing this important and foundational aspect of the manufacturing sector of our economy.

It makes no sense for the federal government to bolster one set of manufacturers, based by the full faith and credit of the taxpayer, at the expense of other manufacturers. Why should the American taxpayer subsidize the purchase of foreign-made tooling as the Big 3 auto companies modernize their plants? The solution to this dilemma can be found in the original


legislation. The 2007 Energy Act also includes a provision that gives the Department of Energy the authority to impose "other criteria as may be established and published by the Secretary" to select eligible projects for this program. I strongly urge you to insure that the equipment purchased by the automakers are sourced and manufactured in the United States to the maximum extent practicable. This could be a win-win for all manufacturers throughout the United States.

A good model to follow is the U.S./foreign content policy of the Export-Import Bank of the United States (Ex-Im). For Ex-Im, each of the products itemized on an invoice that it supports must be produced or manufactured in the United States. The value of each product must be at least 51 percent of U.S. origin (as defined by labor, material, and components). Ex-Im will only issue a taxpayer-backed loan for the portion of a product that has at least 51 percent U.S. content. This provides a strong monetary incentive to have the highest level of U.S. content in a particular good supported by the U.S. government.

I recognize that in some rare cases, there may not be a U.S. source of a particular piece of tooling equipment sought by the auto industry. In those instances, I would support a waiver but only if appropriate U.S. industry association representatives are notified well in advance that there appears to be no U.S. source of a particular piece of equipment in order to give them sufficient time to find a potential U.S. supplier.

I hope that this can produce a positive result for everyone involved in car and truck manufacturing in America. I look forward to your timely response. Best wishes.



Dear Secretary Bodman:

The purpose of this correspondence is to address the Department of Energy's Advanced Technology Vehicles Manufacturing Loan Program (ATVMLP), as well as reiterate the discussion points recently shared with Deputy Secretary Jeff Kupfer. Given the importance and impact of this federal loan program, we are respectfully requesting that the Department of Energy consider a series of prioritization factors when promulgating the final ATVMLP rules.

While these factors may not be 100% all encompassing per se, we believe that they capture and are also consistent with the ATVMLP's legislative intent. To assist with the Department's quantification of these factors, we have offered some recommended benchmarks. These benchmarks will provide ancillary guidance for ATVMLP applicants and staff alike. Details regarding these factors and their related benchmarks are outlined below.

Economic & Job Impacts

- Facilities and/or locations that have received official ceased production or closure status should be given a higher funding preference.
- Automotive assembly plants and their supplier networks that represent a large share of the impacted community's economic and/or workforce base, should be given a higher funding preference.
- Retooling or expanding existing automotive assembly plants, thereby retaining and/or creating employment positions, should be given a higher funding preference.

Suggested Benchmarks: IMPLAN Economic Models, Unemployment Rates, Share of Employment & Income Statistics, WARN Filings, etc.

Production Capacities & Partnerships

- Assembly plants that are the oldest in age; thereby, reducing the carbon footprint associated with new production facilities, should be given a higher funding preference.
- Assembly plants that have demonstrated the highest productivity and performance levels should be given a higher funding preference.
- Assembly plants that offer production platform flexibility and the greatest "speed to market" approach by incorporating innovative retooling applications / technology should be given a higher funding preference.
- Assembly plants that adopt new fuel-efficient production platforms should be given a higher funding preference.

Suggested Benchmarks: Age of Production Facility(s), Recognized Industry Performance Metrics, Quality Awards, Proposed / Approved Production Plans, etc.

Partnerships

- Facilities and/or locations that have documented public / private automotive partnerships should be given a higher funding preference.

Suggested Benchmarks: Active / Engaged Communication, Formalized Task Forces, Proposed / Approved Plans, etc.

ATVMLP Disbursements

In addition to the aforementioned considerations, the Department should also take into account the following items when determining ATVMLP fund disbursement:

- Per company or location caps, ensuring geographic and/or market share representation.
- Disbursement flexibility, ensuring access to the approved lump sum versus incremental access.
- ATMLP implementation schedule.





I write to express my profound disappointment and anger over the Department of Energy's inability to implement a section of law that is of great importance to not only my constituents, but millions of Americans all across the country.

As you know, Congress recently passed and President Bush signed into law H.R. 2638, the Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act. This legislation appropriated \$7.5 billion to commence a program providing \$25 billion in loans to help American automakers. These loans would be used to re-tool factories so that they can produce the next generation vehicles and allow them to meet new fuel efficiency mandates required by the recently enacted energy bill. These loans were authorized by that same energy bill which was passed last year. It seems to me that the Department should have taken initial steps to prepare for the ultimate appropriating of the necessary funds by Congress so that the loans could reach the companies as quickly as possible and they could meet these new mandates designed to make our nation more energy independent.

The appropriating of these funds was a result of intense bipartisan negotiations involving legislators, the administration, and our automakers. A great amount of Congress' work in September was devoted to this issue because of the urgent need to quickly provide funding to our struggling domestic automakers. When these provisions were signed into law, I was quite hopeful that these loans would soon be in the hands of the automakers helping to stabilize their balance sheets and allow them to begin the work of putting more fuel efficient vehicles on the road.

It was my expectation that the Department of Energy would have been thrilled at this opportunity to help our nation's automakers produce more fuel-efficient cars and trucks and thus reduce our energy consumption. The efforts of your department to make these loans available stands in stark contrast to the administration's actions in recent weeks to very quickly take whatever action was necessary to provide assistance to financial services

companies on Wall Street. I anticipated that the Department of Energy would respond similarly to assist domestic automakers.

I read with great disappointment your recent comments that it would be 6-18 months and "well past this administration" before the Department of Energy was ready to issue these loans. I had hoped that the ongoing news of urgent financial challenges facing the domestic automakers would spur you into action. That does not seem to be the case.

In explaining the reason for the delay, you have cited the need to perform certain reviews including studies under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). It is my understanding that these loans would be used to re-tool existing factories to produce more environmentally-friendly vehicles, so I have doubts as to whether NEPA must come into play. However, if there are certain legislative steps that would help speed the delivery of these loans, I would urge you to contact me as quickly as possible with what those steps may be.

Congress is expected to reconvene following the election in early November. Items on the agenda will include actions to help stimulate our economy. This would also be an appropriate time to consider any legislation to assist expediting these loans.

I look forward to hearing from you promptly, and I look forward to receiving your assistance in helping get these loans into the automakers hands as quickly as possible.

The AREVA facility is vital to future U.S. enrichment capacity. As you know, U.S. demand for enrichment services is expected to increase substantially in future years. Studies show U.S. capacity is forecasted to expand as well, but a substantial shortfall is expected. The AREVA project is expected to account for almost 23 percent of planned U.S. future capacity and, because the plant is modular, it can easily be expanded to increase that percentage. Without the project, the U.S. will rely to an increasing degree on foreign imports. If the project succeeds it will reduce that reliance and contribute to the diversification of U.S. companies and facilities that make up the U.S. supply mix. Such diversification will enhance security of supply, increase price competition, and provide assurance that the U.S. will be a major participant in the development and use of AREVA's premier enrichment technology -- the proven ETC technology that is now used in several European facilities.

A guarantee for the project can be issued at reasonable financial risk to the federal government. The ETC technology has a proven track record of safety, reliability, and economic success, thus minimizing the project and regulatory risk associated with the facility. Moreover, AREVA is a company with widely regarded economic strength. In addition, a substantial amount of the plant's capacity has already been contracted to future customers. In short, the risk of an AREVA default on any guaranteed loan should be minimal.


It is appropriate that the Department's solicitation makes "creditworthiness of the project" the most important selection criterion for reviewing guarantee

applications. Given the importance of loan guarantees to the future of nuclear power, and the clear need for additional guarantee authority if the nuclear renaissance is to be realized, it is vital that the Department implement its current guarantee authority in the most prudent manner possible. A guarantee for the AREVA project would be consistent with that level of prudence.

Notwithstanding the low risk of default a guarantee is needed to assure adequate financing for the project and its ultimate success. The current credit crisis is likely to put in jeopardy many long-term nuclear projects. Even in better times, the ability of project sponsors to finance projects like this one in the United States is untested and may be subject to serious obstacles. We are concerned that, without a guarantee, credit will not be available for the project, or will be available on such burdensome terms that the project's success cannot be assured. Put simply, the fate of the project may well be tied to the fate of the guarantee AREVA is seeking.

The Department has an opportunity, through the issuance of a loan guarantee for the Bonneville County facility, to advance a project that is vital to the U.S. nuclear energy future. The AREVA project should proceed with minimal financial risk to the federal government and in a manner that will enhance the future of the loan guarantee program itself. Finally, we are concerned that if the guarantee is not issued, the project and the objectives intended for it will be seriously jeopardized. For these reasons, we support AREVA's guarantee application and urge the Department to act favorably on it. We look forward to your prompt reply.

Dear Secretary Bodman and Secretary Schafer:

I am concerned about recent suggestions that developed countries' biofuels policies might be responsible for the global increase in food prices. In the United States, the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) was first enacted in the Energy Policy Act of 2005. The RFS, combined with the phase out of MTBE as a blending component for gasoline, led to a rapid increase in production of ethanol and, to a lesser extent, biodiesel. In December 2007, Congress and the President enacted a new and higher RFS that will require 9 billion gallons of renewable fuels to be blended into our fuel supply in 2008.


It is imperative that Congress gain a more full understanding of any link between domestic and international food prices, and the Renewable Fuel Standard. I would like your departments to work together to answer the following questions:

- How has increased U.S. ethanol and biodiesel consumption affected domestic agriculture, and domestic food prices?
- Has increased ethanol and biodiesel consumption in the United States contributed to increased global prices for agricultural goods? And, if so, to what extent?
- How might increased biodiesel consumption, as required by EISA beginning in 2009, affect domestic and international food prices?
- How has increased ethanol and biodiesel consumption affected gasoline and diesel prices?
- What price levels for gasoline and diesel would be expected if biofuels were removed from the market, both in the short- and long-term?
- What affect are biofuels expected to have on gasoline and diesel markets as consumption increases to meet the targets laid out in EISA?

While I recognize that these are complex questions, Congress may be called upon to address related legislative proposals in the near future. I would appreciate receiving your analysis by May 30, 2008.

In preparation for your appearance before the Select Committee on May 22, 2008, please address the following pre-hearing questions to assist Committee Members in preparing for the hearing. The Select Committee requests your response to the following questions:

1. Does the Administration have authority to suspend the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) based on the market price of oil?
2. Does the Administration have authority to swap light, sweet crude oil out of the SPR for heavier, sour oil?
3. Does the Administration have authority to fill the SPR by acquiring a steady dollar value ("dollar-cost-averaging") rather than acquiring a steady volume of oil?
4. Should the size of the Northeast Home Heating Oil Reserve be expanded?
5. Should the United States establish a strategic reserve for any other type of refined petroleum product?
6. Over the past 10 years, how much has U.S. refining capacity increased or decreased in barrels of oil per day? Please provide an annual summary for each of the last ten years of the average U.S. refining capacity in barrels per day.
7. Section 804 of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (EISA) requires the Administrator of the Energy Information Administration (EIA) to review and analyze information of refinery outages to determine whether any such outage "may nationally or regionally affect the price or supply of any refined petroleum product" and submit a report to the Secretary "not less frequently than twice each year." Has the EIA performed such an analysis and submitted a report?
8. Is the Department aware of any coordinated refinery outages in the United States at any point over the past 15 years?
9. Section 432 of EISA requires federal agencies to designate energy managers to reduce energy use at each large building or facility six months after EISA enactment. What progress has the DOE made in implementing this provision and meeting Section 432's requirement that energy and water evaluations be carried out within eighteen months after the date of enactment?

10. Section 421 of EISA requires that the Department of Energy appoint a Director for the Office of Commercial High-Performance Green buildings. What progress has the Department made in carrying out this Section?
11. Section 421 (f)(1) of EISA requires that the Director of Commercial High-Performance Green Buildings formally recognize one or more groups as a high-performance green building partnership consortium within 90 days of enactment. What progress has DOE made in carrying out this section as required by law?

Please provide your answers by 10 a.m. on May 21, 2008 so that Committee Members may have a chance to review them prior to the hearing. I look forward to your appearance before the Committee. Dear Mr. President:

The severe energy price crisis facing millions of Americans compels strong presidential action to assist consumers and strengthen the economy. Two months ago, after initially opposing our proposal to suspend government purchases of high-priced oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR), you signed our bipartisan legislation into law.

But further action is needed to protect our economy. I call on you to use your authority as President to draw down a small portion of the oil held in the Strategic Petroleum Reserve in order to expand available supplies and help reduce the record prices that are helping push the economy toward recession.

Since your Administration took office, the price of oil has increased from less than \$30 per barrel to a recent record high of nearly \$150, and the price of gasoline has risen from \$1.47 per gallon to a record high of \$4.11 per gallon. The destabilizing impact of these price increases, driven both by market forces and by excessive speculation, have been devastating to tens of millions of Americans and businesses – and to our larger economy as a whole. These are the kinds of circumstances, in addition to national security conditions, in which utilization of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve is more than justified.

As you are aware, there is nothing new or untested about releasing oil from the Reserve or deferring purchases during times of economic instability. You have done it yourself – as have President Clinton and President George H.W. Bush:

- **1990-1991 Desert Shield/Storm Drawdown.** President George H.W. Bush withdrew oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve ahead of the first Gulf War on January 17, 1991. The Administration conducted a 4 million barrel test sale in August 1990 and a Presidentially-ordered drawdown of 17 million barrels in January 1991. According to the Energy Department, "The rapid decision to release crude oil from government-controlled stocks in the United States and other OECD countries helped calm the global oil market, and prices began to moderate. When the 1991 SPR drawdown was announced in conjunction

with Operation Desert Storm, the price of oil immediately dropped \$8 per barrel." [Emphasis added, White House 2003 assessment of SPR]


- **2000 Swap in the Face of Rising Prices.** In late 2000, President Bill Clinton authorized a swap of oil in which 30 million barrels were released from the SPR to address rising oil prices and alleviate the threat of a home heating oil crisis due to low inventories. The MIT expert testified: "The results were immediate, in spite of the fact that oil prices had not yet moved into the market – demonstrating the psychological impacts on the market when the U.S. signals its intention to act. . . By the end of the year, actual oil prices had dropped from \$30.94 to \$20.38 per barrel, a 34% decrease." [Emphasis added, Testimony of Melanie Kenderdine, Select Committee on Energy and Global Warming, 4/24/08]
- **2005 Hurricane Katrina, Drawdown.** Your Administration also offered 30 million gallons of SPR oil (only 11 million gallons were actually withdrawn), helping reduce crude prices by about \$5 a barrel. [Investor's Business Daily editorial, 3/8/08]

Releasing oil from the Reserve is a tool to manage our national and economic security, and when judiciously used will in no way jeopardize national security. The Reserve is currently 97 percent full – the highest level ever – with enough oil to meet our national security needs. We have more oil in the SPR than we did in 2006 (702 million barrels vs. 688 million in 2006) when you deferred deliveries stating: "Our Strategic Reserve is sufficiently large enough to guard against any major supply disruption over the next few months." The current inventory exceeds our International Energy Program commitment to maintain at least 90 days of oil stocks in reserve (when you include private and public stocks, as other countries do).

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, oil from SPR deployment can enter the market 13 days after a Presidential decision. Deploying a small portion of the resources in the SPR would provide much needed assistance to American consumers facing record prices and help our economy during a serious period of instability. I strongly urge you to use every available tool, including deployment of the SPR, to provide timely relief for American consumers and businesses.

Thank you for your consideration of this urgent request.





The Consolidated Appropriations bill for FY2008 included **\$2.57** billion in funding for the Low Income Housing and Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), including **\$586** million in contingency funds to be released at your discretion. We are writing to urge you to release the LIHEAP funds immediately. The high energy prices facing consumers and the severe weather of the past few weeks warrant this release.


This winter, the Energy Information Administration (EIA) estimates that households can expect to pay between **10 to 22** percent more for heating fuels than during the **2006-2007** winter, and many of these families are carrying energy debt from previous years. As such, states need additional funding immediately to reduce the energy burden on families, individuals with disabilities, and senior citizens to ensure their health and safety through the cold winter months.


Between FY2003 and FY2007 the number of households receiving LIHEAP assistance increased by **26** percent from **4.6** million to about **5.8** million or about **15.6** percent of the eligible population. During this same period, the federal appropriation increased by only **10** percent with the resulting average grant declining from **\$349** to **\$305**. Unfortunately, energy prices are not decreasing proportionally, but instead continue to rise. Home heating prices are projected by the EIA to reach almost **\$1,000** this year for the typical family, an increase of almost **80** percent higher than the average cost of home heating during the winter of **2001-02**. As a result, there has been a significant decrease in the program's purchasing power. According to the National Energy Assistance Directors Association, states are planning to reduce the number of households served by about **15** percent in the absence of additional federal and supplemental state funding. The result would be a decline in the number of households served from about **5.8** million in FY2007 to **4.9** million.

LIHEAP is vital to protecting the public health and safety of low-income families. According to the Children's Sentinel Nutrition Assessment Program (C-SNAP) out of Boston Medical Center, babies and toddlers who live in energy insecure households are more likely to suffer poor health, require hospitalization, manifest developmental problems, and lack adequate food. C-SNAP found that when families do not have access to sufficient energy, they may resort to unsafe heating methods and do not have the proper means to refrigerate or prepare food for their children. In addition, without a sufficient LIHEAP benefit, seniors living on fixed incomes often have to decide between buying life-saving prescriptions and paying utility bills. For individuals and households that may have to face these difficult choices, LIHEAP makes a real difference in their ability to cope with adverse circumstances.


We request that your Administration release the \$586 million in FY2008 LIHEAP contingency funds that were recently approved by Congress to help low-income seniors and families with their home energy expenses during a winter that has already seen a significant share of severe winter weather and cold conditions and promises only to get colder.

This coming winter the EIA forecasts prices in the Midwest for propane and heating oil will increase 21.8 percent and 33 percent, respectively.

I write you today to bring to your attention an important area of renewable energy research that was identified for funding in the Consolidated Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2008 (Omnibus). With additional research, solar power can eventually become a cost-effective, non-greenhouse gas emitting resource for generating hydrogen.

In the Statement of Managers that accompanied the Omnibus, Congress directed the Department to use funds from solar energy programs for the "demonstration of thermo-chemical processes in conjunction with high-temperature solar facilities for hydrogen production." I am hopeful that the Department will again choose to provide funding to the University of Nevada Las Vegas Research Foundation (UNLV), as the best qualified and most competent institution in this field, to continue its work on the Solar Thermochemical Hydrogen Generation Project.

Since 2003, UNLV has worked on an aggressive timeline to develop economically feasible approaches to solar thermochemical production of hydrogen, and has met a series of important milestones to this end. Recognizing the importance of UNLV's research, in its report to accompany the FY 2007 Energy and Water Appropriations bill, the Senate Appropriations Committee provided UNLV with \$4 million to continue work on solar thermochemical production of hydrogen. Considering the significant increases in funding for the Department's work on solar energy for FY 2008 over prior years, I am hopeful that you will provide at least the \$4 million that would have been provided for this project had the FY 2007 Energy and Water Appropriations bill been enacted.

I have enclosed for your information a document prepared by UNLV highlighting their efforts on DOE-sponsored solar hydrogen generation research. I appreciate your attention to this groundbreaking research. If I can answer any questions that you may have about this issue, please do not hesitate to contact me (or Chris Miller/Alex McDonough on my staff).

The Solar Hydrogen Generation Research (SHGR) project identifies and demonstrates high-efficiency, competitive-cost, solar-powered concepts for the production of hydrogen from water. Solar-powered, thermo-chemical water splitting produces hydrogen using only water, heat from the sun, and chemicals that are completely **re-cycled** so that only hydrogen and oxygen are produced and only water is consumed in the cycle.

UNLV has established an organization to manage and integrate its multi-partner renewable energy projects. Called the Office of Strategic Energy Programs (OSEP), its mission is to assist in the **seamless** execution of major solar, hydrogen, bio-fuels and photonics **R&D** projects involving UNLV and other academic and research institutions, DOE national laboratories, and industrial partners. OSEP is also **responsible** for planning and execution of UNLV's annual Renewable Energy Conference, featuring presentations and seminars from national experts on a variety of renewable topics, drawing participants from across the country.

Furthermore, UNLV organized its renewable energy research efforts with emphasis on the materials research component that has a primary focus on solar applications. There are many already existing activities in materials research at UNLV as well as on the many activities in solar technologies and applications.

UNLV's OSEP has developed an expertise to manage large projects such as the Solar Generation Research project that is also perfectly aligned with UNLV's overall renewable research concept. The new funding for SHGR will be integrated into UNLV's research and help save unnecessary costs such as consultant and management fees from outside **entities should** the project reside at UNLV. Also, the setup of **sub-contracts** through UNLV will make this a true UNLV project with outside entities as partners that weigh in their expertise.

We are writing to respectfully request that the President include funding for carrying out Insular Area energy feasibility studies under Section 252 of the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (EPACT; P.L. 109-58) in his Fiscal Year 2009 budget.


Section 252 of EPACT directs the Secretary of Energy to conduct feasibility studies of projects designed to address the energy challenges faced by the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of Palau. These studies are to be carried out upon request of an electric utility located in one of those insular areas, when that utility commits to covering ten percent of the study cost.

Multiple insular areas, including the U.S. Virgin Islands and Guam, have indicated an interest in applying for these grants in order to help reduce their dependence on imported fossil fuels. Unfortunately, money has yet to be budgeted for this program: delaying the transition of our insular areas from an economy entirely dependent on expensive imported fuels to one that maximizes the use of indigenous sources of energy, bringing down the cost of electricity and making all islands more self-sufficient and environmentally friendly.

Although the Section 252 feasibility grants are authorized at a modest \$500,000, we believe such money would make a considerable positive impact for our insular areas. We therefore respectfully ask that you include funding for these feasibility grants in the Fiscal Year 2009 budget for the Department of Energy.


An important part of the Energy Independence and Security Act, HR 6, are the provisions that authorize and direct the Department of Energy to undertake a broad, new advanced geothermal energy research program. These provisions were based upon legislation that had strong, bi-partisan support in both the House and Senate, were developed after hearings in the House and Senate Committees of jurisdiction, and were passed with large bi-partisan majorities.

The Congress also has appropriated in the Consolidated Appropriations bill \$20 million for the geothermal research program in FY 2008. It is our expectation that these funds will be spent to begin the immediate implementation of the new advanced research and for other geothermal programs that Congress has authorized and the President has signed into law.


Further, while we understand that the process for preparing the Administration's FY 2009 budget is well underway, we expect the Department to re-evaluate its budget request for the geothermal program in light of this new authorization. In addition to re-evaluating the FY 2009 request, we would urge the Department to consider reprogramming or requesting additional funds in FY 08 in order to implement the advanced geothermal research program that has just been authorized. The new law authorizes \$95 million annually to conduct a broad-ranging program of advanced technology development, and we urge the Department's to embark upon a program that embraces this new vision of geothermal energy's potential and to request funding that can support this level of effort.

According to reports by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the National Renewable Energy Laboratory geothermal resources have the potential to provide tens of thousands of megawatts of new renewable power and heat energy to meet our energy needs. We urge the Department to initiate a bold new geothermal program as authorized and directed by HR 6 to develop and deploy advanced technology across the spectrum of geothermal resources to achieve this potential.





We write to you to express our concern regarding the direction of the Department's program to promote cellulosic ethanol technology and production. Recent actions and statements, when taken together, suggest that the Department is focusing its cellulosic ethanol program on cellulosic sources in some regions of the nation to the exclusion of others. We are concerned that these decisions may have a deleterious effect on the formation of an efficient renewable fuels industry in the United States.

Our concerns were initiated when a recent statement by a senior Department official characterized the Department's stance on candidate feedstocks for ethanol production as follows:

"Of all the ways of making cellulosic ethanol, corn byproducts like husks show the greatest potential for a quick breakthrough, along with woody biomass from pulp and paper factories."

We were concerned that such a statement reveals a policy preference by the Department regarding the sources of cellulose for ethanol production upon which the Department's program will focus. Our concerns were heightened by the Department's January 29th press release naming the initial grant awards for cellulosic ethanol demonstration plants. These sources do not appear to include the very significant cellulosic ethanol potential of subtropical crops, such as sugar cane waste and fiber cane.


Our state has an operating cellulosic ethanol pilot plant that is producing ethanol from sugar cane waste. The company that owns and operates the pilot plant conducted "steel topping" ceremonies on January 25th at its self-funded demonstration plant that will produce 1.5 million barrels per year of cellulosic ethanol from sugar cane waste and fiber energy cane. This plant is expected to begin operations this summer. Unless there is similar progress being made in other locales around the nation, we must conclude that the senior Department official's comments, and the grant awards made on January 29th, seem to overlook a significant source of cellulosic ethanol where a quick breakthrough may be very close at hand indeed.


Biomass production along the Gulf coast may reach or exceed 20 dry tons per acre. This suggests potential ethanol yields of up to 1800 gallons per acre or about four to five times more production, on a per-acre basis, than the typical yield of 400 gallons per acre found in the corn


and grain belt of the nation. We understand further that the Louisiana crops that can provide an abundance of cellulose for ethanol production require far fewer supplemental inputs per gallon, such as fertilizer, pesticides and irrigation, than corn and grain crops. Moreover, cellulosic ethanol production in the Gulf coast will yield this sustainable fuel in the very locale where the nation's transportation fuel refineries are located, leading to transportation efficiencies that will yield further fuel savings for the nation.

The nation must move aggressively to capture the energy value of all forms of biomass. Very shortly, Congress will begin making appropriations decisions' for the coming fiscal year. We respectfully request a full briefing by you or your designee before the end of February concerning exactly what actions the Department is making to promote and advance cellulosic ethanol production from sugar cane waste, fiber cane, and other such crops that thrive in the coastal regions around the Gulf of Mexico, including our state of Louisiana.

I respectfully request your attention to the fair and equal consideration of small businesses under the Department of Energy Federal Energy Management Program's Energy Savings Performance Contracts.

The Department of Energy, under the Federal Energy Management Program, is planning to award ten master indefinite delivery/quantity contracts (DE-RP36-06G096031) with a potential for approximately \$20 billion worth of projects over the life of the contract. I feel that limiting the number of contracts to only ten, and not specifying which of those contracts, if any, will be awarded to small businesses is not in spirit of small business contracting requirements under federal law.

To my understanding, the Energy Savings Performance Contracts (ESPC) program has been dominated by nine large companies who control and perform over 90 percent of all ESPC work for the federal government. Comparatively, small businesses perform over 25 percent of similar projects on the local and state level.

As the largest energy consumer in the United States, the federal government operates thousands of facilities that would benefit from the ESPC program, but by capping the contracts at ten, the rollout will be slower and the costs higher:

I am asking you to consider issuing additional IDIQ contracts for qualified small businesses. I hope that you will be able to intervene and ensure that there is a level playing field and an opportunity for small businesses to participate as prime contractors under the ESPC program. My concern is that small businesses will again be relegated to subcontracting roles, not meeting the spirit of the law.

Thank you in advance for your consideration of my request. I respectfully request a meeting with you to discuss this program in the near future and look forward to hearing from you regarding my concerns.




As you finalize your Fiscal Year 2009 budget, I am writing to urge you to make adequate investments in programs that help reduce our nation's dependence on foreign energy sources.

In your 2006 State of the Union address, you told the country that "America is addicted to oil" and promised "to make our dependence on Middle Eastern oil a thing of the past." Despite this pledge, your Fiscal Year 2008 budget proposal would have cut funding for energy efficiency and renewable energy programs by \$238 million. Fortunately, my colleagues and I rejected your proposal and increased funding for these important programs by \$248 million in the Omnibus Fiscal Year 2008 Appropriations Bill. These resources will ensure that additional U.S.-based research and development is conducted on promising energy technologies including solar, bio-fuels, geothermal, and energy efficient buildings.

I respectfully request your attention to the treatment of small businesses under the Department of Energy Federal Energy Management Program's Energy Savings Performance Contracts.

It is my understanding that you plan to award approximately ten master indefinite delivery/quantity contracts under the Request for Proposals (DE-RP36-06GO96031) published last year. I feel that limiting the number to only ten contracts and not specifying which of those contracts, if any, will be awarded to small businesses is not in the spirit of small business contracting requirements under federal law.

Thus far, the Energy Savings Performance Contracts (ESPC) program has been dominated by nine large companies who control and perform over 90 percent of all ESPC work for the federal government. Comparatively, small businesses perform over 25 percent of similar projects on the local and state level. It is clear that small businesses have the capability and capacity to handle complex energy projects such as those under the ESPC program.

There are thousands of federal facilities that would benefit from the ESPC program but by limiting the contracts to only ten companies the rollout will be slower and costs higher. I want you to consider issuing additional indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity contracts for qualified small businesses. I hope that you will be able to intervene and ensure that there is a level playing field and an opportunity for small businesses to participate as prime contractors under the ESPC program. I do not want small businesses relegated only to subcontracting roles as this does not meet the intended small business contracting requirements and is simply not good public policy.

Thank you in advance for your consideration of my request. I look forward to our continued work with you to achieve federal energy savings and increase fair contracting opportunities for our nation's small businesses.

I respectfully request your attention to the treatment of small businesses under the Department of Energy Federal Energy Management Program's Energy Savings Performance Contracts (ESPC). I hope that you will consider intervening to ensure that small businesses are given an opportunity to participate as prime contractors under the ESPC program.

I am writing specifically in reference to ESPC solicitation number DE-RE36-06GO96031. It is my understanding that the Department of Energy, under the Federal Energy Management Program, is planning to award ten master indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity contracts with the potential for approximately \$20 billion in projects over the life of the contracts. To date, the ESPC program has been dominated by nine large companies that control and perform over 90 percent of all ESPC program work for the federal government. I have concerns that by limiting the number to only ten contracts, and by not specifying if any of those contracts will be awarded to small businesses, the plan is inconsistent with the intent of small business contracting requirements under federal law.

The Department of Defense operates a program similar to the ESPC program, the National Energy Savings Performance Contract, solicitation number W912DY-06-R-0018. The Department of Defense's program has an explicit goal of including at least one small business as a prime contract awardee. I urge you to follow the lead of the Department of Defense and consider issuing additional indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity contracts for qualified small businesses so that they are not put at a competitive disadvantage as this new solicitation is awarded.

Thank you for your April 8, 2008, letter to Secretary of Energy Samuel W. Bodman expressing your support for lithium sulfur battery technology.

The Department of Energy's (DOE) Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy (EERE) conducts research and development on a variety of automotive technologies that can lead to dramatic improvements in our national security. In fiscal year 2008, EERE continues to fund high risk, breakthrough-oriented research that could lead to high power and high energy batteries for hybrid and electric vehicles. Specifically, EERE is currently funding 11 exploratory research projects (totalling \$3.0 million) focused on the development of metallic lithium batteries, such as lithium sulfur. As high power lithium ion batteries for conventional hybrids mature, a significantly larger effort and higher priority will be placed on searching for breakthrough technology in the area of high-energy batteries (such as lithium sulfur) for electric vehicles.

The Department shares your enthusiasm for the potential that this advanced battery technology has to reduce the Nation's dependence on imported oil. Our DOE portfolio balances near-term and long-term needs and continues to yield positive results within the Department's broad set of technology development programs.





We write you to support the Department of Energy (DOE) Heavy Truck Engine programs. We want to ensure that the increased funding provided through the fiscal year 2008 appropriations process for the program is spent on this important research and that the work involved in your current contracts is completed.

Since heavy-duty engines consume nearly 25 percent of the surface transportation fuel, Congress charged the DOE to lead an effort to develop advanced technologies for on-road diesel truck applications. Through the Office of Vehicle Technology's Heavy Truck Engine research programs, strong public-private partnerships between DOE, the national laboratories, and private industry have resulted in engines with new technologies that are more fuel efficient and environmentally cleaner than previous generations. This collaboration led to the attainment of the 2007 on-highway diesel engine emissions standards without sacrificing fuel efficiency.


It is imperative that we continue to improve fuel efficiency while achieving future mandated lower emissions levels for 2010 and beyond. Significant hurdles remain in order to achieve reduced fuel consumption, lower emissions, and enhance customer value. Funding is needed to support future research tasks that include exploring further engine efficiency improvements, recovering waste energy, and identifying viable technologies to support the "20 in 10" initiative. 





The Administration's FY2009 Department of Energy budget request contains a 27% reduction in funding for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy programs, much of which is funding for hydrogen initiatives. I am especially concerned with proposed cuts for Technology Validation and zeroing out of the Renewable Hydrogen program. These actions will significantly impede the development of hydrogen fuel cell vehicles, infrastructure, and fuels.

Continued commitment to renewable hydrogen is essential for ensuring that industry advances its work on fuel cells, hydrogen storage and vehicles. DOE states in the FY2009 budget that the critical path production goal for 2015 has been met via natural gas reforming. This conflicts with Congressional intent expressed in the Independence and Security Act of 2007 and Executive Order 13423 to develop diverse and sustainable energy supply from renewable sources. Along with storage and fuel cells, renewable hydrogen is one of three critical technology paths to long-term success.

The proposed reduction of nearly half of the Technology Validation Program's funding will hamper efforts to test technology related to durability, vehicle range, storage, and infrastructure. Additionally, DOE's proposal to combine TVP with the Vehicle Technologies Program means it will have to compete with plug-in hybrid and biofuel validation efforts. Both biofuel and plug-in hybrids are DOE priorities, further raising the likelihood that the hydrogen activities will receive only limited funds.


These proposals are slowing the development of hydrogen technologies, increasing the amount of time for potential commercial availability, and reducing the possibility for earlier market creation. This is especially concerning because vehicle

development already outpaces fuel and infrastructure work leaving the market unable to support vehicles on the road.

Hydrogen represents one of the long-term energy solutions America needs. However, we must be laying the foundation for fuel production and technology validation. Failure to take immediate action will have profound implications in the future.

I appreciate your attention to this issue and look forward to your response.



It is my understanding that the ESPC program has been dominated by nine large companies that control and perform over 90 percent of all ESPC work for the federal government. Comparatively, at the state and local levels, small businesses perform roughly 25 percent of similar projects. Thus, it is clear that small businesses have the ability and capacity to handle complex energy projects such as those under the ESPC program. This is further illustrated by the Department of Defense which, under a similar energy contract, expressly stated a goal to include at least one or more small businesses as prime contract awardees. If other agencies have the ability to provide similar energy contracting opportunities to small businesses, arguably the DoE can as well.

I urge the Department to consider issuing additional opportunities to ensure a more level playing field for qualified small businesses to contribute as prime contractors, both under the ESPC program as well as under other DoE programs. The inclusion of small businesses as prime contractors would increase competition and significantly lower costs to the Federal government.

Thank you for your consideration of my request. I look forward to our continued collaboration toward achieving federal energy savings and increasing fair contracting opportunities for our Nation's small businesses.



In keeping with the intent of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (EISA 2007), we write to call your attention to the opportunities in our state of Hawaii. In particular we refer to sections 228 and 232(a)(4) of EISA 2007. The former deals with algal biomass and the latter deals with sustainable production of feedstock.


Bioenergy has been a major component of Hawaii's energy profile for many years. For example, combustion of agricultural residues (e.g., sugar cane bagasse) at times generated more than 10% of the electricity used in the State. More recently, microalgae has been proposed as an alternative source of liquid biofuels that could offer significant advantages over terrestrial crops with respect to the "food or fuel" controversy, and land and fresh water usage. Commercial production of microalgae (primarily for high value nutraceuticals) has been ongoing in Hawaii for decades and the University of Hawaii has established research programs in this area. Various projects to explore the feasibility of producing biodiesel from microalgae are being initiated in Hawaii to build on this experience and existing facilities and/or technical resources. In addition, the development of microalgae as a biodiesel source offers considerable potential as a user of carbon dioxide and as such offers some interesting strategies for the expanded use of coal-fired electrical power plants.

To date, there have been limited interactions between the different groups pursuing these algae-based biofuel initiatives. In consideration of the potential held by microalgal biofuels to contribute significantly to the future energy portfolio of state of Hawaii and the nation, we invite you to invest appropriate resources to develop this important program. As a starting point for this endeavor, the University of Hawaii has indicated its willingness to assist your department by organizing a series of workshops to develop a national strategy to capture the opportunities in algal biomass. Given Hawaii's unique experience with bioenergy and specifically with microalgae, we believe this is a rich area of cooperation between your Department and the biofuel research and development interests in Hawaii. As we jointly move forward with the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative, algae and biofuels hold great potential as contributors to the goal of 70% renewable energy. We look forward to assisting your in realizing this opportunity and will be most happy to provide contact information as needed.



We write today regarding the Department of Energy's recently announced solicitation for advanced geothermal energy technology and research projects. While we were pleased that the Department has finally issued the Funding Opportunity Announcement, we are concerned that DOE's solicitation does not comply with the direction provided by Title VI of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (EISA, P.L. 110-140) and the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2008 (P.L. 110-161).

Over the past several years, DOE has illogically opposed most investment in our nation's geothermal resources, taking every opportunity to either zero-out geothermal funding or gut the current congressionally-authorized program enacted by EISA. Recently, the Department has taken it upon itself to "refocus" the Geothermal Program, and spend all appropriated funding on enhanced geothermal systems (EGS) only. This was not Congress's intent and this is the wrong direction for the Geothermal Program.

The advanced geothermal energy research program authorized by EISA was based on legislation that was crafted after hearings in both the Senate and House committees of jurisdiction and enjoyed strong bipartisan and bicameral support. As you may recall, on February 1st a bipartisan group of Senators sent you a letter expressing strong support for funding and immediate implementation of the programs in the geothermal energy subtitle of EISA.

EISA directs the DOE to undertake a broad and aggressive research program, and clearly specifies that research shall support not only EGS, but also hydrothermal geothermal and geothermal production from oil and gas fields and geopressured resources. Additionally, EISA established programs important to advancing and commercializing geothermal technologies, such as the Center for Geothermal Technology Transfer (Sec. 618), Geopowering America (Sec. 619), and an Educational Pilot Program (Sec. 620) – all of which are being ignored by DOE this year and in its FY 2009 budget.

Although the Administration hoped to disregard the authorization for geothermal technology research under EISA, Congress provided \$20 million for geothermal research and deployment in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2008. It is unacceptable that the DOE is now attempting to completely disregard the immediate need to develop the most accessible sources of clean geothermal energy and instead focus solely on EGS.


Contrary to the Department's position that hydrothermal technologies are "mature," the National Renewable Energy Laboratory has identified at least 30,000 megawatts (MW) of accessible shallow hydrothermal resources that have not been developed, and has estimated that there are 120,000 MW of unidentified shallow hydrothermal resources. However, America's geothermal generation is currently less than 3,000 MW. This is an enormous opportunity cost, and by delaying investment in accessing known geothermal resources, Americans are paying heavily with rapidly rising energy bills and higher greenhouse gas emissions.

We strongly urge the Department to revise or supplement its Funding Opportunity Announcement for advanced geothermal energy technology, and implement the geothermal program as authorized and directed by EISA.



I am writing to urge the Department of Energy (DOE) to accelerate the rulemaking for Section 136 of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007. Section 136, the Advanced Technology Vehicles Manufacturing Incentive Program, is designed to spur the development of advanced vehicles that meet aggressive pollution reduction and fuel economy standards. The sudden rise in gas prices, the subprime mortgage induced credit market tightening, across the board commodity price pressures, and regulatory demands for more fuel efficient vehicles have led to a sudden economic disruption of unprecedented proportion for the domestic automobile industry. These conditions warrant quick action.

Almost four percent of the Nation's total gross domestic product is generated by the sale and production of new light vehicles. According to a 2001 University of Michigan study, the automobile industry relates to more domestic manufacturing, generates more retail business, and creates more domestic employment than any other single industry in the United States. Providing the domestic automobile industry with targeted and timely assistance will help stimulate the entire economy in each of the 50 States.

Automotive sales have plummeted to a seasonally-adjusted rate of 12.55 million units, which would equate to almost 3 million, or 25 percent, fewer vehicles compared to 2007. To put these numbers in context, Ford sold about 2.5 million vehicles in the United States. last year, and Chrysler sold about that amount globally. Thus, speedy implementation of Section 136 is critical.

Section 136 authorized DOE to make facility funding awards and to provide loans to domestic automobile manufacturers to encourage the rapid deployment of advanced technology


vehicles. Congress enacted the law to help automobile manufacturers and component suppliers re-equip, expand, and establish manufacturing facilities to produce advanced technology vehicles and components and to undertake the required engineering integration to produce the vehicles. Pursuant to subsection (e), DOE was directed to issue regulations to implement the award and loan programs.

Given that the law requires you to begin carrying out Section 136 within one year of enactment, I urge you to complete the rulemaking process by the end of the year so that domestic automobile manufacturers will be able to seek facility funding awards and loans by the beginning of the new year. Given the extraordinary market conditions now facing the industry and the threat of continued high gasoline prices and falling automobile sales will continue to pose to the livelihoods of hard-working Americans and communities across the country, it is essential for the Department to undertake this effort with urgency.

I am committed to securing substantial appropriations to fund the award and loan programs before Congress adjourns for the year.

Given the urgency of this situation, I would appreciate your response no later than August 15, 2008.

As our constituents continue to suffer from high gasoline, diesel and other energy costs, they have grown tired of the political fighting in Washington over this issue. Energy costs are causing serious financial hardship, and the current political rhetoric does not help anyone. People want to see positive and immediate action from their federal government. We, therefore, write to ask that you take important steps right now which will demonstrate the federal government's resolve to help ease the pain so many Americans are feeling at the pump by increasing the requirement for the federal fleet to reduce its petroleum consumption.

In January 2007, you signed Executive Order 13423, requiring all agencies with 20 or more vehicles in the United States to decrease their petroleum consumption by 2 percent per year through 2015, relative to their Fiscal Year 2005 baseline. That Executive Order also required agencies to increase their alternative fuel usage by 10 percent per year. While we applaud this previous effort, we think that the drastic change in prices and circumstances over the past 18 months – with oil prices having approached \$150 a barrel earlier this summer and gasoline hovering around \$4 a gallon for months – necessitates more substantial and immediate action on the part of federal agencies to conserve fuel.

As such, we respectfully request that you revoke Executive Order 13423 and replace it with a new executive order requiring all federal agencies with vehicles in the U.S. to decrease petroleum consumption by 5 percent per year relative to their Fiscal Year 2006 baseline through 2016, as well as continuing to require agencies to increase alternative fuel use by 10 percent per year relative to the previous year. We believe that any such requirement should provide necessary exemptions based on national security concerns and for any agency or federal vehicles operating in a theatre of war.

We believe that such a step will provide an important opportunity for the federal government to demonstrate leadership on the matter of fuel conservation, as well as helping reduce demand for gasoline and diesel from one of the nation's largest single consumers of those products. While we understand that there are no simple answers to the current energy crisis and that no single "silver bullet" solution exists, we do believe that by taking this simple step now, the federal

government can reduce demand and help lower prices, thus easing the pain to consumers and setting an important example for all citizens.

Again, we urge you to issue a new executive order requiring federal agencies to reduce petroleum consumption by five percent per year. We appreciate your attention to our request and look forward to your response on this critical issue.


I am writing to seek an update on the Department of Energy's progress in writing regulations to implement two of the provisions passed by Congress and signed into law by the President in the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (PL. 110-140). Specifically I am writing to inquire about the Department's progress in implementing two sections that I authored, Sections 803 and 625 of the Act: the Renewable Energy Deployment Grant program and the High Cost Region Geothermal Energy Grant program.

During your annual budget appearance before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee this winter you expressed willingness to have the implementing regulations crafted in FY '08. As we speed toward the end of the fiscal year I am seeking an update on the Department's progress in finalizing draft and final implementing regulations. It has been difficult to make progress on gaining appropriations to fund the first matching grants for the wide variety of renewable energy systems envisioned in the sections in Alaska and elsewhere until the regulations are crafted and the Department is in a position to solicit and award grants.

I know the Department is very busy with a host of initiatives, but in this period of great concern over sky-high energy prices and carbon emissions, furthering renewable energy offers a host of advantages to the nation, and especially to my State of Alaska, where diesel generation is causing the price of electricity to soar, in general passing the 60-cent-per-kilowatt mark in rural Alaska - ten times the national average. Given Alaska's abundant renewable energy potential and the extreme cost of diesel-fired generation, there are few states that offer greater immediate potential for significant increases in renewable energy provided some assistance is provided to pay down initial high capital costs.

I do hope that the Department is making good progress in writing the draft regulations to implement the two programs and I await news of your effort to date. Thank you for your efforts in this matter; I do appreciate them. Best wishes.

I am concerned about an issue that has received recent coverage in Consumer Reports magazine: specifically, whether the testing protocols for appliance efficiency accurately and reliably measure the energy consumption of the appliances and other equipment being tested for purposes of awarding Energy Star labels.


According to a Consumer Reports' press advisory dated September 2, 2008, previewing the October issue of the magazine, its "recent investigation into the Energy Star program reveals that lax standards and out-of-date test protocols plague the federal program". The advisory mentions the relatively high percentage of qualifying appliances and equipment in some categories, the length of time required to set new standards, and the tendency some may have to try to evade or "game" the process. Most troubling, the report goes on to cite five refrigerator models that actually use much higher amounts of electricity in normal use than in tests conducted for Energy Star certification, in some cases twice as much. The report states that in many cases manufacturers self-certify their compliance with Energy Star standards without any independent verification. In these cases, the models cited are manufactured overseas, and I have been contacted by U.S. appliance manufacturers concerned that U.S. consumers are being misled by such claims to the competitive disadvantage of domestic manufacturers.

I assume you agree that the Energy Star brand is one of the most valuable energy efficiency programs the U.S. Government operates. Any failure to adopt fair, rigorous, and ambitious efficiency targets, along with appropriate testing protocols under normal operating conditions, for appliances or equipment seeking to obtain an Energy Star label, threatens to undermine the value of the Energy Star brand.

Please advise me by Friday, October 10, 2008, what your Department and Agency, which co-administer the Energy Star program, are doing separately and jointly to address these issues. Please further indicate whether the Consumer Reports analysis is accurate or whether you disagree with it. Finally, please share with me your views of the ways in which the Energy Star program can and should be enhanced not only to preserve its value but to maximize its value as a key means of communicating about cost-effective energy efficiency to consumers.


I am writing to thank you for your efforts to implement the energy efficiency and renewable energy provisions contained in the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (EISA). I am also writing to inquire about the Department of Energy's compliance with the timetable for executing Section 432 of EISA.

Section 432 directs federal energy managers to conduct comprehensive energy and water audits on 75 percent of applicable federal facilities at least once every four years. This provision is critical for ensuring that federal buildings meet energy efficiency goals. Under Section 432, the Department of Energy was required to issue a final document by June 17, 2008, specifying guidelines for energy manager designation, covered facilities, and energy and water evaluations. This document has not yet been released. I urge the Department to finalize this document as soon as possible and avoid similar delays in the implementation of the rest of Section 432.

As the nation's largest energy consumer, the federal government has an obligation to demonstrate leadership in implementing energy efficiency measures and curbing energy consumption.

Thank you for your attention to this issue, and I look forward to our continued cooperation to ensure a clean and secure energy future for our nation.

I am writing to you to ask for your assistance in avoiding further delays of a contract to repower existing Savannah River Site (SRS) Department of Energy (DOE) facilities with renewable energy resources.

In November 2006 after a competitive selection process, SRS selected Ameresco under DOE's Biomass and Alternate Methane Fuel (BAMF) Super Energy Savings Performance Contract (ESPC) to develop a biomass fueled cogeneration plant to replace the failing 1950's era coal fired plant at SRS. The project is the largest federal ESPC project ever proposed, and Ameresco has worked diligently to secure a project financing commitment for the project. This project would save the DOE over \$1 billion in energy and operating costs during the task order term, and would meet the Department's entire renewable energy goal. Additionally, the project will provide a substantial emissions reduction that will provide a significant positive impact on regional air quality.

The proposed total payments for the implementation, financing, operations and maintenance costs approach \$800 million over the term of the proposed project. The contract program, however, has a ceiling of \$200M that must be raised before project award can take place. The need to raise the contract ceiling was identified in 2007 during the DOE Review Board process that approved the project to proceed the Detailed Energy Study phase. The contracting officer issued a notice of intent to award (NOITA) at that time in 2007. In April 2008, Ameresco submitted its final proposal, which has been revised twice to accommodate DOE-directed changes.

DOE officials have known about the contract ceiling issue for well over a year. Despite numerous recommendations and attempts by internal DOE staff to secure final approval of this contract, they have been unable to obtain the necessary approval to raise the contract ceiling. The project fills a critical need for SRS, and should not be further delayed.

I urge your prompt action on this issue to ensure this important contract is completed so SRS will have a reliable and renewable source for steam and electricity to meet its mission





I am writing to request that the Department of Energy (DOE) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) coordinate their efforts to promote the purchase of energy efficient water heating equipment in 2009. On January 1, 2009 energy star ratings of residential water heaters and tax credits for residential energy efficiency upgrades both take effect, giving your two agencies a unique opportunity to work cooperatively.

The coinciding implementation of these two provisions creates an opportunity for improving residential water heating efficiency, which accounts for between 13 and 17 percent of residential energy use. I strongly encourage DOE and IRS to work together to integrate this information in any publications, promotional materials, and educational products that are published regarding the new energy star water heater labels. Consumers must be made aware that purchasing an energy star labeled gas tankless, heat pump, or gas condensing water heater will automatically qualify them to receive the tax credit. Knowledge of this added incentive will encourage the purchase of highly efficient water heaters.


DOE's new energy star rating for water heaters establishes five classes of heaters eligible for the ENERGY STAR® label: high-performance gas storage, whole-home gas tankless, advanced drop-in or integrated heat pump, solar, and gas condensing.

The tax credits for residential energy efficiency upgrades (Sect. 25C) will also go back into effect for one year. These tax credits cover water

heaters with high efficiency levels: a natural gas, propane, or oil water heater which has an energy factor (EF) of at least 0.8 or an electric heat pump water heater with an EF of at least 2.0. Although some water heaters that do not have an energy star rating will qualify for the credit, all energy star rated gas tankless, heat pump, and gas condensing water heaters should meet the credit requirements.

The implementation of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 and its 36 billion gallon Renewable Fuels Standard will require the use of ethanol in motor vehicle fuel beyond the traditional 10 percent blend. Together with the increases in automobile fuel economy included in the Act, the expanded use of ethanol will dramatically reduce demand for gasoline and increasingly displace our need for oil and gasoline imports. Moving beyond 10 percent ethanol blends is essential to achieving this nation's goals of reducing our reliance on foreign oil and of fostering the growth of a robust, domestic renewable fuels industry.

There are many challenges to expanding our use of renewable fuels, including limited infrastructure and refueling stations, the small-but-growing number of flex fuel vehicles (FFVs) on the road today that can utilize higher blends of ethanol, and the Clean Air Act prohibition on ethanol-blended fuels above 10 percent in gasoline-only engines. As a nation, we are working to overcome these challenges. For example, auto manufacturers are steadily increasing production of flex fuel vehicles, pledging to meet a goal of 50 percent of their models being equipped with "flexible fuel" systems by 2012. We also continue to push for expanded infrastructure and refueling stations. But we also believe that our nation can and should begin to move in the direction of ethanol blends in excess of 10 percent in conventional vehicles.

On October 7th, the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) released preliminary results of studies being conducted by the Vehicle Technologies and Biomass Programs to determine the viability of higher blends of ethanol in gasoline. These preliminary results appear to be consistent with the results of earlier ethanol blend testing projects such as the one done by the State of Minnesota. The results, however, demonstrate the need for additional research and the continued testing necessary to certify whether certain ethanol blends such as E15 and E20 can meet the performance and health effects requirements necessary for their authorized use in America's vehicle fleet. It is critical that DOE continue these studies in conjunction with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and that DOE and EPA fully engage the auto industry and other relevant industry experts in these efforts.

We thank you for recognizing the importance of this ethanol market issue and for directing the allocation of funding to the Vehicle Technologies and Biofuels Programs of the Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy, which enabled them to initiate this testing. We believe DOE should rank this testing of intermediate ethanol blends as a top budget and resource priority. We encourage the Department to direct additional Fiscal Year 2008 and 2009 funds to the Vehicle Technologies and/or Biomass Programs to expand, improve and accelerate the testing of intermediate ethanol blends. We also encourage the Department to explore any methodologies that could expedite the testing processes such as accelerated materials testing or more intensive scheduling of test cycles. Our national energy security depends on our ability to continue growing the U.S. biofuels industry by providing more options for American consumers to use these renewable, homegrown fuels.

We are writing today in reference to an article that appeared in the Wall Street Journal on February 11, 2008, entitled "*Refiner Cutbacks May Not Be Felt at Pumps.*" This article asserts that U.S. refiners are deliberately cutting back on production in order to combat the decrease in demand brought about by high gasoline prices.

In pertinent part, the article states the following:

"Refiners over the past month have scaled back production rates to 84.3% of their capacity, the lowest level recorded for this time of year since 2003, according to data released Wednesday by the U.S. Energy Information Administration. Since the beginning of the year, operating rates dropped by 8%, compared to an average 4% decline during each of the past five years.

"The market conditions last year provided the incentive to run [refineries] as high as you could," says Lynn Westfall, chief economist for refiner Tesoro Corp. But the market 'is not there currently'..."


As you know, the issue of U.S. refinery capacity has been at the forefront of our deliberations on energy policy for a number of years and has proven to be one of the more controversial and vexing topics we have explored. This article raises a number of questions that we would appreciate EIA's assistance in answering.

Specifically:


1. To what extent is reduced capacity utilization during January and February 2008 attributable to (a) scheduled outages (turnarounds), (b) unscheduled outages (from accidents) or (c) deliberate decisions to reduce refinery throughput?
2. Which specific refineries are intentionally cutting back refinery capacity and by what percentage?
3. Will these cutbacks in refinery output raise wholesale and retail prices for gasoline, diesel, and heating oil?
4. Is there demand reduction with respect to refined products due to high oil prices? Has demand for gasoline, diesel, and heating oil dropped proportionately to the decrease in refinery output?
5. How much storage capacity is there for refined products and what percentage of storage capacity is actually used? How does this compare historically at this time of year for the past five years?
6. Did refined inventories drop while refinery output was being cut back during these two months?
7. What percentage of domestic consumption is represented by imports during the months of January and February? How does this compare with the previous 5 years?

We would appreciate your responses to these questions by no later than Monday, March 31, 2008. Thank you for your consideration. If you have any questions, please contact Bruce Harris or Richard Miller with the Committee on Energy and Commerce staff at (202) 225-2927.

It has come to my attention that petroleum data published in the Weekly Petroleum Status Report (WPSR) for the week ending May 23, scheduled for release at 10:30 a.m. Eastern Time on May 29, 2008, was available and accessed on the public Energy Information Administration (EIA) website prior to its scheduled release time.

Such a security breach involving government data raises serious concerns about manipulation of energy markets by unscrupulous investors seeking inappropriate access to government information in order to gain significant and illegal financial advantage. It also undermines public trust and confidence in the integrity of commodity and other financial markets. Finally, it calls into question the security and reliability of EIA's management of sensitive energy data.

While I understand that steps are being taken to prevent a similar event from occurring in the future, it is essential that you ascertain as quickly as possible whether such incidents have occurred in the past. If there is a reasonable possibility that the recent incident was part of a pattern of improper access to market data, I urge you to involve the Justice Department as soon as possible.

I hereby request that the Department of Energy (DOE) undertake a full investigation into the circumstances surrounding the unauthorized release of the May 29th WPSR data and whether such premature or other unauthorized access may have occurred prior to that incident. In particular, I ask for your response to the following questions:


- What steps are you taking to ascertain who may have had premature access to EIA information from the May 29th WPSR or other EIA reports and files?
- What was the earliest point in time that the information in question was made available?
- Did the early publication of this information in any manner provide an unfair advantage to an individual or a group of investors?

- Was the compromised information accessed with the intent to provide a financial advantage?
- What is the likelihood that EIA information has been prematurely accessed in the past, for example, through the use of software "robots?"
- What further steps may be required to ensure that improper disclosure of sensitive government energy information does not occur in the future?

At a time of understandable public outrage about soaring energy prices and plummeting consumer confidence in U.S. petroleum markets, illegal access to sensitive energy market data is intolerable. Reports of premature access to EIA data, and the possibility that other data have been similarly compromised, can only contribute to the public's sense that investor speculation is in large part responsible for skyrocketing prices. Accordingly, I trust that you will take every precaution to ensure not only that this recent incident is not repeated, but also that a full report regarding the facts surrounding this particular event, and the possibility of any prior, similar incidents, are provided to Congress and to the public.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.



As you may recall, you stated in your testimony before the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources on March 4th, 2008, that the [then] current policy of filling the SPR at a rate of 70,000 barrels per day is increasing the world price of oil by \$2 per barrel. Adding 70,000 barrels per day to the world supply would therefore reduce the price of oil by \$2 per barrel, according to your estimate. Using the same methodology and set of circumstances and assumptions from which you derived the estimate you presented to the Senate Committee on March 4th, would you please provide me with an estimate of what the impact upon prices would be if an additional 1 million barrels per day of productive capacity was brought online today?

A number of recent proposals in Congress and elsewhere call for the Federal Government to withdraw a significant quantity of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) and sell it as a means of providing downward pressure on the record crude oil prices that have been experienced in recent weeks. Pursuant to recent legislation enacted in response to high market prices, filling of the SPR has been suspended. The question now is whether or not to begin active sales of SPR crude oil in an effort to provide gasoline price relief to American consumers.

I respectfully request that you provide by noon on Thursday, July 17, 2008, the Energy Information Administration's (EIA) best response and analyses to the questions posed below. Your answers will guide me and other members of the Committee on Energy and Commerce in reviewing the merits of any such proposals, over which the Committee has jurisdiction.


1. What is the current estimated volume of crude oil sold or delivered to refiners on an average daily basis in world markets?
2. What is the maximum daily sustainable production that could be achieved by withdrawals from the SPR?
3. Since its creation, crude oil has been withdrawn and sold into the market on several occasions. Please indicate, for each of those occasions:
 - a. the volume of crude oil withdrawn and sold;

- b. the daily withdrawal rate;
 - c. the benchmark crude oil prices on the day before withdrawals started;
 - d. the benchmark crude oil prices at the peak of withdrawals;
 - e. the average benchmark prices of crude oil during the withdrawal period;
 - f. benchmark crude oil prices three, six, nine, and twelve months after withdrawal;
 - g. other supply and demand factors that might have affected crude oil prices during the same period; and
 - h. any evidence, analysis, or basis for the inference that world oil market prices were or were not directly affected by the SPR withdrawals and the extent of that effect.
4. What uncertainties must be acknowledged in any effort to estimate the market price effects of any increase in oil supply to world oil markets from a sale of crude oil from the SPR?
5. What additional factors or uncertainties might come into play if such increase in supply were being provided by crude oil being withdrawn from the SPR, such as the market's awareness that such withdrawals could not be maintained indefinitely, and only at a direct cost to the national security protection the SPR would otherwise be able to provide? How might the market "discount" sales from the SPR as a result of such factors?
6. What specific physical, commercial, transportation, or other issues would affect the world oil market's perception of, or reaction to, sales from the SPR?
7. Based on the above considerations and your best understanding of current oil market dynamics, what range of likely effects on world crude oil prices (highest, lowest, and most probable) might be expected, and over what period of time, from sale into crude oil markets of oil withdrawn from the SPR in the following amounts and over the following periods:
- a. Withdrawal and sale of 1 million barrels per day (bbl/day), 2 million bbl/day, 3 million bbl/day, and 4 million bbl/day,
 - b. Over withdrawal periods of 30 days, 60 days, 90 days, and 120 days.
8. What percentage of world oil consumption is attributable to U.S. demand?

9. To the extent there is a decrease in world oil market prices as the result of sale of crude oil from the SPR, is there any reason to believe that U.S. consumers would receive more than a similar percentage (to that given in response to question eight) of the benefits from the price decrease their government caused? How much of the benefit of such price decreases would flow to consumers in other countries in proportion to their collective oil consumption?
10. Would other holders of strategic stocks, both governmental and commercial, have to engage in similar reductions over similar periods for American consumers to fully benefit from an SPR draw-down?
11. What would prevent other market participants from benefitting from a U.S. decision to reduce strategic reserves by increasing their own oil stocks at that time?
12. To the extent a sale of crude oil from the SPR succeeded in reducing crude oil prices, what would the likely consequent decreases in prices be for consumers of gasoline and diesel fuel? To what extent might the decrease in crude oil prices be absorbed in larger refining margins or retailing margins?

Currently, diesel refined from crude oil is the most widely used transportation fuel in the world. Diesel fuel is critically important to America's economy. Nearly all trucks, delivery vehicles, buses, trains, ships, boats and barges, farm, construction and military vehicles and equipment have diesel engines. What's more, the price of diesel fuel affects the cost of food because nearly everything we buy in the supermarket is shipped across the country by trucks.

Diesel fuel is more efficient than other fuels. According to Popular Mechanics, the next generation of clean diesel vehicles runs approximately 38 percent farther on a gallon of fuel than similar hybrid models. The magazine found that a 2007 Volkswagen Polo Bluemotion diesel automobile travels farther on a gallon of fuel than a 2007 Toyota Prius hybrid. VW model also emits 5% fewer greenhouse gases per mile than the Toyota. Diesel vehicles also last longer than gasoline-powered vehicles. In addition to being fuel efficient, diesel-powered vehicles release fewer CO2 emissions than similar hybrids and gasoline engines. According to the Popular Mechanics field test, the VW model tested by the magazine emits 5% fewer greenhouse gases per mile than a Toyota Prius.


Diesel vehicles run on ultra-low sulfur diesel that is 97% cleaner than older diesel fuel. New diesel technology also reduces carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide, and other particulate emissions levels. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, if 33 percent of American drivers switched to diesel vehicles, oil consumption in the United States would be reduced by approximately 1.5 million barrels of oil a day, which could cut imports by an estimated 10%.

Yet despite these attributes diesel vehicles are not widely available in the U.S. According to the automotive consulting firm R.L. Polk & Company, only approximately 3.5% of automobiles sold in the U.S. are diesel. In Europe, approximately 50% of automobiles sold are diesel. Currently, the U.S. fleet of refineries is geared to produce gasoline.

I am thus writing to request that the Energy Information Administration (EIA) analyze the environmental and energy efficiency attributes of diesel fuel. Specifically, I would like to know how diesel fueled vehicles compare to similar gasoline fueled, E-85 fueled, and hybrid vehicles. Are they more fuel efficient? Do they emit less carbon dioxide? When and how was the decision made in this country to rely primarily on gasoline as a transportation fuel instead of diesel? Who made this decision? What are the technical, economic, regulatory, environmental, or other obstacles to increasing the usage of diesel fueled vehicles? Does the Department of Energy have any recommendations relating to whether or not we should have more diesel cars in our fleet?


It is my understanding that you have not given the citizens of Portsmouth an opportunity to weigh in on the clean-up strategy. Frankly, I am confused as to how the Department could even develop such a cleanup strategy without engaging the community; the very people we both serve.

Any decision making by DOE is necessarily tainted by the fact that you have failed to create a Community Advisory Board (CAB). Every major cleanup, including Portsmouth's sister plant in Paducah, Kentucky, has a CAB. No cleanup strategy should be contemplated until such a CAB has been created and is allowed meaningful input into the process. I am concerned that the Department is returning to the old "announce and defend" policies of the past. These policies have long been rejected by the public and by Congress.

It is our understanding that the Technicum-99 clean-up project, which currently employs about 150 workers, will also be completed by September.


The completion of Cold Standby/Shutdown and Tc99 clean-up projects prior to the initiation of the planned decontamination and decommissioning (D&D) contract could result in hundreds of job losses at the Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant. While the DUF6 facility will help absorb some jobs as it becomes fully operational, we are extremely concerned that DOE does not yet have a plan for the vast majority of these workers now employed by Cold Standby/Shutdown and Tc99 projects.


DOE must pursue appropriate actions to maintain a stable workforce at the Plant as it transitions to full D&D activities. Maintaining a stable workforce will greatly enhance site D&D activities when they begin by ensuring qualified, knowledgeable workers are not lost and that they continue to be a part of current and future site missions.


Please provide us with a response by March 31, 2008, describing DOE's planned actions and timeline to ensure a stable workforce and sound fiscal management of the site.

I am writing to express my continuing concern that flawed procurement practices at the Hanford high-level waste treatment plant (WTP) are compromising the cost, schedule, and, ultimately, the safety of the project. I am requesting a full explanation of the continuing failure of the contractor – Bechtel National, Inc. (BNI) – to ensure that process vessels and piping procured for installation in the so-called “black cells” within the plant meet safety and quality requirements, despite knowing of flaws in their procurement process for these components since 2004. These are sections of the plant where high-level nuclear waste will be routed, but which under the design philosophy being followed will never be accessible for future maintenance or inspection. According to recent reports by the Defense Nuclear Facility Safety Board staff, as many as 1000 pipe sections procured by BNI for installation in the WTP “black cells” were not subjected to the required 100% quality inspections.

While the Board staff confirms that BNI and the Department are working to address this matter, that this sort of problem continues to occur at the WTP project is extremely troubling given the long history of quality-related procurement issues at the project, including a similar failure, dating back to 2004, where BNI failed to ensure that that approximately 70 “black cell” processing vessels were fully inspected. In fact, the Department’s Office of Price Anderson Enforcement has found that BNI has a pattern of improperly handling the procurement of critical components and systems, extending well beyond the “black cell” components. In both March 2006 (see EA 2006-03) and in October 2007 (see EA 2007-05), the Office identified and proposed fines related to multiple instances where BNI did not properly procure critical equipment, some dating back to 2001, and including the plant’s computerized control system.

As you may recall, in April 2006, I also wrote to the Director of the Department’s Office of Price-Anderson Enforcement asking for an investigation into allegations raised by a BNI employee whistleblower at the Hanford site concerning safety problems with the computerized control system being procured for the WTP. Central to those concerns was the fact that BNI’s procurement system did not ensure that the control system met the nuclear safety quality requirements essential for such a system. Rather, BNI procured this system as a “commercial-grade” product effectively bypassing nuclear quality specifications and nuclear quality assurance/quality control requirements.

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The central issue in these allegations -- that procurement of this critical system had been improperly treated as commercial procurement -- has largely been validated by both the Office of Price-Anderson Enforcement (see EA-2007-05) and by the Office of Inspector General (IG) (see DOE/IG-0764, "Audit Report -- Quality Assurance Standards for the Integrated Control Network at the Hanford Site's Waste Treatment Plant").

Total project cost for the WTP has already more than doubled from \$5.87 billion to \$12.63 billion. The scheduled completion of the project has already slipped from July 2011 to November 2019. Continuing procurement issues at WTP raise additional questions about the ability of BNI and the Department to meet these new targets and the safety of the plant. They also raise serious questions about the effectiveness of the Department's oversight of BNI's construction management and procurement practices.

I am therefore requesting an explanation of the causes of the most recent "black cell" procurement problems and what measures BNI and the Department will put in place to ensure that "black cell" components meet the necessary performance, inspection, and quality control requirements to ensure their long-term performance and safety. I would also like a report on the outcome of the reviews of the computerized control system you stated would be done in your letter of June 12, 2007. Finally, I would like an explanation of what additional actions the Department is going to take to address the larger issue of the continuing pattern of inadequate construction management and procurement problems for critical WTP systems and components, including allocation of costs to remedy these problems and their impact on BNI award fees. Please provide your response no later than April 30, 2008.

We are writing to express serious concerns about many of the issues raised by the report released yesterday by the Department's Inspector General report titled "The Department's Progress in Meeting Los Alamos National Laboratory Consent Order Milestones." At the core of our concerns are two issues: 1) the clear inadequacy of the Department's information and analysis prior to entering into a legally binding agreement with the New Mexico Department of Environment to conduct a cleanup within prescribed timeframes, and 2) the Department of Energy's serious, year after year, under-funding of cleanup activities.

On page 3 of the cover letter to that report the IG states that "Environmental Management acknowledged that its FY2009 budget would not allow it to meet certain milestones contained in the environmental agreements that have been negotiated with regulators [including the New Mexico Environmental Department]. Later the letter states that same milestones will be missed regardless of funding. Management noted that some of the agreements were negotiated with incomplete knowledge of the technical complexity and magnitude of costs that would be involved." The Inspector General further notes on page 2 of the actual report that in February of 2005 the NNSA Los Alamos Site Manager stated he had strong reservations that appropriate resources had not been identified to fully execute the environmental management program needed to meet the requirements of the Consent Order with the New Mexico Environmental Department. Finally, it appears from the report that a certified baseline for the clean up of Areas L and G was not fully completed until March, 2008, three years after the Consent Order was signed.

When reading the entirety of these statements, and the report as a whole, it appears that the Department of Energy entered into negotiations with the New Mexico Environmental Department knowing that it was working with grossly inadequate information about the cleanup requirements. The result was an agreement that dramatically underestimated the costs and time requirements for the cleanup of the two areas studied by the IG, and virtually guaranteed the Department would fail to meet the milestones it agreed to fulfill.

We find it puzzling that the Department conducted these negotiations woefully uninformed, given that the Department had extensive experience in negotiating cleanup agreements prior to the New Mexico negotiations. This is very troubling, and the Department's subsequent inadequate request for funding continues to be wholly irresponsible.


Accordingly, we write to ask you to provide the following information at the earliest possible date:

Which if any of the milestones are in risk of not being met?


- By what date does the Department expect to meet these individual milestones'?
- Beyond the two cleanup activities studied, are there other milestones within the consent order the Department projects not being able to meet?
- What is the additional funding requirement necessary to meet these agreed upon milestones?
- How does the Department expect to fund these shortfalls for FY 08, FY 09, and beyond?

We look forward bath to a timely response to this requests and to your explanation of how this serious set of errors could have occurred.

I am writing to request that you review issues related to the Department of Energy's (DOE) clean-up program and, specifically, its decontamination and decommissioning (D&D) plans for the Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant (PORTS).

I am concerned that important clean-up decisions are being made before substantive input has been received from the local community. No members have been appointed to the Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) and once members are appointed, it will take at least several months, if not longer, before the group will be able to provide constructive input on DOE's clean-up plans. A critical element of successful clean-up programs, like Rocky Flats, is the development of community support on site issues through close collaboration between DOE, local governments, and community leaders. The consensus built through this collaboration can expedite the clean-up process, while a lack of this consensus building only leads to delays and roadblocks. I encourage DOE to take ample time and effort to build these critical relationships before decisions are made affecting the site.

I understand that in its Uranium Enrichment Decontamination and Decommissioning Fund 2007 Report to Congress, the Department is developing its acquisition strategy for the D&D work scope at PORTS, and it intends to issue an RFP as early as this summer.

I am concerned about the small amount of money DOE is spending on the PORTS clean-up. From FY 2005 to FY 2009 the administration's proposed funding for the program has dropped almost \$2 billion from \$7.3 billion to \$5.5 billion. When this \$2 billion reduction is coupled with the fact that DOE's fixed or "mortgage" costs at its clean-up sites are in the range of \$3 billion a year, it is clear that funding for the real work of DOE's clean-up program has been cut in half since FY 2005.

Unfortunately, this funding decline is likely to have a severely adverse impact on clean-up progress at PORTS. I am perplexed by the notion that the Department believes it can make meaningful progress on the clean-up of PORTS by spending, as it estimates, roughly \$100 to \$175 million a year going forward, when the anticipated total project cost is \$8.2 billion. DOE should devote the necessary resources to the PORTS project and perform an accelerated clean-up so that years of time and billions of dollars can be saved. To help ensure a sufficient funding

stream, I have introduced legislation to reauthorize the Uranium D&D Fund. And there are other viable sources of funding to support DOE's clean-up work, including the sale of valuable assets of DOE such as depleted uranium and excess physical infrastructure that may be found at sites like PORTS.


I am also concerned that the Department plans to use a "management and integration" (M&I) contract model that involves many different contractors. This approach was attempted in the clean-up of DOE's Rocky Flats site and was scrapped after costly overruns and missed regulatory milestones and deadlines. Eventually, DOE put a "closure" contract model into place at Rocky Flats that used a single contractor who coordinated all the work and was solely accountable to the Department. Not only was this approach highly successful, but it cut the project timeline by several decades and saved taxpayers billions of dollars. Likewise, two DOE sites in the State of Ohio -- Fernald and Mound -- were cleaned up on an accelerated basis using closure model contracts, saving many years of work and billions of dollars.

It is important to note that while I strongly advocate for the quickest and most efficient clean-up possible, any acceleration in the scheduled clean-up date should not adversely affect the pension plans or health benefits of clean-up workers. In the past, workers were unable to meet the minimum age and years-of-service requirements because sites were completed faster than their originally scheduled end dates. In these cases, employees lost benefits they had worked hard to secure. It must be clearly stated in every DOE clean-up contract that changes in the clean-up end date will not adversely affect the potential for accrued benefits.

In addition to addressing concerns highlighted above, please respond to the following questions on PORTS clean-up planning:

- What is DOE doing to protect worker pensions, health benefits, and job security and continuity as it transitions to full scale D&D?
- What are the advantages and disadvantages of extending the PORTS clean-up for 30 or more years, rather than pursuing an accelerated program?
- How much time is DOE allotting for community involvement before it releases any request for proposal regarding PORTS?
- What considerations would prompt the Department to perform an M&I contract when closure contracts have been so successful?

I look forward to engaging in a thoughtful dialogue with you as to how we may find a better path forward to address the clean-up of PORTS and the other DOE clean-up sites across the nation.



I've recently been made aware of the status of a lawsuit filed by a small business concern against the Department of Energy ("DOE") with regard to bid and proposal costs related to DOE's decision to cancel, without ever making a proper award, the small business set-aside solicitation for the deactivation and decommissioning of the Fast Flux Test Facility ("FFTF") in Washington state. The FFTF solicitation was featured by DOE at the time it was released as the Department's largest small business set-aside contract and an attempt by DOE to improve its record on awarding contracts to small business concerns.

Without commenting on the particular merits of the lawsuit, I am nevertheless concerned by the facts as presented and the basis for DOE's decision to cancel, rather than amend and continue the solicitation. DOE and the small business concerns invested over three years of effort in the solicitation process. The small business concerns not only had to utilize their limited resources to prepare and submit offers, but also had to forgo other business opportunities while they pursued the DOE contract. A significant contributor to the length of this process was a violation of procurement regulations by DOE officials, as determined by the Government Accountability Office.

Also of concern is the fact that, based on the DOE budget requests, DOE has spent, via a contract with the existing major contractor, over \$116 million on project tasks since the solicitation's cancellation with an additional \$10.7 million budgeted to be spent. It is also apparent that the small business concerns that competed for this procurement offered to perform the work at a substantially cheaper price than the existing contractor.

I am concerned that DOE made the decision to cancel based on its own administrative convenience rather than considering the best interests of the public including the small businesses competing for this project and the taxpayers that are

paying for the work. In order to have a better understanding of this process, I would appreciate a review of this matter to determine whether the cancellation increased the expenditure of tax dollars and to determine the impact on DOE's small business contracting program including the small businesses that were encouraged by DOE to compete for this work.

Thank you for your leadership and your attention to this matter.





In light of record-high crude oil prices and the devastating impact on many Americans struggling to heat their homes this winter, we are writing to urge you to suspend temporarily filling the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR).

On January 2, the price crude oil on the New York Mercantile Exchange briefly reached \$100/barrel. This caps a rapid rise in prices from \$71/barrel in August 2007, an increase that cannot be explained by increased demand or tight supplies alone. This winter, the Energy Information Administration estimates that households can expect to pay between 10 to 22 percent more for heating fuels than during the 2006-2007 winter. In the state of Maine, for example, consumers face home heating oil prices 17 percent higher than this time last year (\$2.31/gallon in December 2006 compared to \$3.28/gallon as of December 31, 2007). No one should be forced to choose between medicine and food or heat, but the rapid increase in crude oil prices has pushed many citizens into exactly such crisis situations.

Section 301(c) of P.L. 109-58, the Energy Policy Act of 2005 ("the Levin-Collins amendment"), requires the Department of Energy (DOE) to follow procedures for the acquisition of oil for the SPR that "avoid incurring excessive cost or appreciably affecting the price of petroleum products to consumers" and "avoid adversely affecting current and futures prices, supplies, and inventories of oil." At a recent joint hearing of the Senate Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee's Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations and the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee's Subcommittee on Energy, one of the witnesses, Dr. Philip Verleger, stated that his analysis shows that a significant portion of the rise in crude oil prices since August was caused by DOE's decision to fill the SPR.

In enacting Section 301(c), Congress intended DOE to resume use of the sensible business model it employed prior to 2002 for acquiring oil for the SPR – buying more oil for the SPR when prices were low and supplies were plentiful, and less oil when prices were high and supplies were tight. Instead, DOE is buying oil when prices are nearing record highs and supplies are tight, taking valuable oil off the market at the very time more supply would ease prices. DOE has


presented no compelling Justification for this course of action which disregards the significant impact of the SPR fill program upon oil prices, consumers, and the U.S. economy.

The SPR already contains nearly 700 million barrels of oil. DOE plans to acquire almost 13 million more barrels of oil for the SPR in the first six months of 2008, in connection with the Department of Interior's royalty-in-kind program. A deferral of these deposits would increase oil supplies to the U.S. market and help decrease record-high prices with no detriment to the SPR's ability to supply oil in the event of a supply disruption.

Based on futures market prices and the Department's own forecasting of crude oil prices, a deferral of SPR deliveries until later in the year would allow the Department to acquire oil at a substantial discount compared to today's prices, saving the taxpayers millions of dollars. These funds could be used to fund increases in programs such as the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program that provides states funding to operate home energy assistance programs for low-income families, the elderly, and others who may be on limited incomes and in need of assistance.

Thank you for your prompt attention to this urgent matter.

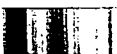

Yesterday, we were informed by your Secretary of Energy that he was radically restructuring the FutureGen project -- effectively killing the program in Central Illinois. As you may recall, FutureGen is the cornerstone of your clean coal initiative and a project that your Administration has been pushing for more than five years. This project will design and construct a commercial scale coal-fueled power plant with a large-scale carbon capture and storage capacity.

Many have argued that this abrupt about face by Secretary Bodman was the direct result of the FutureGen Alliance choosing Mattoon, Illinois as the site, over Texas applicants. While we'd like not to believe this theory, there is no other plausible explanation. As recently as November 30, 2007, Secretary Bodman assured Members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation that FutureGen was on track for final approval from the Department by the end of the calendar year, including a Record of Decision (ROD). After careful scientific vetting and a comprehensive environmental review, the FutureGen Alliance chose Mattoon as the site on December 18, 2007.

Yesterday, the Secretary informed a bipartisan, bicameral gathering of the Illinois Congressional Delegation that he would not release a ROD on FutureGen. Further, he stated that he was going to scrap your signature clean coal initiative, redesign it, and recomplete it. And he refused to delay his announcement in order for us to help address outstanding issues with the Department and the Alliance. This after the community, the State of Illinois, private industry, and international partners spent years successfully working together to site FutureGen in Mattoon, Illinois and to provide much needed funding.

Last night, the Secretary released a statement which indicated that his reluctance to move forward with the project was due to cost increases in the past five years. Yet when the Secretary was assured that we were prepared to provide adequate funding and to resolve any other outstanding issues between the Administration and the FutureGen Alliance if he would take steps to move FutureGen forward, he unequivocally refused. Given that, it is hard to believe that cost concerns constitute his real objection to this project.

Mr. President, we have lost confidence in Secretary Bodman. From moving the Kare Isotope Accelerator project to the back burner (a spirited competition between Illinois and Michigan) to short-changing our national laboratories to his troubling comments about ethanol and alternative fuels to this recent FutureGen debacle, he has proven to be no ally in our efforts to promote scientific research, address new technology for clean energy development and to boost our struggling economy.

We feel that the Secretary misled us and the people of Illinois, creating false hope in a FutureGen project which he had no intention of funding or supporting. We are writing today to urge you to keep FutureGen on track, so that this project can begin construction and become a reality.

Mr. President, we, the State of Illinois, and the FutureGen Alliance stand ready to move this important project forward. It would be unfortunate to wait for the next Administration to complete the project that you announced and have promoted for more than five years.



Dear President Bush:

As Congress considers a second economic stimulus package to help fund energy research and development, I urge you to strongly consider halting the "royalty-in-kind" (RIK) program for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) in order to direct new funding towards energy research projects.

I believe that **continuing** to acquire oil for the SPR while it is nearly \$100 a barrel is imprudent and fiscally irresponsible. With current US strategic public and private inventories far exceeding IEA Treaty requirements, this action only serves to exacerbate high oil prices. Instead, I propose selling RIK oil on the market and using the revenue to fund R & D that will lead to an increase in both traditional and alternative domestic energy supplies.

Despite Congress' authorization of a myriad of research programs and the Department of Energy's (DOE) allocation of grants, **many** research projects have not received full funding due to budget constraints. A recent GAO analysis indicated that in real dollars, budget authority for DOE's energy research programs declined by 85% between 1978 and 2005.

Americans are struggling with high gas prices, and are deeply concerned about our national security and global warming. The sale of additional oil would immediately help lower consumer energy costs while the nation's energy system – sources and **infrastructure** – is being **transformed** while also addressing national security and global climate change.

Next week I plan to introduce legislation to suspend the RIK program during FY2008, and direct the DOE to sell that oil on the open market yielding around \$1 billion in revenues. These revenues will be directed to finance various research projects across the nation. My fully paid-for legislation will fund geothermal, carbon capture, wind, hydrogen, solar, water, natural gas and deepwater exploration, energy efficiency, and energy storage and transportation research projects located in nearly every state and at hundreds of universities.

Current federal investment in energy solutions is completely inadequate in the face of the energy challenges of increased demand, energy security and climate change. My proposal would provide actual and immediate funding for programs authorized in various energy bills since 2005, including the most recent bill passed last December. It would also represent a serious commitment to energy in 2008.

Now that the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2008, has been signed into law, I would be very appreciative if you would provide me with a status report, including significant milestone events, **leading to full implementation of the projects listed below**, and identified in Senate Report 110-127, and included in, or incorporated by reference into, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2008, and the Joint Explanatory Statement of the Managers.

- **National Energy Technology Laboratory (NETL) Program Direction:** An amount of \$19,223,600 above the President's budget request of \$97.7 million to restore NETL's Program Direction.
- **Maintenance at NETL:** An amount of \$7,927,200 for general maintenance at NETL's Morgantown site. These funds will be used to replace deteriorated and leaking roofs; replace/repair building facades; and upgrade site utility infrastructure at Morgantown NETL. An additional \$4,954,000 is available to support general maintenance at the NETL Pittsburgh campus. These funds will be used to upgrade existing antiquated heating, venting, air conditioning (HVAC) systems and controls; repair building utility infrastructure; replace old restrooms and shower rooms to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act; and replace potable water distribution lines.
- **Coal Research and Development Programs (Fuels and Power Systems) at NETL:** An amount of \$106.323 million above the President's budget request of \$245 million for the Coal Research and Development programs that are administered by NETL.
- **Natural Gas and Oil Research and Development Programs at NETL:** An amount of \$24.772 million above the President's budget request of \$0 to restore the Natural Gas (\$19.818 million) and Oil (\$4.954 million) Research and Development programs that are administered by NETL.

- **NETL Program Direction Bill Language:** Bill language to counter a statutory limitation included in the FY 1996 Energy and Water Appropriations bill on the use of program direction funds to pay for federal employees who conduct federal research.
 - **NETL Research Bill Language:** Bill language that would allow NETL employees to continue to engage in research with other DOE programs.
 - **Establishment of a New Coal and Biomass Fuels research program:** Report language to establish a new Coal and Biomass Fuels research program under the Office of Fossil Energy, which would focus on ways to incorporate the capture and storage of carbon dioxide emissions into the coal-biomass-to-liquids process.
 - **Energy-Water Research program:** Report language establishing a new research and development program on the link between water and fossil energy extraction and utilization to be conducted by several DOE laboratories, including NETL.
 - **Clean Coal Power Initiative (CCPI):** An amount \$69.363 million for the CCPI.
 - **NETL Grid Modernization and Energy Infrastructure Protection Initiative:** Report language directing that the Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability continue working with NETL with respect to research and development activities that support grid modernization and energy assurance.
 - **Computational Energy Sciences:** Within available funds for Advanced Research, \$5,000,000 shall be for for computational energy sciences.
 - **Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute:** An amount of \$1.968 million for equipment for the Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute, Morgantown. **An Office of Science grant application should be sent to: Mark A. Cochran, PhD., Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute, One Medical Center Drive, P.O. Box 9301, Morgantown, West Virginia 26506-9301.**
 - **West Virginia University (WVU) Transportable Emissions Testing Laboratory:** An amount of \$984,000 for WVU to continue the WVU Transportable Emissions Testing Laboratory, which is a one-of-a-kind laboratory that tests emissions of alternative fuel vehicle fleets and maintains a national database of this information. **A grant application should be sent to: Ms. Mary Bowman, West Virginia University Research Corporation, 886 Chestnut Ridge Road, Suite 208, Morgantown, West Virginia 26506.**

- **WVU Lightweight Composite Materials for Heavy-Duty Vehicles program:** An amount of \$492,000 for WVU to continue the WVU Lightweight Composite Materials for Heavy-Duty Vehicles program. Through this program, WVU is involved with design, production, and testing issues related to using metal and polymer composites as substitutes for heavier materials in large trucks and trailers. The use of such composites reduces the vehicle's weight, allowing for larger payloads to be carried while remaining under the load limit on highways. **A grant application should be sent to: Ms. Mary Bowman, West Virginia University Research Corporation, 886 Chestnut Ridge Road, Suite 208, Morgantown, West Virginia 26506.**
- **WVU Long-Term Environmental and Economic Impacts of the Development of a Coal Liquefaction Plant in China program:** An amount of \$344,400 for WVU to continue the WVU Long-Term Environmental and Economic Impacts of the Development of a Coal Liquefaction Plant in China program, which is enabling WVU to access significant data on innovative combination and liquefaction technologies being deployed in China that will allow the U.S. to better pursue coals to liquid transportation fuels projects. **A grant application should be sent to: Ms. Mary Bowman, West Virginia University Research Corporation, 886 Chestnut Ridge Road, Suite 208, Morgantown, West Virginia 26506**
- **Clean Energy Technology Exports Initiative:** An amount of \$594,540 to the DOE Clean Energy Technology Exports Initiative that was established in FY 2001. This initiative seeks to increase opportunities to open and expand international energy markets and export U.S. clean energy technologies which are very important to helping achieve national and international security, economic, trade, environmental, and climate change objectives.



Dear Secretary Bodman:

I understand you recently received correspondence from Members of Congress who disagree with the Administration's policy of making it a priority to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). I disagree with their suggestion to discontinue filling the SPR since it would have virtually no effect on oil and energy prices. It is vital to our economic and national security that we expand the SPR to serve as an emergency supply of crude oil in case of a major supply disruption. The SPR must be available to protect Americans in case of a true emergency, such as when the SPR was tapped after Hurricane Katrina struck the Gulf Coast in 2005. We must be prepared or face a national security risk that is an even higher price to pay resulting in scarcity of supply and higher energy prices when a major disruption occurs.

I am very concerned about the high energy and gas prices that Americans are facing today. However no longer filling the SPR and taking away from our emergency reserve supply is not the answer. We need a short-term solution that has long-term protection against oil supply disruptions. Best utilizing our existing oil and gas infrastructure to increase domestic production would increase supply and lower energy prices. Producing more energy at home would not only reduce our energy prices, but enhance our national security by reducing our reliance on foreign energy sources.


In addition, concern to reduce our dependence on foreign sources should compel the responsible exploration of resources here in our own backyard, especially off a state's own coast. For years, Gulf States have provided the infrastructure for oil and gas production, which supports the energy needs for the vast majority of our nation. We need to take advantage of the clean, safe domestic energy right here in the U.S. and work toward expanding domestic production and providing more access to Outer Continental Shelf resources.

While I appreciate the need for alternative energy sources as an important long term goal, we cannot transform our nation's energy infrastructure and use alternative and renewable fuels overnight. I am disappointed the recently passed energy bill is virtually silent on oil and gas domestic production. With rising energy prices and increasing dependence on volatile foreign energy sources, we must allow for additional production of oil and gas right here in America—where we are safe, provide employment opportunities and are sensitive to environmental concerns. Unfortunately, the energy bill does nothing to provide short-term relief from high energy prices. Rather than opening new areas to production and attempting to provide some assurances of the economic stability of recovering domestic resources, the energy bill increases

our dependence on foreign energy **sources**. Rather **than giving states the** option to host offshore production, **the energy bill does** not allow **U.S.** production to grow with demand, Even the best efficiency and conservation efforts must be complemented with additional domestic production in the short-term.

I look forward to continuing this discussion with you and **developing a stronger** national energy policy that will provide short-term relief and **strengthen our economic, energy and national security.**



When Congress passed the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (EPAAct), it included language to ensure that future oil acquisitions for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) make fiscal sense for taxpayers. Specifically, Section 301(e)(2)(A) of EPAAct directed the Secretary of Energy to acquire petroleum for the SPR in a manner which "minimize[s] the costs to the Department of the Interior and the Department of Energy in acquiring such petroleum products (including foregone revenues to the Treasury when petroleum products for the SPR are obtained through the royalty-in-kind program)."

Keeping with that goal today, in the face of oil prices of \$100 per barrel, would seem to require the Department of Energy (DOE) to eliminate in-kind transfers of oil and accept cash royalty payments. For existing contracts where prices are expected to be lower than current prices, EPAAct appears to require that the Secretary of Energy defer deliveries of the originally scheduled barrels and accept deliveries at a future date for the original amount plus a premium.

In its Final Rule for establishing procedures for the acquisition of petroleum for the SPR,¹ DOE rejected recommendations that DOE should establish procedures to acquire oil for the SPR when prices are low, such as a "trigger price" for acquiring oil to fill the SPR. DOE rejected such comments, stating that "such trigger mechanisms do not always reflect the true state of petroleum markets, . . . DOE prefers to retain the flexibility to achieve the statutory objectives through the management of acquisition activities only after a careful review of a number of market indicators."

I question whether the administration's plan to increase its deposits to the reserve by 20,000 barrels per day—set to begin this month despite record oil prices—is at odds with the cost-minimization requirement in the statute. I ask that you release the internal economic analysis supporting the agency's decision to push ahead with filling the SPR at this time. Additionally, I ask you release the economic analysis conducted during the promulgation of the final rule. In particular, please release any analysis regarding the trigger mechanisms that shows why such a mechanism, which would either prohibit DOE

We write to urge you to direct the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to temporarily suspend purchases of oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). This action would allow more oil to remain on the market, driving down gas prices for consumers by as much as \$.25 a gallon. This action would provide a short-term stimulus, without requiring Congressional approval, saving consumers money at the pump while also saving taxpayer dollars.

Our country is clearly in danger of recession. Unemployment is up, retail sales are slowing, housing prices continue to slide, and consumers and lenders alike continue to suffer the fallout from the sub-prime mortgage crisis. Average families are feeling the effects more painfully than ever as they experience the worst inflation in 17 years, largely due to rising food and fuel prices. Although the economic stimulus package recently passed by a bipartisan Congress is an important step towards reviving our lagging economy, high gas prices are and will continue to be a drag on the budgets of families and businesses across the country.

Currently the SPR is 95 percent full with 695 million gallons in reserve, approximately the same level it was in August of 2005 when your Administration successfully used a temporary suspension to relieve supply and price crunches following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. The situation is even more dire today for consumers, however, as gas prices have skyrocketed more than 70 cents in the last year alone. Suspending the SPR fill could provide the type of immediate, targeted relief that we need right now.


Because DOE has only recently signed the contract for 12.3 million barrels of oil to be delivered to the SPR over the next six months, suspending these shipments is a simple step your Administration can take immediately to lower gas prices, put money directly into the wallets of Americans, and save taxpayer dollars. In addition, the Congressional Budget Office has found that every \$10 reduction in the price of a barrel of oil has a \$50 billion stimulative effect on the economy. Additionally, selling this oil on the market rather than putting it into the SPR will earn the federal government about \$6 million per day, or \$1 billion over the course of six months.

Although we recognize this action should not be taken as a means of reducing prices in the long run, at a time when the SPR is already 95 percent full, acting now can have temporary benefits that would go a long way towards helping American families who are being squeezed, and also stimulate the economy. We urge you to take this important step.

During the House Committee on Energy and Commerce's hearing to discuss the FY 2009 Department of Energy (DOE) Budget on February 7, 2008, Secretary Samuel Bodman, under questioning from Representatives John Shimkus and Jan Schakowsky, admitted he made a mistake when he wrote to members of the Illinois Delegation on November 30, 2007, indicating that the FutureGen Project was moving forward as planned.

Secretary Bodman's message that DOE was "diligently working to complete the process and issue the Record of Decision in a timeframe that supports FutureGen site selection by the end of December 2007," while encouraging at the time, did nothing but create false hope for the communities involved in this project. Less than three weeks later, after Mattoon, Illinois was selected as the best site for FutureGen, he decided to pull the plug on this important investment which you first proposed back in 2003.


In addition, it was revealed earlier last week that DOE Undersecretary C.H. "Bud" Albright made a disparaging comment about our state. The remark, that DOE wasn't interested in "building Disneyland in some swamp in Illinois," only added insult to injury after citizens in Illinois learned that their government no longer backed this project. While we understand that Mr. Albright apologized, the poor handling of DOE's decision on FutureGen and the insensitive comments about Illinois cannot be forgotten just because he said he was sorry.


Mr. President, the communities and states that competed for this project expended thousands of hours and untold sums of money in good faith that the Administration's commitment to this scientifically worthy project would be fulfilled. Please do not allow their work, and this opportunity, to be wasted.


The demonstrated missteps by DOE's highest representatives further beg for a reconsideration of their misplaced decision to abandon FutureGen. There is an urgent need to develop near-zero emissions coal technologies and FutureGen is ahead of any other project involving carbon capture and sequestration. Under this new proposed approach, there are no guarantees that project costs will not skyrocket and starting from scratch will delay this process even further, which we feel is not in the best interest of the country's energy future.



Dear Mr. President:

We write to urge you to direct the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to temporarily suspend purchases of oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). According to independent industry analysts, including Goldman Sachs, this action would allow more oil to remain on the market, and thus drive down gas prices for consumers by as much as \$.25 a gallon. This action would provide the American economy a critical short-term stimulus, without requiring Congressional approval. It will save consumers money at the pump, give small business desperately needed relief, and help state and local government provide energy related services.

Our country is clearly showing indicators of a recession. Unemployment is up, retail sales are slowing, housing prices continue to slide, and consumers continue to suffer the fallout from the sub-prime mortgage crisis. Average families are feeling the effects more painfully than ever as they experience the worst inflation in 17 years, largely due to rising food and fuel prices. Although the economic stimulus package recently passed by a bipartisan Congress is an important step towards reviving our lagging economy, high gas and heating oil prices threaten to smother the benefits of the stimulus rebates as families struggle to fill up their cars and pay their electricity and fuel bills.


Currently the SPR is 95 percent full with 695 million gallons in reserve, approximately the same level it was in August of 2005 when your Administration successfully used a temporary suspension to relieve supply and price crunches following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. The situation is even more dire today for consumers, as gas prices have skyrocketed more than 70 cents in the last year alone. The price of diesel fuel has now hit \$4.00 per gallon in many parts of the country, which will ripple through the price of food and goods that are transported by rail and trucks. Suspending the SPR fill could provide the type of immediate, targeted relief that we need right now.


Because DOE has only recently signed the contract for 12.3 million barrels of oil to be delivered to the SPR over the next six months, suspending these shipments is a simple step your Administration can take immediately to lower gas prices, put money directly into the wallets of Americans, and save taxpayer dollars. In addition, the Congressional Budget Office has found that every \$10 reduction in the price of a barrel of oil has a \$50 billion stimulative effect on the economy. Additionally, selling this oil on the market rather than putting it into the SPR will earn the federal government about \$6 million per day, or \$1 billion over the course of six months.

Although we recognize this action should not be taken as a means of reducing prices in the long run, at a time when the SPR is already 95 percent full, acting now can have temporary benefits that would go a long way towards helping American families who are being squeezed, and also stimulate the economy. We urge you to take this important step.

Dear Mr. President:

Right now — today — our nation is reeling from the impact of an energy crisis on a U.S. economy already in or on the verge of recession. Retail sales are down. Unemployment is up. Home sales are down. Mortgage foreclosures are at an historic high, and the Federal Reserve intervened last week to keep Wall Street giant Bear Stearns from potential catastrophe.

Add to this the highest fuel prices in history, now more than \$110 a barrel for crude oil and an average price at the pump of more than \$3.30 a gallon for regular gas, and the impact on a petroleum-fueled economy is devastating.

I met last weekend with officials of Aloha Airlines in Honolulu, trying to find a way for one of Hawaii's leading corporate citizens, with 3,400 employees, to buy time to restructure debt and stay in business. Tragically, Aloha decided late Sunday to halt 61 years of air passenger service for the people of Hawaii. After attempting to fight off unregulated predatory pricing for two years, a \$71 million increase in the cost of jet fuel pushed them over the edge. One thousand nine hundred people lost their jobs today.

Aloha is not alone in being battered by this energy crisis. Other airlines are being forced to raise ticket prices or add as much as a \$50 surcharge for fuel. According to the Air Transport Association (ATA), every penny increase in the price of a gallon of jet fuel means \$190 million in annual fuel costs for U.S. Airlines — 20 to 30% of their total operating expense. As you may be aware, ATA has today called on Secretary of Energy Samuel Bodman to authorize releases from the nation's home heating oil reserves to help increase the supply of jet fuel.

The emergency, however, extends far beyond the airline industry. The effects of soaring fuel costs are rippling out through the economy. Oil and refined products fuel almost 97% of our nation's transportation: automobiles, trucks, trains, and ships, as well as aircraft. This is how our nation moves people and goods.

Fuel cost represents as much as 25% of total operating expenses for the nation's motor carriers, second only to drivers' wages. Transport companies and independent truckers across the country are facing the prospect of parking their trucks because they simply cannot afford to buy diesel fuel. One operator reported costs of nearly \$900 to fill up his rig. The impact of rising fuel costs on transport obviously means increasing costs for consumer goods. We are already seeing this in food prices and retail prices.

Organizations like the United States Postal Service and private sector delivery companies have no choice but to keep buying fuel for their delivery vehicles, no matter the cost. And that cost will be passed along to businesses, and ultimately, to consumers. Even as an independent government agency, the Postal Service cannot sustain such devastating cost increases for long without increasing rates.

Oil and natural gas are raw materials in more than 95% of manufacturing: plastics, medicines, machinery and all kinds of consumer goods. Energy is the third largest manufacturing cost for the forest and paper industry.

Mr. President, the instability of oil prices will continue to ripple through our economy. We are, quite clearly, in the midst of an energy emergency.

I am therefore requesting that you authorize a temporary release of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve for the airline and cargo shipping industries. The average cost of crude in the reserve is approximately \$27 per barrel. If a quantity of this oil can be released to the market and refined at lower cost than the current market-priced crude, it could generate a temporary supply of lower priced gasoline, diesel fuel and jet fuel for those industries that are totally dependent on fuel, and on which the U.S. economy is totally dependent.

Under the Energy Policy and Conservation Act of 1975, draw-downs from the Reserve are authorized if the President determines that there is a "severe energy supply interruption;" if that interruption has caused a severe increase in the price of petroleum products; and if such prices are likely to cause a major adverse impact on the national economy."

This step offers the prospect of temporary relief, and should not be seen by anyone as a long-term solution to the national energy emergency. But it may serve as an alarm to the American public that substantial and serious measures must be taken immediately to prevent further, even permanent, damage to the U.S. economy. It

should also be the first substantive action by the Government of the United States to address the energy and economic crisis.

Mr. President, I believe those conditions which allow for a release from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve now exist, and I urgently request prompt action.

We write to express our support for FutureGen, as it represents a vital investment in our country's energy future. With its vast coal resources, Illinois is an ideal location for FutureGen and we believe this initiative should move forward as originally envisioned.

When you announced that the United States would sponsor a 10-year demonstration project to create the world's first coal-based, zero-emissions power plant to produce electricity and hydrogen in February of 2003, this represented a bold step toward a more pollution-free energy future. As you are well aware, FutureGen has the potential to demonstrate high efficiency capture and storage of greenhouse gases, thus paving the way for the United States to use its 250-year supply of coal for energy in an environmentally sensitive way.

FutureGen's technologies will benefit the entire world. Australia, India, China and South Korea have joined us in this effort through the United States Department of Energy's (DOE) FutureGen International Partnership. 


Thank you for your letter to President Bush requesting that the Department of Energy (DOE) suspend the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR).

President Bush and I appreciate and share your concern about the current high price of oil, and the effect high prices have on consumers and the economy. This concern was a key consideration in my recent decision not to award additional contracts this year for the fill of the SPR through the royalty-in-kind (RIK) exchange program.

The President recently signed into law Public Law 110-232, which calls for suspending SPR fill activities through the end of the year and deferring to the maximum extent practicable any already scheduled shipments of oil for the SPR. Suspension of SPR fill activities through the RIK program will stop the relatively modest planned fill rate of 76,000 barrels a day (compared to world consumption of 85 million barrels of oil a day) through December 2008.

While we believe it appropriate to suspend SPR fill activities right now, temporarily suspending deliveries of RIK oil to the SPR will not have a substantial or lasting effect on world oil prices, as I believe that supply and demand fundamentals provide the primary explanation for recent oil price trends. The main fundamental factors are strong world economic growth leading to increased demand, moderate growth in supply outside of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), OPEC members' production decisions, low OPEC spare production capacity, low world inventories, worldwide refining bottlenecks, and ongoing geopolitical risks.


The SPR currently contains approximately 704 million barrels of crude oil, providing roughly 58 days of import protection, which will increase to about 60 days when the SPR is filled to its 727 million barrel capacity. Approximately 62,000 barrels per day are being placed in the SPR from existing contracts; DOE has negotiated deferral of approximately 2.1 million barrels of the remaining scheduled deliveries of oil to the SPR in accordance with provisions of P.L. 110-



232. Notably, the Energy Policy Act of 2005 directed that the SPR be filled to its authorized size of one billion barrels. We remain steadfast in our belief that filling the SPR is fundamental to increasing the Nation's energy security, as our growing economy necessitates increasing the protection provided by the SPR.

Oil and refined products fuel almost 97% of our nation's transportation: automobiles, trucks, trains, and ships, as well as aircraft. This is how our nation moves people and goods.

Fuel cost represents as much as 25% of total operating expenses for the nation's motor carriers, second only to drivers' wages. Transport companies and independent truckers across the country are facing the prospect of parking their trucks because they simply cannot afford to buy diesel fuel. One operator reported costs of nearly \$900 to fill up his rig. The impact of rising fuel costs on transport obviously means increasing costs for consumer goods. We are already seeing this in food prices and retail prices.

Organizations like the United States Postal Service and private sector delivery companies have no choice but to keep buying fuel for their delivery vehicles, no matter the cost. And that cost will be passed along to businesses, and ultimately, to consumers. Even as an independent government agency, the Postal Service cannot sustain such devastating cost increases for long without increasing rates.

Oil and natural gas are raw materials in more than 95% of manufacturing: plastics, medicines, machinery and all kinds of consumer goods. Energy is the third largest manufacturing cost for the forest and paper industry.

Mr. President, the instability of oil prices will continue to ripple through our economy. We are, quite clearly, in the midst of an energy emergency.


I am therefore requesting that you authorize a temporary release of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve for the airline and cargo shipping industries. The average cost of crude in the reserve is approximately \$27 per barrel. If a quantity of this oil can be released to the market and refined at lower cost than the current market-priced crude, it could generate a temporary supply of lower priced gasoline, diesel fuel and jet fuel for those industries that are totally dependent on fuel, and on which the U.S. economy is totally dependent.

Under the Energy Policy and Conservation Act of 1975, draw-downs from the Reserve are authorized if the President determines that there is a "severe energy supply interruption;" if that interruption has caused a severe increase in the price of petroleum products; and if such prices are likely to cause a major adverse impact on the national economy."

This step offers the prospect of temporary relief, and should not be seen by anyone as a long-term solution to the national energy emergency. But it may serve as an alarm to the American public that substantial and serious measures must be taken immediately to prevent further, even permanent, damage to the U.S. economy. It

should also be the first substantive action by the Government of the United States to address the energy and economic crisis.

Mr. President, I believe those conditions which allow for a release from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve now exist, and I urgently request prompt action.

Dear President Bush,

With gas prices at a record high, and the nation's economy facing an economic downturn, immediate action must be taken to bring relief to the American people. As I travel throughout my Congressional District, the issue of rising fuel prices is a top concern for families, seniors, small businesses, and farmers alike. It is with that in mind that I write to respectfully request that you direct the United States Department of Energy to drawdown the Strategic Petroleum Reserve by two and a half million barrels of oil per month over the next six months, while suspending future purchases for the same time period in an effort to bring immediate relief to Americans struggling with high fuel costs and financial insecurity. These two actions would keep more oil in the market and bring down fuel costs to save consumers money at the pump and provide desperately needed relief to our small businesses and farmers.

Millions of Americans will soon receive an economic stimulus rebate, an effort passed by this body, which you supported, but with national average gas price now at nearly \$3.29 a gallon, the highest recorded average according to AAA Daily Fuel Gauge Report, this stimulus will have a limited effect on relieving the economic strains facing the American people.

Independent industry analysis, including from Goldman Sachs, has estimated that the simple act of temporarily suspending future purchases could reduce prices at the pump by as much as twenty-five cents a gallon. The drawdown of an additional fifteen million barrels of oil from the SPR into the market would have a larger impact and bring immediate relief during the summer months, where estimates have national average gas prices at a stifling \$4.00 a gallon.

Understanding that this effort would provide only short-term relief and is not a long-term solution to our energy security, the benefits of a minimal drawdown and suspension over the next six months would have an enormous impact on our economy. The Congressional Budget Office has found that for every \$10 reduction in the price of a barrel of oil there is a \$50 billion stimulative effect on the economy at a time when we desperately need it.

I thank you for your attention to this important request and urge you to take immediate action to bring relief to the American people. Inaction could have disastrous, long-term effects on our nation's economy, and the American people's confidence in their government.

Thank you for your letter to President Bush requesting that the Department of Energy (DOE) address current high oil prices by suspending the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) and releasing oil from the Reserve.

President Bush and I appreciate and share your concern about the current high price of oil, and the effect high prices have on consumers and the economy. This concern was a key consideration in my recent decision not to award additional contracts this year for the fill of the SPR through the royalty-in-kind (RIK) exchange program.

The President recently signed into law Public Law 110-232, which calls for suspending SPR fill activities through the end of the year and deferring to the maximum extent practicable any already scheduled shipments of oil for the SPR. Suspension of SPR fill activities through the RIK program will stop the relatively modest planned fill rate of 76,000 barrels a day (compared to world consumption of 85 million barrels of oil a day) through December 2008.

While we believe it appropriate to suspend SPR fill activities right now, temporarily suspending deliveries of RIK oil to the SPR will not have a substantial or lasting effect on world oil prices, as I believe that supply and demand fundamentals provide the primary explanation for recent oil price trends. The main fundamental factors are strong world economic growth leading to increased demand, moderate growth in supply outside of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), OPEC members' production decisions, low OPEC spare production capacity, low world inventories, worldwide refining bottlenecks, and ongoing geopolitical risks.

The SPR currently contains approximately 704 million barrels of crude oil, providing roughly 58 days of import protection, which will increase to about 60 days when the SPR is filled to its 727 million barrel capacity. Approximately



62,000 barrels per day are being placed in the SPR from existing contracts; DOE has negotiated to defer approximately 2.1 million barrels of the remaining scheduled deliveries of oil to the SPR in accordance with provisions of P.L. 110-232. Notably, the Energy Policy Act of 2005 directed that the SPR be filled to its authorized size of one billion barrels. We remain steadfast in our belief that filling the SPR is fundamental to increasing the Nation's energy security, as our growing economy necessitates increasing the protection provided by the SPR.

With respect to your request that oil be released from the SPR, we believe the current situation does not meet the criteria for a drawdown and sale of oil from the SPR. Oil from the SPR may only be withdrawn and sold in the event of a Presidentially-declared severe energy supply interruption. The Administration has been very clear that it will not use the SPR for the purpose of manipulating oil prices. Because a severe energy supply interruption does not exist at this time, the requirements for a drawdown and sale of oil from the SPR have not been met. We will continue to monitor the situation and will assess any future developments.





Today, oil and gas price each hit new record levels. The price of oil traded above \$112 dollars on the New York Mercantile Exchange and the price of gas has now risen to a nationwide average above \$3.34 per gallon. With the summer driving season approaching, American consumers are in desperate need of relief.

Yesterday, the Department of Energy's Energy Information Administration (EIA) released its *Short-Term* Energy and Summer Fuels Outlook, which paints a bleak picture for consumers this summer. The EIA report projects that gas prices could rise above \$4 this summer, with prices expected to average \$3.54 over the summer months, and a peak, monthly-average of more than \$3.60 in June.


The poorest 20 percent of Americans make less than \$20,000 a year. According to the Department of Transportation, the average American drives nearly 12,000 miles a year and uses 594 gallons of gas. At current gas prices, that means that the poorest 20 percent of households are, on average, spending nearly 10 percent of their gross yearly income to purchase gasoline. We must take immediate action to help consumers who are facing these record prices.


Right now, the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) currently holds approximately 700.9 million barrels of oil and is filled to 96 percent of its capacity. On Friday, the Department of Energy announced that it was going to continue filling the SPR and would solicit bids for 13 million barrels of additional oil. Purchasing oil at these current record prices to continue filling the SPR makes no sense. Furthermore, we should be acting to provide relief to consumers from high energy prices, not exacerbating runaway oil speculation by continuing to take oil off the market.



I am writing to request that you direct the United States Department of Energy (DOE) to suspend shipments of oil to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). This action would allow more oil to remain on the market, thereby reducing the cost of oil and oil-based products, such as gasoline and diesel fuel. According to industry analysts, suspending shipments of oil to the SPR could reduce gas prices by as much as 25 cents per gallon. This price relief is urgently needed by consumers, small businesses, and local governments.

In recent weeks, the cost of oil and gas have reached record highs with the price of a barrel of oil going above \$110 and the average price of a gallon of gas reaching \$3.33. Additionally, in many areas of the country, the price of diesel fuel has now hit \$4.00 per gallon. These record prices are negatively impacting nearly every aspect of our economy.

I recognize the strategic importance of the SPR and do not believe that suspending shipments to it should be used as a means of addressing long-term oil and gas prices. However, with the cost of oil and gas reaching record highs and our economy showing troubling signs, I believe that a suspension of these shipments could provide the immediate relief necessary to help consumers and the economy. Furthermore, not addressing the skyrocketing cost of oil and gas could impede the effect of the recently passed economic stimulus package.

Since the SPR's inception in 1978, the suspension of oil shipments has been used many times to successfully address rising oil prices and limited oil supply. Most recently, shipments to the SPR were suspended in August 2005 in response to Hurricanes Rita and Katrina. Currently, the SPR contains 695 million barrels of oil and is at 95 percent capacity. This is approximately the same level of capacity as when shipments were suspended in August 2005.

Again, I urge you to provide relief from the high cost of oil and gas to consumers, small businesses, and local governments by temporarily suspending shipments of oil to the SPR. Thank you for your consideration of this request.





Dear Mr. President,

Americans are stretched thin by rising gas prices already at record highs, and, with the summer driving season approaching, Congress and the Administration should act right away to help American families feeling the squeeze at the pump. The time to act is now. When families pay more for gas, they spend less at the movies, shopping malls, and everywhere else. When diesel costs near \$4 a gallon in the United States, it does more than force truckers to slow down; it also makes them angry.

I respectfully suggest that you direct the Department of Energy temporarily suspend purchases of oil replacement to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. Temporarily suspending Strategic Petroleum Reserve purchases will not only send a signal to oil speculators, it could provide the type of immediate, targeted relief that we need right now. While I recognize that this suggestion is a short-term approach, you and I have supported legislation which would require better mileage standards and more access to biofuels, and both would slow demand for gasoline in the long term.

It is my understanding that the Strategic Petroleum Reserve is 95 percent full with 695 million barrels in reserve, approximately the same level it was in August of 2005, when your Administration successfully used a temporary suspension to relieve supply and price crunches following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Recently, the Department of Energy announced that it was going to continue filling the Strategic Petroleum Reserve and would solicit bids for 13 million barrels of additional oil, thereby providing no relief for consumers.

The current situation is dire for families, small businesses, and farmers in the 12th District of Georgia and across the country. Gasoline prices have skyrocketed more than 70 cents in the last year alone, and, as we approach the summer driving season, consumers will certainly see even higher prices in the coming months. The Department of Energy projects that, even if there is no change in the price of oil, gasoline prices typically

increase 10-20 cents in the summer months because of increased demand. America should never be held hostage to punishing gasoline and diesel prices, and our families and the nation's economy would be damaged in the long term if relief does not arrive soon.

Thank you for your attention to this important request.

I am greatly concerned about recent attacks targeting oil transports and production facilities around the world. This week, several attacks overseas have triggered alarming new highs in the price of oil. As you know, a Japanese oil tanker was damaged on April 22, 2008 following a rocket attack near the coast of Yemen, and in Nigeria, militants have continued their attacks on the country's crude production facilities. Oil producers in the region have announced production losses of nearly 170,000 barrels of oil a day as a result.


Due to these events and other factors, the price of crude oil rose above \$119 a barrel, elevating the average price per gallon of unleaded gasoline to over \$3.50, and \$4.20 for diesel fuel. With the summer driving season just around the corner, your administration now predicts that the price of unleaded gasoline will exceed "the \$4 per gallon threshold." Further increases in the price of fuel are a disturbing prospect, and American consumers desperately need relief. For this reason, I strongly encourage you to release oil from the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR).

It is clear that attacks such as these have a drastic impact in the current economic environment, where even the slightest disruptions in production have a significant effect on fuel prices. Immediate action is necessary to help stabilize current energy prices and alleviate these short term production losses.

As you know, the Energy Policy and Conservation Act Amendments of 1990 provides the Executive Branch the authority to use the SPR if a particular circumstance "constitutes, or is likely to become a domestic or international energy supply shortage of significant scope or duration" and where "action taken...would assist directly and significantly in preventing or reducing the adverse impact of such shortage." Congress eased restrictions governing the use of the SPR to give the Executive Branch greater flexibility to draw reserves without having to declare the existence of a "severe energy supply interruption."

I encourage you to act swiftly to provide relief for American consumers as the situation continues to deteriorate and our economy suffers.

The price of oil set yet another record this week at \$119.90 per barrel. At the same time, the nationwide price of gas has risen to a new record of \$3.533 per gallon. Rising fuel costs are an issue of universal concern to Americans across the country.

With talk of a recession, record rates of foreclosure, and a March jobs report that we lost 80,000 jobs that month, the unrelenting rise in gasoline prices is one more burden on working families struggling to make ends meet. With the summer driving season expected to push prices at the pump over \$4.00 per gallon according to Department of Energy data, we must take steps to relieve this strain on the American people.

Independent industry estimates suggest that prices at the pump could be reduced by twenty-five cents per gallon solely through the act of temporarily suspending the additional purchase of oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). Purchasing oil at these record prices for the purpose of storing it makes no sense, and only exacerbates high prices by taking critical oil supply off the market.

As you know, the SPR was established in the aftermath of the 1970s oil shortages to be our nation's backstop in future energy crises. Currently, the SPR is at 96 percent capacity, back to pre-Hurricane Katrina levels. With inflation-adjusted prices today higher than the 1970s records, the time has come to release oil from the SPR. I respectfully urge you to direct the Department of Energy to immediately release 20 million barrels of oil from the SPR to the market and to temporarily suspend the purchase of oil for the SPR. The Congressional Budget Office has determined that for every \$10 decrease in the price of a barrel of oil there is a \$50 billion stimulative effect on the U.S. economy. With the economy struggling, this stimulative effect should not be ignored.

I thank you for your attention on this critical matter, and hope that, as with the economic stimulus package earlier this year, we can work together to bring relief to the American people.

We write today to request that the U.S. Department of Energy (DoE) immediately halt deposits of domestic crude oil into the U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). As we enter the busiest driving season of the year, the price of a barrel of West Texas Intermediate crude oil hovers around a record \$120.


The SPR was established in 1975 to provide a supply of crude oil during times of severe supply disruptions. Today, the SPR contains more than 701 million barrels of oil, exceeding our International Energy Program commitments to maintain at least 90 days of oil stocks in reserve.


High energy prices are having a ripple effect throughout the U.S. economy and exacerbating recessionary pressures. The Energy Information Agency reports that supplies and inventories of crude oil and refined products are above 2007 inventories while our demand for gasoline is down. Yet, the price of crude oil has skyrocketed 100% from last year's levels which were just above \$63 a barrel in April, 2007. Despite these economic realities, the DoE recently solicited contracts to exchange up to 13 million barrels of royalty oil from Federal leases in the Gulf of Mexico for deposits in the SPR.

Some analysts blame geopolitical instability and disruption in production for the rapid price increases; however, these factors alone do not explain the extraordinary increase in oil prices compared to previous years, when these same challenges were present. Temporarily halting deposits to the reserve can provide some relief because the increased supply of oil available for refinement will send the right signal to all markets that the U.S. Government will take measures necessary to address exorbitant crude oil prices that negatively affect the global economy. We believe, in light of the dramatic increase in oil prices, a temporary halt to deposits into the SPR should be considered until the economy stabilizes.

I appreciate your attention to this matter and look forward to hearing back from you.

Americans currently face record-breaking energy prices. Today, with the price of oil above \$126 per barrel and regular gas prices around the country averaging \$3.72 per gallon, it is time to consider what measures can be taken to provide immediate relief to American consumers. Temporarily halting the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) would help relieve some of the upward pressure on prices that is being created by the Administration taking oil off the market.

The Administration is currently filling the SPR at a rate of 70,000 barrels per day and according to an announcement made on April 4, 2008, the Department of Energy is currently soliciting bids to purchase an additional 13 million barrels of oil this year for the SPR, increasing the fill rate to 76,000 barrels per day. According to the schedule outlined in that release, the bids for the purchase of that oil are due today and your Department has said that it plans to finalize those contracts as early as tomorrow.

The Energy Policy Act of 2005 requires you to fill the SPR "as expeditiously as possible, without incurring excessive cost or appreciably affecting the price of petroleum products to consumers." With the price of oil above \$126 per barrel, removing 70,000 barrels a day from the market to fill the reserve is both incurring excessive costs for taxpayers and affecting oil and gas prices for consumers.

I am writing to inform you that today, both the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate will consider and are expected to pass legislation that would temporarily halt the fill of SPR for the remainder of 2008 as long as oil prices stay above \$75 per barrel. With Congressional action imminent, it would be recklessly irresponsible for your Department to enter into any further contracts to purchase oil to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve in 2008 while prices remain high. The Department should not take actions that would be harmful to taxpayers, damaging to consumers, or inconsistent with the bills pending before the Congress.

I write to urge you to rescind the solicitation of bids to add more oil per day to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). It has come to my attention that the Administration is poised to add 13 million barrels to the SPR when current contracts expire, resulting in an increase to the SPR of 6,000 barrels per day (to 76,000 barrels per day). It is my understanding that these increased deliveries will be made from August-December, 2008.

Our economy is stagnant. The price of a barrel of crude oil stands at \$114 per barrel; the price in May, 2007, was just under \$60 per barrel. The nationwide average price for a gallon of gasoline is \$3.62, an increase of \$.63 cents from a year ago. Food prices are skyrocketing, energy costs are increasing, producer prices are increasing and consumer confidence is low. Housing foreclosures are continuing and credit is tight.

Therefore, I question the necessity and timing of these new and increased deliveries to the SPR. The SPR has more than 700 million barrels in it, the highest level since before the Gulf Coast hurricanes. August is peak summer driving season and the early fall is when increased cargo for the holiday season is transported. Truckers are already paying high fuel costs, which has a ripple effect throughout the economy as the cost to transport goods increases.

I know that your Administration has thus far refused to divert oil from the SPR. However, actually increasing deliveries to the SPR is even more counter-productive, given the current state of our economy. I ask that you immediately suspend the solicitation and forego any increase to the SPR at this time.

I write to urge you to direct the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to temporarily suspend purchases of oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR). This action would provide the American economy a critical short-term stimulus, without requiring Congressional approval.

Currently the SPR is 95 percent full with 695 million gallons in reserve. In August 2005, your Administration successfully used a temporary suspension to relieve rising fuel prices following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Consumers are facing an equally difficult situation today, as gas prices have skyrocketed more than 70 cents per gallon in the last year alone.

Rising costs are a serious concern in my home state of New Hampshire, particularly as we approach the summer driving season. Yesterday, gas prices in New Hampshire hit a new record high of \$3.23 and the cost of a barrel of oil rose to \$115 per barrel. Taking action now will provide consumers with needed savings that they can spend on other necessities, as well as improve the Granite State's tourism economy during the upcoming summer season.

The SPR is scheduled to receive 12.3 million barrels of oil over the next six months. Allowing this oil to enter the market rather than putting it into the SPR will drive down the price of gasoline and save the federal government about \$1 billion over the course of six months.

If you do not act quickly and decisively, American families will be struggling with record high gas prices this summer, further hurting our already fragile economy.

With the SPR almost completely full and consumers facing soaring fuel costs, suspending shipments to the SPR will provide relief at the pump and stimulate our economy. Again, I implore you to take quick and decisive action to provide relief to working, middle class families

I write today to urge you to take action to help relieve the pressure on the American people caused by soaring fuel prices. While I believe our country needs a comprehensive approach to address energy costs over the long term – and I have supported initiatives to help reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil – I ask that you temporarily suspend filling the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) as a short-term solution.

This week crude oil prices climbed to \$119 per barrel with no sign of abating. The SPR currently holds over 700 million barrels, which is 96 percent of capacity. In April 2006, when you announced a temporary halt to filling the SPR as part of a program to stem high fuel prices then, the nationwide average price per gallon was \$2.90. According to the American Automobile Association (AAA), the current nationwide average price per gallon for regular unleaded is \$3.55, the highest recorded price by AAA. I believe a temporary suspension could help to increase supply and offer some relief at the pump. Our economy is showing signs of a recession and needs a push in the right direction. Giving American consumers some immediate relief is crucial.

Americans are feeling this pinch not only with high prices at the pump, but in home heating bills and in soaring food costs. Gasoline prices are affecting our nation's businesses and industries that rely on trucks to move goods. The independent trucker is one of the hardest hit. With the cost of diesel now over \$4 a gallon, truckers with a 300-gallon semi could pay over \$1,200 each time they fill up. Every American is paying in some way for these increases.

No one action alone can make our nation energy independent overnight, and that's why it is critical that work begin today on a comprehensive approach for the long term. I urge your administration to take action on long-term solutions, including increasing refinery capacity, tapping into domestic sources of energy, supporting research on clean coal technology, investing in the development of alternative and renewable fuels, increasing research and development of biomass and biofuel, increasing accessibility of E85 filling stations, developing the hydrogen economy and promoting energy conservation.

Increasing refinery capacity and production in the U.S. must be a priority. There has not

been a new refinery built in the U.S. in over 30 years. Other priorities must be allowing environmentally responsible exploration in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and on the outer continental shelf as well as developing domestic crude resources in oil shale – all critical to curbing U.S. dependence on foreign oil and to lowering the price at the pump.

There is another concern I must raise which I believe could be artificially inflating the price of crude oil. I have become concerned about unregulated oil commodity futures trading and a recent Washington Post article underscored that concern, reporting that "some economists say the price of oil today should be slightly higher than the cost of finding and producing a new barrel of oil. If that were the case, the price might be about \$60 a barrel." An increasing amount of oil commodity trading is happening in off-market deals known as "over-the-counter" (OTC) trading. It is estimated that up to 50 percent of all energy trades are over-the-counter, without any regulation or oversight by the federal government. Without effective oversight, we don't know if energy speculators are trading on market realities or speculation based on fear and greed at the expense of hard-working Americans paying at the pump. We must end that practice and bring regulation to OTC trading.

Again, I urge your administration to take immediate steps to halt the filling of the SPR to provide relief today at the pump for American consumers and to work for long-term solutions that can provide energy independence for our country.

● Methane Poses Climate Risk, Energy Opportunity

Methane reserves deep in the ocean and in arctic permafrost might trigger runaway global warming. But they've also got the potential to provide huge amounts of power, a possibility that is attracting the interest of energy companies.

Methane hydrate, a strange form of natural gas, has recently become a fascination for energy-hungry nations from the United States to Japan and India. Hydrate is found in oceans across the world, where the gas is trapped in icy structures below the seabed, and also lies beneath the Arctic's permafrost.

A paper published this week in *Nature* suggests that the release of methane hydrates, also known as clathrates, may have triggered a very rapid period of global warming 635 million years ago -- and may do so again. But those same hydrates are also a tempting target for energy production.

"What we've been asked to do is to make this a viable option for the policy makers in the future, and to figure out what's available to us," says Ray Boswell, a researcher with the U.S. Department of Energy's methane hydrates R&D program. "You don't want to find out that you need it, and then find out that you're 30 years down the science and technology curve."

The Gulf of Mexico is estimated to hold more than 6,500 trillion cubic feet of hydrate in sandstone reservoirs, currently the best candidates for commercial exploitation, according to the U.S. Minerals Management Service. If only 5 percent of that hydrate could be tapped, it would yield more than 300 trillion cubic feet of gas. By comparison, the United States' reserve of conventional natural gas is currently estimated at 211 trillion cubic feet.

Researchers romantically call methane hydrates "the fire in the ice," since the frosty chunks burn if you set a match to them. But it's not just romance that's drawing energy companies to the frozen fuel. While methane hydrates have previously been too expensive to extract on a commercial scale, the increasing price of oil -- now more than \$130 per barrel -- means the hydrates might soon become a profitable energy source. Chevron has been involved in the gulf research, and BP is exploring for hydrates in Alaska. Japanese engineers reportedly pumped hydrates from a test well in Canada's Northwest Territories this last winter.

"Everybody knows there's a lot of it," Boswell says. "Now, our goal is to understand the ramifications: Does it have potential as an energy resource, and if so, how would you go about getting it? And how does it fit into climate issues?"

It's that last question that opens up the can of worms: Even as some researchers wonder whether methane hydrate could play an important role in powering the 21st century, others ask whether it has played a critical part in catastrophic climate shifts in the past -- and if it could do so again.

The troubling questions arise from prehistoric climate blips that researchers are still struggling to understand.

The most recent abrupt climate change occurred 55 million years ago during the Eocene greenhouse event, when ice disappeared from the poles and trees grew in Antarctica. From analyzing the fossil record, researchers determined that there were very high levels of methane in the atmosphere at that time.

Some paleoclimate researchers hypothesize that a gradually warming climate brought oceans to a temperature tipping point around 55 million years ago, which caused icy methane hydrate structures to melt and let the gas bubble up to the ocean's surface in a long, enormous burp. Since methane is a more powerful greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide, if it were released into the atmosphere in a huge gush, it may have caused temperatures to spike dramatically.

This theoretical precedent has led to speculation in popular science books that our current bout of man-made global warming could cause another catastrophic methane release. But the dominant scientific paradigm is that methane is more likely to be an issue over the long term.

David Archer is an ocean chemist at the University of Chicago who called methane the "crouching tiger of the carbon cycle" on a respected climate blog.

"It's predicted that with a doubled [carbon dioxide] concentration, the deep ocean could eventually change its temperature by about three degrees," Archer told Wired.com. "Three degrees would eventually get rid of all the methane in the ocean. But at what rate -- that's the question."

After conducting his most recent modeling experiments, Archer says that methane released from the ocean could accelerate global warming over a time frame of thousands of years. But we don't have a serious cause for alarm within our lifetime, he says. Smaller releases of methane hydrate are likely as the Arctic permafrost thaws during this century, "but those are equivalent to a volcano eruption," Archer says. "It's not a doomsday thing."

But the lead author of the new *Nature* paper, Martin Kennedy of the University of California at Riverside, explicitly called a release of methane hydrate "a doomsday scenario for the climate," and called for far more research into methane's role in the world's climate.

While U.S. scientists are proceeding fairly slowly, investigating both the risks and benefits of methane hydrates, other countries are on a faster track.

Japan, South Korea, China and India are all determined to make methane hydrates a viable energy source. India spent \$35 million on a 2006 expedition to explore deposits along its coasts, while South Korea, which currently relies on imported natural gas to fuel most of its power plants, has pledged to start commercial production by 2015.

The world may have found a successor to the gold rush and the oil boom: the methane bubble.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to urge you to direct the Secretary of the Department of Energy (DOE) not to enter into any new contracts to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) during calendar year 2008. Given the record cost of oil and resulting hardship for average Americans, businesses, farmers, and the general economy, it would be imprudent for the Department at this point to obligate itself to new contractual commitments for this period. The concern applies equally to direct purchases of oil from currently tight world markets or to oil obtained through the Federal royalty-in-kind program. Under either approach, the Department's action would effectively remove oil from markets that otherwise could provide additional supply to ease current conditions.

My request is consistent with the authority and responsibilities provided the Secretary under the Energy Policy Act of 2005, which directed the Department to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve to the 1 billion barrel capacity authorized by the Energy Policy and Conservation Act as expeditiously as practicable, without incurring excessive cost or appreciably affecting the price of petroleum products to consumers.

In addition, the Energy Policy Act of 2005 directed that, in making decisions about acquiring petroleum for the Reserve, the Department must take into account and balance several other factors, including the need to avoid adversely affecting current and future prices of oil, and to minimize costs to the Government (including foregone revenues to the Treasury when product is obtained through the royalty-in-kind program).

Mr. President, as you know, oil market prices have attained new record price levels in recent days. Crude oil priced for June delivery has hovered above \$120 per barrel despite rising inventory numbers. Many analysts believe that such prices have much to do with commodity price speculation, rather than near-term market fundamentals. If so, even modest market events,

such as the determination of the U.S. Government to sell, rather than inject into storage, its royalty oil, could potentially prick the speculative bubble. For the U.S. Government to take a "business as usual" attitude in the face of such unprecedented and egregious market conditions could, to the contrary, reinforce the commodity speculators' hypothesis that current pricing reflects instead new market fundamentals that will sustain such prices and reward their speculation.

An Energy Information Administration analysis prepared in connection with Senate testimony by Administrator Guy Caruso in February 2008 indicated that a market impact of "just under \$2 per barrel" would be expected from filling the SPR at a rate of 100,000 barrels per day in 2008, assuming that OPEC nations did not increase production by a matching amount. The actual fill rate since that analysis has been somewhat lower, but the analysis was prepared assuming per barrel oil prices would remain in the mid-\$80 range. It is conceivable that the market effects of such a change in supply might now be greater than \$2 per barrel, but it is unquestionable that the directional effect of adding oil for sale in today's tight market would be to reduce prices from whatever levels they would otherwise attain.

I understand that the Department has announced that it plans to continue adding to the Reserve through the royalty-in-kind program after the current contracts end in July. On April 4, 2008, DOE issued a solicitation seeking new contracts to exchange up to 13 million barrels of royalty oil from Federal leases to add to the Reserve from August through December 2008. Bids are due May 13, 2008, and presumably new contracts could be signed soon thereafter.

Mr. President, I urge you in the strongest possible terms to direct the Secretary not to enter into any new contracts to acquire additional petroleum for the SPR at this time, whether through direct purchases or the royalty-in-kind program. The Reserve currently holds about 701 million barrels, and at the completion of deliveries under its existing contracts in July will have reached 709 million barrels. The Reserve's maximum physical capacity at present is 727 million barrels, and the Department has indicated that additional storage capacity will not be available for several years. Furthermore, DOE indicates the Reserve contains 58 days of protection in the event of a crude oil import supply interruption, and that in combination with private stocks, places the U.S. in compliance with International Energy Agency requirements.

To my mind, the potential gain in national security of contracting to fill the remaining increment of available capacity in the Reserve is simply not worth the risk that keeping these royalty barrels off the market might contribute to the continuation or exacerbation of high gasoline prices. I recognize that if the Department were to immediately halt SPR deliveries under existing contracts, as some have urged, it could face lawsuits for breach of contract that might result in liability to the taxpayer. However, it is within the Department's discretion not to enter into new contracts at this time, which would avoid this risk. Such a decision would be wholly consistent with your decision in 2006 to suspend filling the SPR during the summer driving season, when oil prices were at about half of their current levels. Finally, given the level of Congressional concern about further acquisitions of petroleum for SPR at this time, and



legislative proposals to bar additional fill during 2008, it seems unnecessarily confrontational at this time to enter into new contracts that might be thrown into jeopardy by subsequent Congressional action.

Mr. President, I have been and remain a strong supporter of filling the Reserve, and believe the Department should look for appropriate means and times to meet the 1 billion barrel target as directed in the 2005 Energy Policy Act. However, this should be done in a manner that is consistent with the balancing factors set forth in the Act, in order to avoid raising consumer prices. In light of the extraordinarily high current gasoline prices, widespread uncertainty about whether and when markets may stabilize, the obvious adverse effect this is having on average Americans, and the potential beneficial effect on markets of adding Federal royalty oil to available supplies, it makes no sense to enter into new agreements to fill the Reserve at this time.

I, therefore, urge you to direct the Secretary of Energy not to bind the Department, consumers, and the taxpayers to the consequences of entering new contracts for filling the Strategic Petroleum Reserve during 2008, and to defer any new fill commitments until oil markets stabilize and intelligent decisions can be made about appropriate time periods and terms for resuming additions to the Reserve.

A number of recent proposals in Congress and elsewhere call for the Federal Government to withdraw a significant quantity of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) and sell it as a means of providing downward pressure on record crude oil prices. Pursuant to recent legislation enacted in response to high market prices, filling of the SPR has been suspended. The question now is whether to begin active sales of SPR crude oil in an effort to provide gasoline price relief to American consumers.

I respectfully request that you provide answers to the following questions by noon on Thursday, July 17, 2008. Your response will help guide me and other members of the Committee on Energy and Commerce in reviewing the merits of any such proposals, over which this Committee has jurisdiction.

1. The purpose of the SPR has always been, in my understanding, to provide partial protection for the United States in the event of a major physical disruption of oil supplies, and to meet the Nation's international treaty obligations to hold a requisite supply of oil in strategic stocks in the event of an international emergency affecting oil supplies. Are there other purposes for U.S. policy with regard to the building and use of the SPR that go beyond these objectives?
2. If so, what is the statutory or other legal authority for use of the SPR for such other objectives?
3. What is the minimum amount of reserves in the SPR required to meet our international treaty obligations?

4. Is there any requirement on other treaty partners to match U.S. withdrawals from strategic stocks for purposes of affecting oil market prices?
5. Please describe the circumstances of all prior draw-downs of the SPR. Include the date, withdrawal-rate, volume of oil withdrawn, disposition of the oil, and reason for each withdrawal.
6. Of the occasions on which oil has historically been withdrawn from the SPR, please identify and provide the stated rationales for any that were not related to:
 - a. a major event affecting physical oil supplies, such as Hurricanes Katrina and Rita or the first Gulf War;
 - b. tests of the SPR's capabilities and capacities; or
 - c. exchanges for other oil being injected.
7. Has crude oil ever previously been withdrawn from the SPR and sold for the explicit purpose of affecting crude oil market prices?
8. Would a decision to withdraw crude oil from SPR and sell it as a means of affecting crude oil market prices require new statutory authority?
9. What is the maximum withdrawal rate for crude oil that could be achieved from the SPR on a sustained basis for at least one month?
10. How much time would be required before this withdrawal rate could be achieved?
11. What physical transportation and delivery issues would arise if a determination were made to begin withdrawals and sale of crude oil from the SPR? How would the Department address such issues and what period of time would be required to resolve them?
12. What issues related to marketing and commercial arrangements would arise if the Department of Energy were required to move quickly to a position of selling a significant quantity of crude oil being withdrawn from the SPR? How would the Department address such issues and what period of time would be required to resolve them?
13. Since the SPR was designed to offset a loss of oil supply to the U.S., but in this instance would provide additional oil to a U.S. market still being fully supplied with



imports as well as domestically produced oil, would there be physical capacity constraints or logistical issues in accepting the additional barrels of oil in the market?

14. What issues with regard to the physical capacity, re-filling, or operational management of the SPR would arise from a decision to withdraw crude oil from it in large volumes for an indeterminate period of time?
15. Would the integrity of the SPR's storage facilities or caverns be compromised if oil were withdrawn and not replaced within a given period of time?
16. What would be the budgetary treatment of the proceeds of any such sales of crude oil from the SPR? What budgetary or statutory authority governs the use of such proceeds?
17. Could such proceeds be reserved for use in purchasing oil to refill the SPR at such time when oil prices decrease without new authority?

Dear President Bush:

I am writing to add my support to the global strategy to launch 20 carbon capture and storage demonstration projects by 2010 as recommended by the International Energy Agency (IEA) and the Carbon Sequestration Leadership Forum (CSLF). I was pleased to see that the Joint Statement by the G-8 Energy Ministers on June 8, 2008, stressed the need to develop carbon capture and sequestration technologies (CCS) and also supported the IEA and CSLF's recommendation to conduct 20 CCS demonstration projects worldwide. I cannot overstate the importance of signaling your support for this international initiative on carbon capture and sequestration by ensuring the necessary information and cost-sharing mechanisms are in place to stimulate deployment of CCS technologies. If we do not make a substantial investment to demonstrate integrated CCS technologies now, our ability to implement a comprehensive and meaningful climate change program could be seriously undermined.

Last week, the IEA released its report, "Energy Technology Perspectives 2008." The report makes it abundantly clear that achieving greenhouse gas emissions reductions remains a daunting challenge and meeting that challenge will require unprecedented investments in advanced technologies. The technology roadmap in the report includes deployment of CCS technologies contributing a 19% savings in carbon dioxide emissions by 2050. However, the IEA also lays out a number of barriers to large-scale deployment of CCS technologies, including legal, regulatory, financial, economic and technical hurdles as well as the need for educating stakeholders. These complex issues require our immediate attention. I believe that collaboration with our international partners to overcome these barriers will allow us to make the best-informed decisions about deployment of a CCS strategy here in the United States and around the globe.

As you know, Title VII of the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 authorizes \$200 million for fiscal years 2009 through 2013 to conduct large-scale demonstrations of

carbon capture technologies. Additionally, the law authorizes \$240 million for fiscal years 2008 through 2012 to continue research on CCS technologies and conduct seven large-scale carbon injection tests. The law also encourages the Department of Energy to work toward demonstrating an integrated CCS system. Next week at the G-8 Summit, I urge you to assure our international partners that you will aggressively and creatively pursue the necessary cost-sharing mechanisms and incentives for facilitating the revolution in energy technology deployment required to achieve common objectives for a more secure, reliable, affordable and sustainable energy-use outlook.

I applaud the G-8 Energy Ministers for embracing the recommendations of the IEA and CSLF to launch 20 CCS demonstration projects. I strongly believe that collaboration with our global partners on the development, demonstration and deployment of CCS technologies will help us make sound policy decisions. As Chairman of the Science and Technology Committee, I stand ready to work with all interested parties to tackle the challenge of climate change.

It has come to my attention that a misunderstanding may exist with regard to the types of projects that are eligible for funding consideration within the Clean Coal Power Initiative (CCPI) demonstration program.

During the final days of the July 2005 House-Senate conference for the Energy Policy Act, I successfully offered an amendment to the draft section entitled, "Technical Criteria for Clean Coal Power Initiative". The amendment was expressed as, "... (v) other advanced coal based technologies capable of producing a concentrated stream of carbon dioxide."

Prior to the amendment, at least 70 percent of CCPI funds would only be for coal-based gasification projects. The purpose of the amendment was to eliminate constraints on the availability of CCPI funding for demonstrations of combustion-based carbon dioxide capture technologies. Demonstrations of combustion-based technologies intentionally designed to capture carbon dioxide will enable subsequent storage or use for the carbon dioxide.

I trust you understand that prospective technologies need to be demonstrated for capture of carbon dioxide emission from coal combustion plants. If the EPAct 2005 language is confusing, it is entirely due to the placement of the amendment within the "Gasification Projects" subtitle of the "Technical Criteria for Clean Coal Power Initiative". The amendment was inserted there because of the press of approval of the conference agreement; and because the real issue was one of correcting the problem caused by explicitly and prematurely choosing gasification as the technology winner, i.e., by dedicating 70 percent of demonstration funds to only gasification approaches.

It is the intent of Congress that all approaches capable of creating a concentrated stream of carbon dioxide should be eligible for consideration for the 70 percent CCPI demonstration funding.

We are writing today to urge you to use your emergency authority to immediately release oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. Virtually no other action you could take would have as positive or as immediate an impact at the pump, lowering fuel prices for American consumers and businesses. Unlike other proposals put forward in recent days that would take 8 to 10 years to affect the price of gasoline, an announcement of plans to release oil from the Reserve could cause a decline in oil prices within hours. A similar announcement made by your father, President George H. W. Bush, in 1991 led oil prices to decline within a day of the announcement, even though the actual release of oil did not occur for two weeks.

For the past two months, U.S. gasoline prices have topped \$4.00 per gallon – at least \$1 more than just a year ago. Diesel fuel has been even more expensive, now averaging \$4.60 a gallon. This has had a devastating effect on American families and businesses. Although gasoline prices have risen 165 percent since you have taken office, average gross income has increased only approximately 24 percent. High transportation costs are adding to higher prices in our stores and supermarkets, too.

Fuel prices have risen in direct response to rising crude oil prices. The 40-percent increase in oil prices since the beginning of the year is unprecedented, given that there have been no unusual world supply disruptions. Instead, growing worldwide demand, flat production, and uncontrolled market speculation have put upward pressure on oil prices. This crisis constitutes a severe energy supply interruption. It requires an immediate response, and you hold it in your power to authorize a release from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve that will immediately supplement our crude oil supply and break the cycle of spiraling speculation.

The Government Accountability Office recommended in a hearing before the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources on February 26, 2008, that the Department of Energy hold 10 percent of its Strategic Petroleum Reserve inventory in heavy crude oil. The lack of heavy, sour crude oil in the Reserve inventory poses a problem for refiners that use this kind of oil, refiners upon whom we would rely in the case of an emergency supply disruption. The Department has acknowledged the benefit of holding heavier crude oil in its inventory and stated its intent to acquire heavy crude oil as it expands its inventory capacity.

We ask that you take immediate action to begin to implement this modernization of the Reserve by releasing 70 million barrels of light, sweet crude oil, about 10 percent of the current Reserve inventory.

This would have an immediate effect on oil and gasoline prices, unlike proposals that would open new federal land and offshore areas for drilling, which would not add oil to the market for many years.

At an appropriate time in the future, the Reserve should be replenished with lower-grade, heavy crude oil, in accordance with the GAO's recommendation. Market conditions are favorable for this exchange of light for heavy crude, as the current high price differential between these two crude types would allow the Department to generate considerable revenue.

Given the benefits this step offers for the mission of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve and the relief it would provide to Americans suffering from record high fuel costs, we urge you to direct the Department of Energy to release light, sweet crude oil from the reserve to help Americans at the pump now.

Thank you for your consideration of this matter.

Efforts to advance America's energy security have been repeatedly frustrated in the United States Congress. As Americans increasingly make their simple plea through polls and petitions for more energy exploration, the Majority has responded almost entirely with dilatory tactics and obstruction. The energy crisis now borders on an emergency.

On July 14, you took a major step towards freeing up American oil and gas reserves by lifting the Executive moratorium on OCS development. This exercise of Presidential authority represents direct and efficient progress towards exploring America's vast and valuable reserves.

We now request you issue an Executive Order based on national security considerations to mandate the United States Geological Survey to conduct an immediate, state-of-the-art seismic survey of the hydrocarbon resources within the 1.5 million acre 1002 area of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. This would be purely informational and environmentally non-intrusive.

The last seismic survey of the area is 25 years old (winter of 1983-84), and the United States government is operating with outdated information of America's energy inventory. In times of fragile national security and economy, an accurate assessment of American energy resources is fundamental to the national interest.


Section 1003 of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (PL 96-487) prohibits any "exploration leading to development" without an act of Congress. However, the Congressional intent of this prohibition does not cover seismic testing. The prohibition is directed at exploratory drilling which, unlike seismic, typically leads to development whenever hydrocarbons are discovered. Modern seismic testing, on the other hand, is roughly equivalent to photography in terms of its environmental impact on land.

As Congress continues to debate the various issues surrounding energy resources, your Administration's support in providing the Legislative branch with this essential information is critical. Using your Executive power to inventory national energy resources will assure our Nation has accurate, correct data to reassess the potential of the 1002 area.



Dear Mr. President:

Our country is facing an energy crisis that has not been seen for nearly three decades. When facing high energy prices or supply shortfalls, Presidential Administrations have taken necessary steps to alleviate the harmful impacts upon American families and businesses. As demonstrated by your predecessors, the single most significant way for you to provide timely relief is to draw down upon the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR).

Whether it was during the early 1990s under President George H.W. Bush or in late 2000 under President Bill Clinton, both instances proved that when a judicious drawdown of the SPR was authorized, oil prices dropped and relief was provided quickly.

The SPR is currently 97 percent full, its highest level ever, and is sufficiently large enough for national security needs. Releasing reasonable amounts from the SPR is the most efficient way to provide the timely economic relief that American consumers, families, and businesses so desperately need. Once oil is deployed from the SPR, it can be infused into the market 13 days later and provide much needed assistance.

When you signed the Strategic Petroleum Reserve Fill Suspension and Consumer Protection Act of 2008 into law this past May, thereby suspending government purchases of high-priced oil for the SPR, you took one step forward. But our economy, our families and our businesses need immediate relief, so I strongly request that you take the next step and draw down upon the SPR without delay.

Obviously, this proposal—which is also supported by Speaker Nancy Pelosi—is not a long term strategy. In that regard, I believe we must aggressively invest in renewable and alternative sources of energy so that we may diversify our energy reliance. But, for the short term, we must help our citizens now. It is in this spirit that I hope you will act quickly to draw down upon the SPR.


I am writing to request the Department of Energy to permit the Department's Arctic Energy Office to have greater flexibility to tackle a wider range of energy issues in Alaska. Since the Office's creation in 2001 as part of DOE's National Energy Technology Laboratory (NETL), the office located in Fairbanks, has focused on research largely aimed at fossil fuels and energy development. The Office has done excellent work researching methane hydrate potential, heavy oil production technology, coal production and related fossil energy work. All of the work has been beneficial and should be continued.

But it would be extremely beneficial if the office could expand its mandate to also work on non-fossil fuels/alternative energy development in Arctic climates. This winter Congress when it approved the Omnibus Appropriations Act for FY 08 specifically attempted to loosen the ties of the office to NETL, by giving it its own line item funding authority. I believe this change gives the Department the administrative authority to expand the scope of the office's mission without additional legislative approval.

I know that the United States Arctic Research Commission recently wrote the Department asking for a similar expansion in the scope of the duties of the Office. Energy development in the Arctic is increasingly complex as Arctic residents must choose among a host of fuels and power sources to meet their needs. Given the isolation of villages in Alaska and throughout the Arctic and the high cost of energy in the region, having better research and guidance on the deployment of alternative energy will pay giant dividends for the region and the nation. And allowing the Department greater research latitude could also help pioneer technology in a host of areas such as ocean energy development.

I believe the Commission suggested that the office be allowed to report directly to the Office of the Secretary. Regardless of the administrative process adopted, expanding the ability of the office to address a wider range of energy problems would be beneficial to the Department and to Alaskans. I hope you will consider this request in coming months. Best wishes.

On June 3, 2008 and July 30, 2008 respectively, your Department issued and affirmed an order pursuant to Section 3 of the Natural Gas Act that will allow two major integrated oil companies – ConocoPhillips and Marathon Oil – to export 98.1 billion cubic feet of Alaskan natural gas to Japan and other Pacific Rim countries. This order, which will allow the export of as much natural gas as is used by 1.4 million American families in a year, comes at a time when the President had demanded that the moratoria on oil and gas drilling along our environmentally-sensitive coastal areas be lifted and Americans are being warned that their winter heating bills are going to be dramatically higher. The Administration is trying to have it both ways – arguing that we need to drill everywhere because we don't have adequate energy supplies, while finding that we have so much energy that big oil companies can export it overseas and keep prices here at home higher than they would otherwise be. On its face, the order that Department has issued to allow the continued export of Alaskan natural gas does not meet the public interest test required by the Natural Gas Act and I respectfully request that you review and revoke it.

As you know, the United States has been exporting natural gas from Alaska to Japan since 1969. Historically, these exports were deemed in the public interest because there were no pipelines to the lower-48 states and no West Coast LNG terminals to bring this gas to market. Indeed, even in this most recent order, which would allow ConocoPhillips and Marathon to continue to export Alaskan natural gas when their current long-term authorization expires next April, the Department dismissed the possibility of supplying this gas to the lower-48 and only considered the local need for this natural gas within Alaska in its determination that the proposed export met the statute's public interest test.

What the Department should have fully considered, but did not, was the need for this natural gas in the lower-48 and the fact that the capability to import LNG to the West Coast has been commercially available as of May 15, 2008 – the date Sempra LNG, a subsidiary of Sempra Energy, announced that its Energía Costa Azul LNG terminal in Baja California was ready for commercial operation. In fact, the Department appears to have relied upon inaccurate and out of date information submitted by ConocoPhillips and Marathon on this point. For example, the Department's June 3rd order cites arguments by these companies that, "(w)ith respect to national need, CPANGC [ConocoPhillips Alaska Natural Gas Corporation] and Marathon state shipment of LNG from the Applicants'

Kenai LNG facilities to the lower 48 states does not appear to be a viable option due to certain regulatory and economic hurdles."

The hurdles cited by the companies, according to the Department, are the Jones Act which restricts shipments between U.S. ports to U.S. flagged vessels, the argument "that there are no existing U.S. west coast LNG receiving terminals," and the cost of shipping LNG to the East and Gulf coasts would be prohibitive. The Costa Azul facility was specifically designed to provide natural gas to U.S. markets, as well as Mexican customers. It is connected by a cross-border pipeline system capable of delivering natural gas to the U.S. market today, and that system is being expanded to provide even more capability. Under the North American Free Trade Agreement, there are no additional duties or tariffs on natural gas trade between the two countries. And because your Department already approves all exports and imports of natural gas between the U.S. and Mexico, it (and you) should be well aware of these capabilities. Since the facility is located in Mexico, the Jones Act does not apply.

Coming as it does, at a time when the Energy Information Administration (EIA), an agency within your own Department, is projecting that American consumers will be facing these high natural gas prices, it is inconceivable that the Department would accept, and apparently base its own decision upon, such flawed and out of date information. As described by the EIA in its most recent Short-Term Energy Outlook, Americans are facing dramatically higher natural gas costs this year, and especially this winter. According to EIA, the average price of natural gas consumers are expected to pay this winter will increase by more than 22% nationwide, and by more than 24% in the Western U.S. where the Alaskan gas would add to supply. EIA projects that natural gas prices will continue to remain high in future years with the spot price in 2009 averaging 25% more than 2007.

To add insult to injury, as argued by the Chugach Electric Association, the largest electric utility in Alaska and which uses natural gas to generate electricity, the Department's order did not even adequately address the need for gas within Alaska. Indeed, the Department rejected the pleas from Chugach to condition the export of Alaskan gas on assurances that Alaska's own need for natural gas was met.

In short, it is hard to see how the Department concluded that the proposed export of Alaskan natural gas met the required public interest test with regard to either Alaskan or lower-48 energy needs. For the Department to categorically reject an opportunity to provide additional supplies of energy to American consumers, both in Alaska and on the West Coast, at a time of record energy prices and instead let these companies send that energy to overseas markets, demands a Secretarial-level review.

Finally, I am also concerned about the fact that at least two U.S.-based LNG companies - Cheniere Marketing, Inc. and Freeport LNG Development, L.P.- have also applied to the Department for LNG export authority. Neither of these companies produces LNG. Rather they propose to re-export LNG already received, or expected to be received, at their U.S. LNG terminals. In Cheniere's case, the company is applying for permission to re-export up to 64 billion cubic feet of LNG over the next two years and 24 billion cubic

feet for Freeport -- both from LNG terminals on the Gulf Coast. If America is really so short of energy that we need to drill in national wildlife refuges and other sensitive areas, why should energy supplies, sitting in U.S. terminals --roughly equivalent to what an additional 1.1 million families would use in a year -- be sent back out of the country simply because these energy companies can get a higher price from a foreign buyer? In light of the Department's questionable interpretation of the Natural Gas Act public interest standard in the case of ConocoPhillips and Marathon, I would like to know how the Department intends to apply that statutory standard in the two re-export applications filed by Cheniere and Freeport. I would also like to know what action you are going to take to ensure that unlike the Alaskan natural gas export proceeding, these cases are decided on complete and accurate information.

Because Congress may soon consider legislation affecting US energy supplies, I request that you respond to my letter by September 15.

I also request that you please file a copy of this letter in the three administrative dockets referenced above (ConocoPhillips Alaska Natural Gas Corporation and Marathon Oil Company, FE Docket No. 07-02-LNG; Cheniere Marketing, Inc., FE Docket No. 08-77-LNG; and Freeport LNG Development, L.P. 08-70-LNG). Copies of this letter are also being provided to the appropriate representatives of the parties in those respective proceedings.

We are writing in reference to Governor Sonny Perdue's September 29th request to make a release from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) to assist with the gasoline shortages our state continues to experience. We support Governor Perdue's efforts to increase transportation fuel supplies in our state.

Since Hurricanes Gustav and Ike, gas stations in our State of Georgia, particularly in the metro-Atlanta area, have experienced severe gasoline shortages, with some having no gasoline at all. When gasoline is available, Georgians are waiting hours in long lines – sometimes 100 cars deep – until the station runs dry. It is anticipated that these outages and shortages will continue for at least another two weeks.

We appreciate your directive earlier this month to release crude oil supplies from the SPR, and believe that release lessened the negative impact from production losses in the Gulf of Mexico from Hurricanes Gustav and Ike. We also appreciate your responsiveness to our requests to waive the Environmental Protection Agency requirement on usage of a low sulfur blend of gas for our state, as well as extending the Department of Transportation hours of service waiver, which will allow more quantities of fuel to be carried to gas stations in Georgia.


Because the September 26, 2008 Energy Information Administration's report indicated that 57% of the Gulf of Mexico's crude oil production remained shut in, we believe another release from the SPR would be appropriate. We remain committed to doing everything we can to ensure that an adequate supply of gasoline can reach our state, and are encouraging our private sector and federal partners to assist us in this effort.


As we look to the future, and in order to prevent such a shortage from occurring again, we ask that your administration work to remove any regulatory roadblocks that may exist that prevent siting new refineries and pipelines throughout our region and the country. When Hurricane Gustav hit the oil-refining regions of the Gulf Coast on September 1st it caused widespread refinery shutdowns and outages. Operations that shut down before that storm were just coming back online when Hurricane Ike hit, forcing another shutdown. Since the Southeast is the only region of the nation that has no oil refining or major gasoline storage capacity, we are forced to pump all of our gasoline in by pipeline. Pipelines have been operating at significantly less than full capacity

because of the lack of refining capabilities in the Gulf region, and the outages we are seeing are because of the three week period since September 1st in which there was little to no refining happening. By increasing the number of refineries and pipelines, and diversifying their locations, we can ensure that such disruptions from natural disasters are minimized.

We stand ready to assist you in whatever way possible to address the existing fuel supply problem in our state, and to put the policies and infrastructure in place to prevent such a shortage from happening again.

I understand that the required Waterway Suitability Report (WSR) for the first of two proposed Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) terminals in Washington County, Maine, has been bogged down in the interagency review process due to concerns over conflicting United States-Canadian interpretations of international law and Canada's refusal to participate in the LNG permitting process. At issue in this WSR are the rights of deep-draft LNG tankers to reach the first proposed LNG site through Canadian waters, specifically through Head Harbor Passage (HHP) and Passamaquoddy Bay. But the results of the WSR will also affect the ability of all large vessels transiting the east coast of Washington County – regardless of the type of cargo – to engage in commerce through the HHP.


Although I recognize that our country has a long history of working cooperatively with Canada, I concur fully with the State Department's diplomatic efforts to formally advise the Canadian government that it views the HHP as an international strait and, therefore, that all vessels enjoy the right of non-suspendable innocent passage under Article 45 of the 1982 UN Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). I strongly believe that the WSR, and any conditions thereon, must explicitly recognize the United States' right to innocent passage through the HHP under international law.

Furthermore, I am convinced that Canada's refusal to participate in this LNG permit process should not have a detrimental effect on the timely adjudication of the permit. To find otherwise would amount to providing Canada a veto power over this permit process and set an unfortunate precedent for this and other matters of critical importance to United States national security and energy independence.

A final determination on this WSR was expected nearly a year ago. I urge completion of the interagency review process as soon as practical, as I am concerned that the window of opportunity for this important initiative may be closing and that further delay would essentially

make a final decision on the LNG permit moot. Moreover, I reiterate the importance of explicit recognition of United States' rights under international law in the WSR.



We have just learned that the Department of Energy's (DOE) highly touted nonproliferation program, intended to keep Soviet-era scientists from migrating to rogue states following the collapse of the Soviet Union, has been funding Russian research institutes working on nuclear projects in Iran. In 2006, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice told Congress that the United States faces "no greater challenge from a single country" than from Iran. In October 2007, the National Intelligence Estimate concluded, "Iranian entities are continuing to develop a range of technical capabilities that could be applied to producing nuclear weapons, if a decision is made to do so."

Given these dire warnings, it is troubling that DOE would subsidize or otherwise support Russian institutes providing technology and services to the Iranian nuclear program. The Committee therefore requests that the Department quantify the number of Russian institutes that are supporting Iran's nuclear program, and explain why U.S. taxpayers should continue to subsidize Russian nuclear institutes that are working on Iran's nuclear program.

On January 23, 2008, the Committee on Energy and Commerce's Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations held a hearing on the Initiatives for Proliferation Prevention (IPP) program, whose stated goal is to prevent underemployed or unemployed weapons of mass destruction (WMD) scientists from selling their knowledge to terrorist groups or countries of concern. The National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) is currently funding more than 100 projects at institutes in Russia and other former Soviet Union (FSU) countries.

At the January 23, 2008, hearing, Adam Scheinman, the Assistant Deputy Administrator for the NNSA's Office of Nonproliferation and International Security, was asked whether any of the institutes funded by the IPP program were also working on Iran's nuclear program. Mr. Scheinman testified that he was "not aware" of any DOE-funded institutes that also worked on nuclear "fuel transfer" at the Buhsher nuclear project in Iran. He added, "I would have to go back and see whether our work involves any of the institutes involved in the fuel transfer, the reactor."

The Committee on Energy and Commerce was provided with Russian-origin documents that describe the activities of two IPP-funded institutes that are involved with Iran's nuclear program—the Scientific Research Institute of Measuring Systems (NIIS) and the Federal Scientific and Industrial Center of Nuclear Machine Building (OKBM)—both of which are in Nizhny Novgorod, Russia. We requested that the Government Accountability Office (GAO) provide the Committee with the documents related to Buhsher, which they had obtained from officials when visiting Russian institutes.

One PowerPoint presentation by NIIS describes their work on automated nuclear reactor control systems for Buhsher and other plants. NIIS has \$2.65 million in IPP projects related to mapping of geologic structures. A PowerPoint presentation by OKBM, which has built seven heavy-water reactors, describes work at the Buhsher reactor installing hundreds of circulation pumps and ventilation equipment. DOE has approved a 3-year, \$1.037 million jointly funded project to develop submersible pumps for integral water reactors as part of the Global Nuclear Energy Partnership (GNEP), and a second project worth \$1 million on radioactive medical waste management funded by the IPP program.

DOE's funding of Russian institutes working on the Buhsher reactor in Iran is questionable policy, because this activity enables the transfer of dual-use technologies, training, and the potential for "latent proliferation" emerging from a civilian nuclear program. Even a country in good standing under the Nonproliferation Treaty and subject to the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) safeguards is able, under the cover of a civilian nuclear program, to move to the edge of nuclear weapons capability, and be situated only months away from nuclear weapons production once such a decision were made. That is the essence of a latent proliferation risk.

Beyond Buhsher, other concerns persist. Iran declared it would continue to build a uranium enrichment operation, even though Russia has shipped enriched uranium fuel to operate the Buhsher reactor. Iran is finalizing construction on a heavy water reactor at Arak, which can eventually provide a source of plutonium.

The revelations in these Russian documents raise additional questions. How many other Russian institutes funded by DOE are also performing work on the Iranian nuclear program? What kinds of support and materials are they providing and to which facilities? Are any of these

facilities informally providing support to Iran's nuclear program? How much support has DOE provided to these institutes in the form of overheads and supplemental payments to its scientists?

Given that the United Nations Security Council adopted two resolutions arising out of Iran's failure to cooperate with the IAEA on proliferation issues (Security Council resolutions 1696 (2006) and 1737 (2006)), what policy logic justifies DOE funding Russian institutes which are providing nuclear technology to Iran? How does this advance our non-proliferation goals?

Prior to making funding decisions, has the Office of Nonproliferation and International Security assessed whether DOE-funded institutes in Russia are working on Iran's nuclear program? In light of reports that DOE program staff participated in briefings at Russian institutes where work on the Buzhder nuclear power plant project was discussed, it is troubling that the Department's program leadership testified that they were "not aware".

Under Rules X and XI of the U.S. House of Representatives, the Committee on Energy and Commerce and its Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations are investigating DOE's nonproliferation programs. The Committee requests the following documents relating to the Initiatives for Proliferation (IPP) Program:

1. a. A list of all Russian institutes that are or have been funded by the IPP (in whole or in part) since the program inception. Such list should be in a searchable format, and include the years of the project, the project description, and the amount of funding.

b. This list should delineate all Russian institutes funded by the IPP which are or have provided materials, equipment, engineering, design, construction, operations support, training, computer hardware or software, or other services to Iran for any aspect of its nuclear program. For each Russian institute, please describe the types of support provided to the Iranian nuclear program.
2. A list of all Russian scientists who are or were funded by the IPP program and worked at institutes involved with the Iranian nuclear program. This list should identify which scientists were simultaneously or subsequently employed on projects relating to the Iranian nuclear program.
3. Any policy or procedures related to assessments of Iran's nuclear program as it relates to approval of IPP program funds.
4. Forms and procedures used by DOE and its participating labs and institutes to verify that no funds are spent on scientists or institutes involved with nuclear weapons programs, as required by Section 3136(a) of the fiscal year 2000 Defense Authorization Act.

5. A current list of all DOE-funded projects planned or underway in Russia or other FSU countries related to GNEP, with the program's funding source clearly identified.
6. A public version of the Transmittal and the Report of the United States and the Russian Federation Joint Working Group on the Development of a Bilateral Action Plan to Enhance Global and Bilateral Nuclear Energy Cooperation, dated December 15, 2006, with attachments.

Please produce such documents in paper or electronic form as requested above to the Committee within 14 days of receipt of this letter.

The Committee also requests a response to the following questions:

1. Does DOE policy allow U.S. funding of scientists at Russian institutes when these institutes are also working on projects related to the Iranian nuclear program?
2. Please explain how non-proliferation goals are advanced through the support of scientists and/or institutes that are working on nuclear projects with a country of proliferation concern.
3. Does DOE have an existing assessment or survey of which Russian institutes are working on Iranian nuclear program projects? If so, what is the date of this survey? Please provide the names of the individuals who prepared this document.
4. Has DOE assessed whether work performed for Iran at IPP-supported institutes is purely for peaceful purposes, and that materials, technology, and engineering are fully safeguarded? Please provide the names of the individuals who have or currently conduct this assessment.
5. How does DOE ensure that no U.S. funds are being used to support institutes or scientists performing work on nuclear weapons programs for countries of proliferation concern, as proscribed by Section 3136(a) of the FY2000 Defense Authorization Act?
6. Please explain how DOE has verified that the engineering, design, training, and technologies being provided to Iran are not fungible, and do not have the potential for latent proliferation or dual use in other Iranian nuclear programs? Please provide the names of the individuals who perform these assessments.



It has come to my attention that the Department of Energy, and particularly the Office of the General Counsel, has been less than cooperative with the State of Arizona in accomplishing the Western Transmission Project. This Project has been jointly developed by the Western Area Power Administration ("Western") of the U.S. Department of Energy and the State of Arizona acting through its agency, the Arizona Power Authority. The Arizona Power Authority is empowered by its Arizona enabling legislation to undertake the Western Transmission Project. This Project consists of the purchase and assignment of transmission capacity on the southern portion of the Pacific Northwest-Pacific Southwest Intertie and the Parker-Davis Transmission Systems of the U.S. Department of Energy in the southwestern region of the country.

The Project will provide significant benefits for electric consumers in Arizona and elsewhere including:

- Reduction in costs of transmission of electrical energy on the Transmission Systems mentioned above resulting in present value cost savings of over \$50 million for Western customers and ultimately electric consumers in Arizona, Nevada and Southern California.
- Repayment to the U.S. Treasury of over \$360 million of the debt associated with these Transmission Systems, which, in effect, transfers financial responsibility for payment of capital costs of these Transmission Systems to Western's customers using the transmission service.
- Complying with the State of Arizona's statutory mandate of promoting low cost energy while maintaining reliability and cost competitiveness of the electric systems.
- Providing these benefits under Western's Open Access Transmission Tariff in furtherance of its objectives and policies of providing affordable and reliable electric service.

It is troubling that this worthwhile undertaking of the State of Arizona has apparently met with a lack of cooperation and even resistance from your office.

Following the development of the contracts for the Project by Western and the Arizona Power Authority, Western held customer meetings in which the Project received the support of Western customers. Western then participated with the Arizona Power Authority in required public hearings in Arizona, in

which the Project received preliminary approval from the Arizona State Certification Board, chaired by the Governor. The Arizona Power Authority and Western then met with bond investors, bond insurance companies, and national rating agencies in New York City, after which the Arizona Power Authority bonds to be issued to finance the Project were granted high grade credit ratings from both Moody's Investor Service and Standard & Poor's.

However, as the Arizona Power Authority prepared to enter the capital markets to obtain funding for the Project in August 2006, it was informed that the Office of General Counsel of the Department of Energy had legal concerns with the proposed contractual arrangements for the Project. Following a meeting with the General Counsel and certain of his staff in November 2006, the Arizona Power Authority submitted legal memoranda to the General Counsel addressing what it understood to be his concerns.

It is my understanding that beginning in early 2007, requests have been made to your Office for a meeting to review the Western Transmission Project and address any remaining issues so that Western and the State of Arizona could move forward with the Project. In particular, on April 27, 2007, the Chairman of the Arizona Power Authority, John I. Hudson, in a letter to you outlining the benefits of the Project for electric rate payers in Arizona and elsewhere, requested a meeting with you and your staff in order to accomplish the Project and achieve these benefits. I understand that these requests were handed to the General Counsel of the Department of Energy. I am told the response by the General Counsel failed to specify what aspects of the Project he found questionable. This letter also stated that his office had advised the Arizona Power Authority as to a transaction that would pass "legal muster." I am told by the Arizona Power Authority that it is not aware of that advice and that it still awaits a clear identification by the General Counsel as to its legal concerns and an opportunity to address those concerns.

I am hopeful that you will personally review this Project as there are many in Arizona who believe it could prove beneficial in countering the current increases in energy costs and provide for repayment of the Federal debt associated with these Transmission Systems.

I have enjoyed working with you over the past several years and appreciate your service to our nation.

The Subcommittee is interested in learning how the Department came to so abruptly change direction on how to proceed with the FutureGen project. In fact, it looks as if the project has been fundamentally abandoned in favor of a new, unauthorized approach for which no money has been appropriated.


The program was announced as a major initiative of the Administration and your Department has supported the program for the past five years. As recently as November 30, 2007, you assured interested parties that the Department was moving forward expeditiously with this project and on track to make a final decision about the site for the facility by the end of the year. So it was with some confusion that we learned at the end of January of your decision to terminate the Department's participation in this project.

Because of the Committee's jurisdiction over all non-military research and development and our specific concerns about the implications of the decision to abandon the FutureGen program on the achievement of our goal to develop and deploy carbon capture and sequestration technologies, we desire to review this decision.

Under the authority assigned the Committee in House Rules X and XI, I ask that you produce to the Subcommittee complete records (see attachment) of all materials relating to FutureGen that were prepared for you or involved your review or participation. These include e-mails, briefing memoranda, decision memoranda, notes for letters, phone calls or other communications of whatever form, draft correspondence, final correspondence, and all other materials, of whatever description, relating to FutureGen and involving your office from November 1, 2007 until the present.

As you may know, the Department of Energy's Inspector General recently completed a review of alleged conflicts of interest involving the Department's legal services contractor for the Yucca Mountain Project. We write today to request that you recuse this law firm – Morgan Lewis & Bockius (Morgan Lewis) – from any additional work related to the Yucca Mountain project.

In the Inspector General's report on this investigation, he noted that by selecting a law firm "which represented utilities in spent nuclear fuel litigation against the Government," the Department "accepted a firm with a conflict of interest." It is our view that the Department of Energy made a mistake in waiving this conflict of interest, and in so doing did not serve the public interest. While the Inspector General acknowledged that the Department 'checked the boxes' in its procurement and did not break any laws, he also explained that DOE failed to provide adequate documentation of its decision to hire Morgan Lewis.

The Department set aside the Competition in Contracting Act to give Morgan Lewis this contract, potentially worth over \$100 million, in a closed no-bid process that only involved two other law firms. With inadequate explanation, the Department reversed its policy of excluding from consideration any law firm that represents utilities in spent nuclear fuel litigation. In 1999, the Department's policy was that it "cannot afford a public perception that its licensing decisions regarding the repository were influenced by a firm that owes loyalties to the nuclear utilities." However last year, the Department hired Morgan Lewis – a law firm with at least a dozen lawsuits against DOE involving spent nuclear fuel acceptance issues – to help prepare its licensed application for Yucca Mountain. The Department might have checked the boxes in hiring Morgan Lewis, but it is clear that the public interest was disregarded to hire a law firm favored by the nuclear energy industry.


The Department of Energy does not serve a specific industry, it serves the country and the American public. It is utterly disingenuous for the Department to claim that there are no other law firms with extensive experience in the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's regulatory process that do not have a conflict of interest. For that reason, we request you to immediately terminate the Department's contract with Morgan Lewis, and begin a competitive procurement process if the firm's replacement is deemed necessary to comply with current law.



On April 2, 2008, Subcommittee Chairman Lampson wrote to you requesting all of the Department's records relating to Secretarial participation in the decision to terminate the FutureGen project. As you know, the Committee on Science and Technology is the authorizing Committee in the House of Representatives with jurisdiction over the fossil energy research funds used to support the FutureGen initiative. Your decision to cancel that program came without any consultation with this Committee. The further decision to reorient the program—keeping the same title—has also come without consultation of the Committee. You appear to be moving very quickly to potentially commit hundreds of millions of dollars without benefit of meaningful discussion with this Committee. Our interest in what the Department has done with the FutureGen program, and where it is being lead, is obvious, real and pressing.

In response to Mr. Lampson's request, the Department delivered some 400 pages of documents, some of which appear to be redundant, but withheld "a number of responsive documents that, while associated with some Secretarial involvement also implicate executive branch prerogatives." Your staff offered to work with the Subcommittee to "accommodate the Subcommittee's legislative needs in a manner that respects the interests of both the executive and legislative branches." (All quotes from a letter to Chairman Lampson from Eric J. Fygi, Department of Energy deputy general counsel, April 11, 2008.)

As I am sure you know, this language does not represent a claim of executive privilege, which is often used as a basis for withholding documents from Congress. It appears to be an invention of convenience designed to forestall providing documents essential to the Committee's legislative and oversight responsibilities. However, in an effort to be accommodating and work with the Department, Committee staff requested by phone on April 14 that the Subcommittee receive an index of all of the documents that had been withheld prior to today's hearing.


Even though such a list is required under the Freedom of Information Act for citizen requesters of government documents, your staff informed the Committee that it would not provide such a list to the Congress. Ours was not an unusual request. In the past, the Committee has received similar lists from the Department as part of the discussion over access to documents, and it is a common step in any effort to reach accommodation in the face of claims of privilege. During his appearance on April 15, 2008 before the Subcommittee, Undersecretary Albright seemed to agree that producing an index would be a reasonable thing to do. It is our understanding that in the wake of that appearance, your staff is working to produce some more materials that had been withheld, but those materials have not yet arrived, nor does it appear that all materials were to be provided.

Therefore, by this letter, we are requesting that either all responsive documents or an index of the documents withheld, in sufficient detail to allow Members to understand the nature of the materials being withheld and the alleged privilege attached to each document, be produced to the Committee by 6:00 p.m. on April 22, 2008 in the Committee's offices in 2321 Rayburn House Office Building. If the Department fails to produce the documents, we further ask that your staff arrange to meet with Committee staff to discuss any further accommodations to meet the legislative, oversight and investigative responsibilities of the Committee. Please contact Edith Holleman of the Majority Committee staff at 202-225-8459 and Tom Hammond of the Minority Committee staff at 202-226-2177 to arrange for this meeting, which we expect will occur no later than April 24, 2008.



This letter is a request for copies of all records relating to any ethics or conflicts of interest issues in connection with the nomination of Dennis Spurgeon, the Assistant Secretary for the Office of Nuclear Energy, of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

This request follows Mr. Spurgeon's recent testimony at an April 3, 2008, hearing before the Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations entitled, "Selling the Department of Energy's Depleted Uranium Stockpile: Opportunities and Challenges." At this hearing, Mr. Spurgeon testified under oath about the \$5.7 million in severance payments he received after a brief tenure of approximately 2 years with the United States Enrichment Corporation (USEC), and his opinion that he was under no legal or ethical obligation to recuse himself from dealings with his prior employer and colleagues. In doing so, he referenced his April 6, 2006, recusal statement, which contains no restrictions as a Federal employee on his dealings with USEC.

Questions were raised about his non-recusal because of documents uncovered by the Committee's investigation show that in October 2006 Mr. Spurgeon repeatedly pressed other DOE officials to give serious attention to a \$9.5 billion sole source contract proposal submitted by USEC, in combination with Energy Solutions. Given his past advocacy for USEC's interests within DOE, questions were also raised at the hearing about whether it was appropriate for Mr. Spurgeon to participate in decisions that could directly benefit USEC, such as the decision whether to auction depleted uranium or award USEC a sole source contract to re-enrich DOE's depleted uranium. Further questions were posed by the Subcommittee about whether his involvement with the terms of a sole source contract could benefit USEC's executives with whom Mr. Spurgeon previously worked.

In response, Mr. Spurgeon stated, "[M]y former employment and any restrictions on what I can do was thoroughly vetted at the time prior to my nomination."

Accordingly, the Committee requests DOE evaluations or opinions about Mr. Spurgeon's impartiality. We note that he received a tenure-adjusted separation package of \$2.3 million/year of service which, as the attached chart indicates, is larger than all other senior executive severance payments made by USEC over the past 10 years, and dwarfs the rate of severance for other USEC executives in similar positions.

Under Rules X and XI of the Rules of the U.S. House of Representatives, please provide the following information within 10 days of receipt of this letter:


1. All correspondence in connection with the nomination of Mr. Spurgeon.
2. Legal opinions or memoranda pertaining to or otherwise supporting the Recusal Statement signed by Mr. Spurgeon on April 6, 2006.
3. Ethics reviews regarding Mr. Spurgeon's involvement with matters pertaining to former employers including, but not limited to, USEC, Inc.
4. Assessments of whether USEC's \$5.7 million payment to Mr. Spurgeon was disproportionately large, and whether this is relevant to analyzing his recusal statement and ensuring there is no potential for this lavish payment to affect his impartiality or the appearance of impartiality.
5. Mr. Spurgeon's financial disclosure statements.
6. All documents, letters, memoranda, e-mails, and communications exchanged between the Department, the White House, Mr. Spurgeon, and/or USEC, Inc., pertaining to his employment at USEC.

This letter follows a discussion with Susan F. Beard, Ethics Officer in the Office of General Counsel, who indicated a written request would be required for this information.

On April 2, 2008, Chairman Nick Lampson of the House Committee on Science and Technology's Subcommittee on Energy and the Environment wrote and requested all documents in the Department of Energy's (DOE) possession relating to DOE's decision to essentially terminate the FutureGen project.¹ In a response dated April 11, 2008, DOE refused to produce responsive documents based upon an unprecedented and undefined claim of "executive prerogative."²

In the April 11 letter, DOE offered to work with the Energy and Environment Subcommittee to "accommodate the Subcommittee's legislative needs in a manner that respects the interests of both the executive and legislative branches."³ Additionally, at the Committee's April 15 hearing titled, *The Department of Energy's FutureGen Program*, C.H. "Bud" Albright, DOE's Undersecretary for Energy, promised the Committee that DOE would work with the Subcommittee to produce these documents. He stated that the Department would "specifically" identify which documents it was withholding and provide a justification for this withholding.⁴ Mr. Albright also unequivocally promised to share the Department's strategic plan for the future of the project.⁵

Following the hearing, Chairmen Gordon and Lampson, and Congressman Bob Inglis, Ranking Member on the Energy and Environment Subcommittee, wrote and requested all remaining responsive documents or the promised index of the documents by April 22. The Congressmen further requested a briefing for Committee staff to discuss any further "accommodation." To date, DOE has not produced either the documents or the index. Instead, the Department sent Eric Fygi, DOE's Deputy General Counsel, and Alicia deForest, a DOE attorney, to brief Committee staff.



At the briefing, Mr. Fygi stated that there was no more than a single box of remaining, undisclosed documents. He indicated that DOE would not claim a privilege for some of the remaining documents, nor would DOE provide a timeframe for their disclosure. He also refused to identify a basis for withholding additional documents.


As the authorizing Committee with jurisdiction over fossil energy research funds, the requested FutureGen documents fall squarely within the Committee's jurisdiction. The Committee will not consider anything short of full production to be adequate "accommodation." Therefore, by this letter, we once again request that DOE provide all responsive documents, including those related to the New FutureGen Program Plan completed in January, 2008. It has been over a month since the Committee's initial request for documents. DOE can no longer claim that the timeframe for production is too short. The documents should be provided to the Committee's office at 2321 Rayburn House Office Building by 5 PM on May 12, 2008.



To assist with this investigation, I request that the Department produce to the Committee all Energy Department documents relating to the drafting, negotiation, or signing of the recent oil development contracts with the Iraqi Ministry of Oil. In addition, I am requesting all relevant information on the background and experience of government advisors and private-sector consultants working with the Iraqi Ministry of Oil to develop these contracts.

I ask that you produce the documents and information no later than Friday, July 18, 2008. I further request that the Department notify Committee staff no later than Friday, July 11, 2008, if the Department will not be able to comply with this deadline for any reason.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee in the House of Representatives and has broad oversight jurisdiction as set forth in House Rule X. An attachment to this letter provides additional information on how to respond to the committee's request.

Responding to Oversight Committee Document Requests

In responding to the document request from the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform, please apply the instructions and definitions set forth below.

Instructions

1. In complying with the request, you should produce all responsive documents in your possession, custody, or control.
2. Documents responsive to the request should not be destroyed, modified, removed, transferred, or otherwise made inaccessible to the Committee.
3. In the event that any entity, organization, or individual denoted in the request has been, or is currently, known by any other name than that herein denoted, the request should be read also to include them under that alternative identification.
4. Each document produced should be produced in a form that renders the document capable of being copied.
5. When you produce documents, you should identify the paragraph or clause in the Committee's request to which the documents respond.
6. Documents produced in response to this request should be produced together with copies of file labels, dividers, or identifying markers with which they were associated when this request was issued. To the extent that documents were not stored with file labels, dividers, or identifying markers, they should be organized into separate folders by subject matter prior to production.
7. Each folder and box should be numbered, and a description of the contents of each folder and box, including the paragraph or clause of the request to which the documents are responsive, should be provided in an accompanying index.
8. It is not a proper basis to refuse to produce a document that any other person or entity also possesses a nonidentical or identical copy of the same document.

9. If any of the requested information is available in machine-readable or electronic form (such as on a computer server, hard drive, CD, DVD, memory stick, or computer backup tape), you should consult with Committee staff to determine the appropriate format in which to produce the information.
10. The Committee accepts electronic documents in lieu of paper productions. Documents produced in electronic format should be organized, identified, and indexed electronically in a manner comparable to the organizational structure called for in (6) and (7) above. Electronic document productions should be prepared according to the following standards:
 - (a) The production should consist of single page TIF files accompanied by a Concordance-format load file, an Opticon reference file, and a file defining the fields and character lengths of the load file.
 - (b) Document numbers in the load file should match document Bates Numbers and TIF file names.
 - (c) If the production is completed through a series of multiple partial productions, field names and file order in all load files should match.
11. In the event that a responsive document is withheld on any basis, you should provide the following information concerning the document: (a) the reason the document is not being produced; (b) the type of document; (c) the general subject matter; (d) the date, author, and addressee; and (e) the relationship of the author and addressee to each other.
12. If any document responsive to this request was, but no longer is, in your possession, custody, or control, you should identify the document (stating its date, author, subject, and recipients) and explain the circumstances by which the document ceased to be in your possession, custody, or control.
13. If a date or other descriptive detail set forth in this request referring to a document is inaccurate, but the actual date or other descriptive detail is known to you or is otherwise apparent from the context of the request, you should produce all documents which would be responsive as if the date or other descriptive detail were correct.
14. This request is continuing in nature and applies to any newly discovered document. Any document not produced because it has not been located or discovered by the return date should be produced immediately upon location or discovery subsequent thereto.
15. All documents should be bates-stamped sequentially and produced sequentially. In the cover letter, you should include a total page count for the entire production, including both hard copy and electronic documents.

16. Two sets of documents should be delivered, one set to the majority staff and one set to the minority staff. The majority set should be delivered to the majority staff in Room 2157 of the Rayburn House Office Building, and the minority set should be delivered to the minority staff in Room B350A in the Rayburn House Office Building. You should consult with committee staff regarding the method of delivery prior to sending any materials.
17. Upon completion of the document production, you should submit a written certification, signed by you or your counsel, stating that (1) a diligent search has been completed of all documents in your possession, custody, or control which reasonably could contain responsive documents; and (2) all documents located during the search that are responsive have been produced to the Committee or identified in a privilege log provided to the Committee.

Definitions

1. The term "document" means any written, recorded, or graphic matter of any nature whatsoever, regardless of how recorded, and whether original or copy, including, but not limited to, the following: memoranda, reports, expense reports, books, manuals, instructions, financial reports, working papers, records, notes, letters, notices, confirmations, telegrams, receipts, appraisals, pamphlets, magazines, newspapers, prospectuses, interoffice and intra-office communications, electronic mail (email), contracts, cables, notations of any type of conversation, telephone calls, meetings or other communications, bulletins, printed matter, computer printouts, teletypes, invoices, transcripts, diaries, analyses, returns, summaries, minutes, bills, accounts, estimates, projections, comparisons, messages, correspondence, press releases, circulars, financial statements, reviews, opinions, offers, studies and investigations, questionnaires and surveys, and work sheets (and all drafts, preliminary versions, alterations, modifications, revisions, changes, and amendments of any of the foregoing, as well as any attachments or appendices thereto). The term also means any graphic or oral records or representations of any kind (including without limitation, photographs, charts, graphs, voice mails, microfiche, microfilm, videotape, recordings and motion pictures), electronic and mechanical records or representations of any kind (including, without limitation, tapes, cassettes, disks, computer server files, computer hard drive files, CDs, DVDs, memory sticks, and recordings), and other written, printed, typed, or other graphic or recorded matter of any kind or nature, however produced or reproduced, and whether preserved in writing, film, tape, disk videotape or otherwise. A document bearing any notation not a part of the original text is to be considered a separate document. A draft or non-identical copy is a separate document within the meaning of this term.
2. The term "documents in your possession, custody, or control" means (a) documents that are in your possession, custody, or control, whether held by you or your past or present agents, employees, or representatives acting on your behalf; (b) documents that you have a legal right to obtain, that you have a right to copy, or to which you have access and (c) documents that you have placed in the temporary possession, custody, or control of any third party.
3. The term "communication" means each manner or means of disclosure or exchange of information, regardless of means utilized, where oral, electronic by document or otherwise, and whether fact-to-face, in a meeting, by telephone, mail, telexes, discussions, releases, personal delivery, or otherwise.
4. The terms "and" and "or" shall be construed broadly and either conjunctively or disjunctively to bring within the scope of the request any information which might otherwise be construed to be outside its scope. The singular includes plural number, and vice versa. The masculine includes the feminine and neuter genders.
5. The terms "person" or "persons" means natural persons, firms, partnerships, associations, corporations, subsidiaries, division, departments, joint ventures,

proprietorships, syndicates, or other legal, business or government entities, and all subsidiaries, affiliates, divisions, departments, branches, and other units thereof.

6. The terms "referring" or "relating," with respect to any given subject, means anything that constitutes, contains, embodies, reflects, identifies, states, refers to, deals with, or is in any manner whatsoever pertinent to that subject.


On April 15, 2008, we sent you a letter requesting that the Department of Energy recuse the law firm Morgan Lewis & Bockius (Morgan Lewis) from performing legal services related to the Yucca Mountain project. In light of new information – that the Department exceeded its authority in waiving Morgan Lewis's conflicts of interest – we again request that you recuse Morgan Lewis from working on the Yucca Mountain license application.

As you may be aware, the Justice Department recently sent the enclosed letter to the DOE's Inspector General, stating that the Department never "consulted with or even notified the Department of Justice before entering into an agreement that involved significant conflicts of interest affecting the United States... or executing the purported conflicts waiver." Furthermore, the letter explains that "the Department of Justice, not DOE, possesses plenary authority over matters in Federal court litigation, and DOE could not waive objections by the Department of Justice regarding Morgan Lewis's conflicts."


The Justice Department's opinion is clear and unequivocal. The Department of Energy had no authority to waive Morgan Lewis's conflicts of interest with respect to its representation of nuclear utilities in spent nuclear fuel litigation. Permitting Morgan Lewis to continue representing the DOE on the Yucca Mountain license application would challenge the DOJ's authority over matters that are solely under its jurisdiction. Worse, it would demonstrate to the American public that the DOE is willing to use any means necessary to build a repository at Yucca Mountain, including running roughshod over the rights of Nevadans and trampling the authority of the Department of Justice.

While the Department of Energy never responded to our first request, we are hopeful that you take this second request for recusal of Morgan Lewis much more seriously. Thank you for addressing our concerns.







This letter is in response to a report that your office recently issued, DOE/IG-0792, entitled "Review Of Alleged Conflicts Of Interest Involving A Legal Services Contractor For The Yucca Mountain Project License Application" (April 2008). We are concerned that your report has made an assumption about the Department of Energy's authority over matters that are in litigation which is unfounded.

The report summarized your office's review of a contract into which the Department of Energy (DOE) has entered with a law firm, Morgan, Lewis & Bockius LLP (Morgan Lewis). We understand that, through this contract, Morgan Lewis will provide DOE with legal services relating to DOE's preparation of a licensing application to, and subsequent adjudication before, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) in connection with the construction of a repository for the disposal of spent nuclear fuel (SNF) and/or high-level radioactive waste (HLW) at Yucca Mountain.

As your report indicates, Morgan Lewis also represents several nuclear utilities that are suing the United States in the Court of Federal Claims for breaches of contract by DOE of the Standard Contract For Disposal Of Spent Nuclear Fuel And/Or High-Level Radioactive Waste (Standard Contract). Positions that Morgan Lewis has taken or will take in support of its SNF cases to the Court of Federal Claims may directly conflict with Morgan Lewis's representation of DOE in matters relating to the licensing of Yucca Mountain. Specifically, Morgan Lewis has argued before the Court of Federal Claims that its clients are entitled to damages because of DOE's continuing delay in licensing and opening a Federal repository at Yucca Mountain. Under its new contract with DOE, Morgan Lewis's work may affect the date on which that repository may open in the future, if at all, potentially providing Morgan Lewis with the ability to affect the amount of damages that its clients in the SNF cases will incur.

Despite this conflict of interest, DOE purported to consent to Morgan Lewis's representation of DOE, and DOE executed a purported waiver of any conflict of interest pursuant to Rule 1.7(c) of the District of Columbia Rules of Professional Conduct. Yet, neither DOE nor Morgan Lewis consulted with or even notified the Department of Justice before entering into an agreement that involved significant conflicts of interest affecting the United States (and its litigation with utilities represented by Morgan Lewis) or executing the purported conflicts waiver. Further, as far as we are aware, no one from the Inspector General's office contacted the Department of Justice to solicit its views regarding these conflicts before issuing your report.

Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 516, the Department of Justice, not DOE, possesses plenary authority over matters in Federal court litigation, and DOE could not waive objections by the Department of Justice regarding Morgan Lewis's conflicts. Further, the damages for DOE's partial breach of the Standard Contract are being paid not by DOE but by the Judgment Fund administered by the Department of the Treasury. Thus, the interests of the Judgment Fund and Treasury with regard to any conflict waiver by the United States are critical.

By separate letter, and in accordance with our obligations under Rules 1.1 and 1.3 of the District of Columbia Rules of Professional Conduct to protect the integrity of proceedings before Federal courts, and after consulting with experts regarding ethics issues within the Department of Justice, we have requested that Morgan Lewis provide us with an explanation of the reasons that the safeguards it has implemented adequately protect against the conflicts of interest that its contract with DOE presents. We have attached a copy of that letter here for your consideration.

Since April of this year, the Committee on Science and Technology has been attempting to determine the basis for your decision to terminate the Department's participation in the FutureGen project as previously agreed to through a cooperative agreement with the FutureGen Industrial Alliance. The agreement was initially signed on January 31, 2007, and amended on March 23 and May 15, 2008. The public announcement of the change in FutureGen was made on Jan. 30, 2008.

Since our initial request for materials, it has become clear that the Department began its decision-making process to withdraw from its commitment to the Alliance project at least as early as April of 2007 when it began to develop a new strategy. Therefore, by this letter, we request that the Department provide the following materials:

1. All records, as defined in the Attachment, since January 1, 2007 relating to the decision to enter into or renegotiate a partnership with the FutureGen Industrial Alliance for the FutureGen project. Please limit this search to the records of Secretary Samuel Bodman, former Deputy Secretary Clay Sell, Undersecretary Bud Albright, Mr. James Slutz, Mr. Scott Klara, Mr. Ed Simpson, Mr. Jarad Daniels, Mr. Jeff Kupfer, Mr. Raj Lumar and Mr. Adam Ingols.
2. All records since January 1, 2007 relating to developing a restructured FutureGen program, which internal DOE communications sometimes refer to as "Plan B". Please limit this search to the records of Secretary Samuel Bodman, former Deputy Secretary Clay Sell, Undersecretary Bud Albright, Mr. James Slutz, Mr. Scott Klara, Mr. Ed Simpson, Mr. Jarad Daniels, Mr. Jeff Kupfer, Mr. Raj Lumar and Mr. Adam Ingols.

3. All records relating to the Office of Fossil Energy's analysis of or reports on "Plan B" or any comparisons of "Plan B" with the FutureGen Project agreed to in the cooperative agreement between DOE and the FutureGen Industrial Alliance. These records should include any draft or final analysis on the impact of "Plan B" on full commercial deployment of carbon capture and sequestration technologies, the costs of "Plan B" or the impact of "Plan B" on global climate change mitigation. We are particularly intent on receiving all materials that informed Mr Victor Der's e-mail of December 13, 2007 to Mr. James Slutz, Carl Bauer and Scott Klara. This e-mail was provided to the Committee in a June 20, 2008 document production.
4. All records relating to comparisons of the global climate change implications of the original FutureGen Project to the restructured FutureGen program or "Plan B".
5. All records relating to communications between Secretary Bodman, former Deputy Secretary Clay Sell, Undersecretary Bud Albright or any other Energy Department official and officials of Southern Power Co., AEP or any other utility or energy company concerning FutureGen or a restructured FutureGen program.
6. All records relating to the Department's January 30, 2008 "Request for Information (RFI) on the Department of Energy's Plan to Restructure Futuregen."
7. All unredacted responses to the January 30, 2008, "Request for Information (RFI) on the Department of Energy's Plan to Restructure Futuregen," as referred to in section entitled "Request for Public Comment."

2. The terms "relating," "relate," or "regarding" as to any given subject means anything that constitutes, contains, embodies, identifies, deals with, or is in any manner whatsoever pertinent to that subject, including but not limited to records concerning the preparation of other records.

The Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program is a critical incubator of innovative technologies and a creator of jobs throughout our nation. In a time of mounting economic pressures, it is initiatives like the SBIR program that can build a bridge to a brighter future. It is for this reason that the U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 5819, the SBIR/STTR Reauthorization Act, earlier this year. This legislation is currently awaiting action in the U.S. Senate.


The last time the SBIR program was scheduled to be reauthorized was in fiscal year 2000. Due to a wide range of circumstances, however, this did not occur until December 21, 2000, months after the program's authorization expired on September 30, 2000. This lapse in the program's authorization created confusion at the SBIR agencies and resulted in awards to small businesses being delayed until the reauthorization legislation was signed into law.

The Committee wanted to make certain that this situation would not reoccur this Fall. To accomplish this, Congress passed legislation that became P.L. 110-235 on May 23, 2008. This legislation extends the authorization through March 20, 2009 of any program, authority, or provision of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 631 et seq.) or the Small Business Investment Act of 1958 (15 U.S.C. 661 et seq.). This clearly includes the SBIR program, which is contained in Section 9 of the Small Business Act, and will allow the program to continue to operate into next year.

Given that government-wide SBIR policy is established by the Small Business Administration and administered by federal agencies, the Committee wanted to ensure that all federal SBIR entities had a clear understanding of P.L. 110-235. In order to provide this clarity regarding the continuation of the SBIR program after September 30, 2008, please provide written confirmation that your agency does in fact view the statutory authority granted in P.L. 110-235 as being sufficient to extend the authorization of the SBIR program through March 20, 2009. If this is not the case, please provide the legal analysis that your agency has completed that demonstrates that the SBIR program would not be extended for this time period. Given the urgency of this matter, please provide the Committee with a written response by COB Friday, September 12, 2008.

Since April of this year, the Committee on Science and Technology has been attempting to determine the basis for your decision to terminate the Department's participation in the FutureGen Project through a cooperative agreement with the FutureGen Industrial Alliance and to obtain additional information on the justification for the "restructured" FutureGen announced in January of 2008.

Obtaining this information has been a long and tortured process littered with numerous excuses from and delays by the Department's general counsel's office. Between April and June of this year, the Department managed to deliver only four inches of documents while claiming many unsubstantiated privileges. On June 26, 2008, the Committee held a meeting to issue a subpoena for four specific documents. Only a last-minute promise from the White House Counsel's Office to release those documents kept the Committee from issuing a subpoena.

Based on those documents, the Committee sent a letter on July 28, 2008, requesting another set of documents to be delivered by August 18, 2008.¹ Unfortunately, the Department reinstituted its delaying tactics. To date, some of the documents received have not been responsive to our request, and document text has been redacted for unexplained reasons.² On occasion, the Department has unilaterally determined which files to search, despite the Committee's very specific requests.³ The last response was made over a month ago.⁴

Committee staff has made e-mail requests since August for updates on the status of the document production which have not been answered.

Earlier this week, Committee staff telephoned the Department's legal staff, and was told that they were going through additional responsive documents, some of which needed to be reviewed by the White House and the Office of Management and Budget, which would result in additional delays.

The documents are now two months overdue. Therefore, by this letter, we are asking that the documents requested in our July 28, 2008 letter be produced by 5 p.m. on Friday, November 7, 2008, to Room B-374, Rayburn House Office Building.

If this deadline is not met, the Committee will be forced to consider the other options available to it. Dear Mr. President:

Hardworking Americans are bracing for a winter storm that has nothing to do with snow and ice. Many working families are just one emergency away from financial disaster. Escalating costs of home heating, gasoline, food, and health care threaten to leave these families hungry and in the cold. In light of these circumstances, I urge you to provide emergency assistance to help local food banks and other programs meet the rising need this holiday season.

This winter, home energy prices are projected to reach record levels, increasing by more than 15 percent over last year. At the same time, the U.S. Department of Energy is predicting higher demand for home heating because the upcoming winter is expected to be colder than the last. The states' energy assistance directors estimate that with this combination of higher prices and higher usage, the average family will pay \$2,157 for home heating oil this winter, \$693 more than last winter.

Meanwhile, family hunger and food insecurity is on the rise. Last year alone, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) reported that 35.5 million Americans did not have enough money or resources to get food for at least some period during the year. This was an increase of 400,000 over 2005 and an increase of 2.3 million since 2000.

Families in states like Pennsylvania, particularly families with children, increasingly face difficulty meeting the needs to heat their homes and feed their loved ones. This kind of family crisis can have both immediate and longstanding effects. Research shows that babies and toddlers in families struggling to keep up with their home energy needs are more likely to be in poor health, have a higher risk of developmental problems, and have greater food insecurity.

Faced with the choice of eating or heating, many of these families are seeking help from food banks and emergency heating assistance programs. Yet America's food banks are facing critical shortages. Rising demand coupled with sharp drops in federal supplies of excess farm commodities and declining donations have forced food banks to cut back on rations, distribute supplies usually reserved for disaster relief, and in some cases, close their doors because of the lack of federal assistance.

Similarly, rising food costs and limited funding are placing great strain on the Women Infants and Children Nutrition Program (WIC), threatening service to some of the 8.5 million low-income pregnant and postpartum women and young children who participate in the program.

Under your proposed budget for the fiscal year 2008, more than 500,000 low-income women, infants, and children would lose access to food and nutrition services.

I was proud to join the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry Committee in unanimously approving a 2007 Farm Bill that includes over \$5 billion in additional funds for federal food assistance programs. Passage of this bill will provide extra funding for food banks, increase food assistance to working families with high child care costs, and increase food assistance for low-income seniors. While the full Senate continues to work on this important legislation, we must take steps to immediately address the hunger-relief needs of millions of Americans across this nation.

Compounding matters, states report that they have insufficient resources to meet expected demands for home energy assistance. That is why Congress rejected your funding proposal for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), which would have cut the number of households assisted by 1.1 million, from 5.6 million to 4.5 million. Instead, we passed a bill to maintain the LIHEAP block grant at its current level of \$1.98 billion and increase emergency contingency funding by \$250 million to \$431.7 million to meet the expected higher demand in the upcoming winter. Unfortunately, your veto of this bill stopped that relief in its tracks.

America's working men and women, seniors, and children desperately need your immediate help this holiday season. Specifically, I urge you to provide emergency assistance to help local food banks and other programs meet the rising need this winter season. While optimally The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) needs an infusion of \$27 million, I strongly urge you to transfer as much funding as is feasible to shore up America's emergency food supplies throughout the upcoming winter months. I also urge you to approve an appropriation that includes no less than \$5.96 billion to fully fund the WIC program for FY08 and to approve the Farm Bill nutrition funding, including funding for TEFAP and the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), when approved by Congress. Finally, I urge that you use your authority to release the remaining \$20 million in the contingency fund for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

As a nation, we must do all we can to bring light to families facing the darkness of hunger and cold during the holidays and throughout the winter. As we count our blessings in this season of hope, let us bring comfort to those who are vulnerable and need our help.


From June 20, 1946 to August 18, 1958, the United States carried out its nuclear testing program in the Trust Territory of the Marshall Islands. The testing program resulted in the detonation of 67 nuclear devices.

In 1986, the U.S. and Marshall Island representatives negotiated a Compact of Free Association agreement (Compact) with the trust territory, the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI). In part, the Compact provided a settlement for RMI residents affected by nuclear testing, but it wisely contained a provision that allowed Congress to reconsider the Compact's compensation levels in response to "changed circumstances," including new information regarding the testing regime or its impact on the Marshall Islands. The Compact thus gives Congress the responsibility for keeping apprised of new information related to the Marshall Islands that may impact the U.S.'s relationship with the RMI and her people.

We are aware that the Department of Energy (DOE) has previously released declassified documentation with respect to our nuclear testing program carried out in the Pacific. As a part of Congress's oversight responsibility, we respectfully request a meeting with the appropriate DOE officials to discuss the release of additional documents related to the Marshall Islands and the U.S.'s nuclear testing activities.

The federal government is responsible for maintaining and protecting sensitive Personally Identifiable Information (PII) that Americans are required to provide for a wide array of reasons, including paying taxes, receiving medical and disability benefits, and obtaining retirement compensation. This PII includes names, addresses, Social Security numbers, biometric records, and other data that is linked or linkable to an individual. Identity theft and fraud are national problems that have affected more than 10 million Americans so it is critical the federal government take steps to ensure PII does not fall into the wrong hands.

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) is responsible for establishing government-wide policies and for providing guidance to agencies on how to implement the provisions of the Federal Information Security Management Act of 2002 (FISMA), the Privacy Act, and other federal information security and privacy laws. Since February 2005, OMB has issued the following Memoranda related to the protection of PII:

Following the May 2006 Department of Veterans Affairs data breach, the GAO conducted an analysis of the 24 major federal agencies' progress in developing policies and documented procedures that respond to guidance from OMB to protect PII that is either accessed remotely or physically transported outside an agency's secured physical perimeter. The GAO focused in particular on agency compliance with Memorandum M-06-16: Protection of Sensitive Agency Information.

This Memorandum directs agencies to: (A) encrypt all data on mobile computers/devices that carry agency data; (B) allow remote access only with two-factor authentication, where one factor is provided by a device separate from the computer gaining access; (C) use a "time-out" function for remote access and mobile devices requiring user re-authentication after 30 minutes of inactivity; (D) log all computer-readable data extracts from databases holding sensitive information and verify that each extract including sensitive data has been erased within 90 days; and (E) use a NIST security checklist, included in the memo, that provides specific actions to be taken by agencies to protect PII that is either accessed remotely or physically transported outside an agency's secured physical perimeter.

We are writing you today because the GAO indicated the Department of Energy does not have policies in place to address recommendation E listed above. Accordingly, we ask that you provide in writing a timeline for when you expect to have policies in place to address the recommendations of OMB Memorandum M-06-16. Additionally, we ask that you provide in writing the status of your compliance and/or a timeline for compliance with the recommendations in OMB Memoranda M-05-08, M-06-15, M-06-19, M-06-20, and M-07-16.


According to the GAO, the security breaches at agencies throughout the federal government highlight the importance of effective information security controls to protect personally identifiable information. Loss of such information may lead to identity theft or other fraudulent use of the information, resulting in substantial harm, embarrassment, and inconvenience to individuals. As the federal government obtains and processes information about individuals in increasingly diverse ways, it is critically important that it ensure the privacy rights of individuals are respected and that personal information is properly secured and protected.



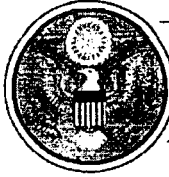

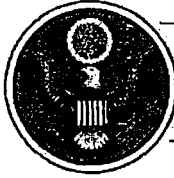

It has come to our attention that you have approved the re-location of the Department of Energy's Office of Intelligence and Counterintelligence (IN) to a facility owned by SAIC, located in the Tyson's Corner area. We understand that personnel are to be moved to the new location in December 2008.





We are seeking clarifications regarding the mission and staffing of the Department of Energy's Office of Intelligence and Counterintelligence (IN). Recent congressional briefings provided by IN officials to the U.S. Senate have brought to our attention potential inconsistencies that require clarification from the Department.

The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence was informed by the Office of Management and Budget on September 12, 2008, that OMB had received from IN written responses to OMB's inquiries, which stated that the Energy and Environment Security Directorate of the Office of Intelligence and Counterintelligence consisted of 1 full time employee, plus one reimbursable detailee. This information is contrary to other IN documents obtained by the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, which state that the Energy and Environment Security Directorate as of October 2008 included 6 full time federal employees, one reimbursable detailee, 2 contractors, and 2 vacant positions. **Please clarify the number of positions and budget of the Energy and Environment Security Directorate.**

The Director of IN briefed the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources and the Subcommittee on Energy and Water of the Senate Committee on Appropriations on October 9, 2008, and stated that all division directors within IN's analytical directorate (i.e., IN-10) would remain at the Forrestal Building, to be available to brief the Secretary of Energy and senior staff. The Director stated that the remainder of IN's staff will be relocated 15 miles away to a SAIC-owned facility in Tysons Corner, Virginia. The Committee has been informed that these same division directors have been told that they will be moving to Tysons Corner, and that virtually the entire Nuclear Proliferation Division, including the NPD Division Director, will be relocated to the new facility. **Please clarify which of the directorate and division heads will remain based at the Forrestal Building and which will be based in Virginia. Additionally, please describe how the rationale behind these decisions and the changes were communicated to DOE staff.**

The Director of IN stated at the Belfer Center Breakfast on Capitol Hill on July 16, 2008, that Energy Security ranked as IN's top priority. However, the strategic priorities included in IN's Congressional Budget Justification do not include energy security and the Members of the

Senate Select Committee on Intelligence have not been formally notified of any change in IN's priorities. We note that the Energy Security Division budget is less than one percent of IN's total budget. Please clarify where Energy Security ranks in the priorities of the Office of Intelligence and Counterintelligence. If there has been a change, please describe when this change was made, as well as steps the Department took to notify Congress. For reference, IN's Congressional Budget Justification includes the following strategic priorities:

1. leading the IC in nuclear terrorism initiatives;
2. strengthening DOE's Counterintelligence to reduce human and cyber threats;
3. becoming the "gold standard" of technological excellence in terms of proliferation;
4. initiating strategic S&T surprise projects with DOE's Labs.

Finally, we remain concerned about the lack of congressional notification regarding the Department's plans to relocate (IN) to Virginia. As you know, any reallocation of current year or prior year funding for this relocation requires written notification to Congress. Should the Department decide to proceed with this move, we expect to receive such notification in a timely manner.

Thank you again for meeting with us on December 5, 2007, to discuss your draft action plan to address the health and environmental impacts of uranium contamination in the Navajo Nation. We believe that implementation of the federal agency action plans will begin to address these impacts, and we encourage you to proceed as rapidly as possible, consistent with your consultation responsibilities to the Navajo Nation. These action plans, however, are only a beginning.

The draft action plans do not clearly delineate a course of action for fully resolving the problem. Given the extent of the contamination that is already known, it is obvious that the contamination cannot and will not be cleaned up in the 3- to 9-month timeframes covered by the draft plans. We need a 5-year plan from each agency that sets out specific cleanup objectives, specific timeframes for achieving those objectives, and the new authorities and funding, if any, necessary to achieve those objectives. These plans will provide the Congress, the Navajo Nation, and the public with concrete benchmarks against which to measure the progress of the federal agencies in cleaning up the contamination.

We therefore request that your agency prepare a 5-year action plan for addressing uranium contamination in the Navajo Nation. We are making a similar request of each of the other responsible agencies. In developing your plan, please work with the other agencies to ensure that the federal response is coordinated and effective. The 5-year action plan should specify its cleanup objectives and include specific timeframes and cost estimates for achieving those objectives.

Among the specific objectives that one or more of the 5-year action plans should address are:

- Assessment of structures and water sources that are likely to be contaminated;
- Cleanup of all structures found to be contaminated above safe levels;
- Provision of alternate water supplies for residents consuming contaminated water;
- Tiered assessment of abandoned mines, with more detailed assessments of those most likely to pose environmental or health problems;
- Cleanup of the Northeast Churchrock mine site and additional high-priority abandoned mine sites;
- Cleanup of the Tuba City Highway 160 site;
- Cleanup of the Tuba City dump;
- Remediation of groundwater contamination at the three mill sites; and
- Conduct of one or more case control studies of health risks faced by individuals residing near mill sites or abandoned mine sites.

We request that you provide the Committee with your agency's draft 5-year action plan by February 19, 2008. If you have any questions regarding this request, please contact Jeff Baran or Andy Schneider of the Committee staff at (202) 225-4407.

Currently, there are approximately 2400 people employed by either the Department of Energy or one of its contractors to do work on the Yucca Mountain project, and 85 percent of those workers live in the Las Vegas area.


As a delegation we have been working tirelessly to stop the Yucca Mountain project. We believe that the dangers it would expose our residents to and the economic harm it would bring to our state is irrevocable. At the meeting, you should be prepared to present and **discuss** (1) DOE's portion of the five-year plan, (2) any resources or authorizations the agency **needs** from Congress to implement the plan, and (3) any progress to date on implementation of the plan.

In preparation for our meeting on May 15, staff from the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform and the relevant federal agencies will meet on **May 5, 2008**, at 2:00 p.m. in Room 2203 of the **Rayburn House Office Building**. The meeting will allow for preliminary discussions of the draft five-year plan.



We write to express serious concern with reports that the Department of Energy (DOE) intends to destroy 500 boxes filled with documents containing historical information about the Rocky Flats Plant and strongly urge you to reconsider this decision. Although DOE representatives have stated that electronic copies will be made available on the Internet for public use, archiving the original, hard copies of the 500-box collection of documents is the only way to guarantee that the public will have access to the historical record of the Rocky Flats Plant for years to come.

As you know, until recently, the documents at issue were housed at the Rocky Flats Reading Room at Front Range Community College in Westminster, Colorado. Plans to move the 500-box collection to the University of Colorado at Boulder changed upon the DOE's discovery that personal information was included in some documents, such as Social Security numbers. Despite the University of Colorado's significant experience in archiving and protecting documents containing sensitive, personal information, DOE opted for the irreversible option of destroying the original historical record of the Rocky Flats Plant.

Furthermore, DOE's assertion that all of the information contained in the 500-box document collection can be found within the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act Administrative Record, thus alleviating DOE's need to maintain the records, is simply not true. There are several documents that are unique to the collection and cannot be found elsewhere.

As a whole, the 500-box collection of documents offers a unique view into the history of the former Rocky Flats Plant and should be archived and preserved. Too many individuals rely upon the information contained within the historical record of the Rocky Flats Plant. The history embedded within its pages could potentially help a Rocky Flats Plant worker receive compensation under the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program (EEOICPA). Maintaining the collection in Colorado would


provide necessary access to past energy employees who continue to reside in Colorado and who may have no or limited access to the Internet. Moreover, the University of Colorado has expressed a strong interest in acquiring the 500-box collection of documents and offered its archiving and preservation services free of charge to DOE. Furthermore, the University has developed safeguards to protect sensitive personal information.

No one would deny that protecting an individual's personal information is essential for avoiding identity theft and other types of fraud, but a top University has safeguards in place to protect it. Your decision to destroy the historical record of the Rocky Flats Plant creates the wrong perception in the minds of the public and raises questions about DOE's intentions. Any concerns that DOE may have can be resolved and does not warrant the destruction of the collection in its entirety.

The 500-box collection of documents and records should be archived at the University of Colorado at Boulder and made permanently available to the people of Colorado for generations to come. Again, I strongly urge you to reconsider destroying these documents. I would appreciate a written response to this letter with explicit reasons why the University of Colorado at Boulder could not adequately protect the Rocky Flats Plant document collection. I look forward to your reply.

Organizations and functions under your direction are categorized as high risk programs by the Government Accountability Office (GAO). While limited progress in addressing identified problems pertaining to contract management within the Department of Energy (DOE) has been made, these programs were designated as being at high risk in 1990 and continue to be so today.

I am writing to express my concern that these programs continue to be designated as high risk after 18 years. In fact, in May 2007 GAO again cited additional concerns and reiterated the lack of progress in improving project management and oversight. One project has reportedly experienced significant schedule and technical problems and the estimated cost more than tripled to \$230 million. It is evident that taxpayers are not receiving full value for funds expended by DOE and contract requirements are not being properly managed. Please provide me with documents detailing the thresholds for contract cost and schedule overruns that trigger executive management review and any DOE policies in place to ensure award fees are managed and expended appropriately.

It is well understood that institutional change is often complex and takes both time and resources to transform these often unwieldy programs. However, strategic planning and budgeting can yield staggering results with disciplined management and oversight. As Secretary, you are uniquely positioned to guide this process.

The DOE currently has 60 reports with multiple issues identified by the GAO that remain outstanding. What actions has DOE taken to address these issues and achieve removal from the GAO high risk list in January 2009? Your prompt response is greatly appreciated.

Please submit a response to question 1 by July 18, 2008, preferably in both a hard copy and an electronic format. For the response to question 2, please submit a hard copy and a searchable excel version on CD by August 1, 2008. 

We strongly urge you to consider leaving a significant and permanent legacy in East Tennessee by seeing several important Oak Ridge DOE projects through to completion before you leave office.

Land Transfers – Local officials have made a few very reasonable and targeted land transfer requests to meet economic development and self-sufficiency goals. These properties are excess DOE parcels and each one meets DOE requirements. The original intent of the land transfer legislation was to help local governments and organizations offset the negative impacts caused by DOE's ownership of 33,699 acres in the community.

The American Museum of Science and Energy (AMSE) submitted a proposal to transfer the museum and associated parcels 483, 279.01 and G. The proceeds from the sale of the additional parcels will allow the foundation to create an endowment to operate the museum. Future funding for AMSE has been a problem for many years and finally DOE-OR, the City of Oak Ridge and the community have agreed on a solution.

The City of Oak Ridge has requested DOE transfer parcel ED-6 for economic development. DOE has no need for the property and the city plans to develop the parcel for badly needed residential housing, which is compatible with existing land uses. These requests have been turned down or remain unresolved and we urge you to quickly approve these land transfers.

USEC Loan Guarantee – We urge you to make timely determinations that will lead to firm commitments for DOE loan guarantees for the American Centrifuge Plant. This project will play an essential role in meeting our nation's energy and national security

needs. A majority of the research and development, along with the manufacturing for this facility, is being completed at USEC Inc's Oak Ridge facilities.

Medicare Part D – The Medicare Modernization Act of 2003 set up that prescription drug plan, known as Medicare Part D, for Medicare beneficiaries. Under the program the government provides Medicare Part D funds to employers for prescription drug coverage for their Medicare eligible retirees. Currently, DOE is treating those Medicare Part D receipts as collections accruing to the contractor in connections with its work under the contract and DOE would claim those funds before they could be passed on to the retirees. The contractors should be encouraged to apply for Medicare Part D subsidies, DOE should not treat those subsidies as collections, and the subsidy should be passed on to the Medicare eligible retirees consistent with the intended purpose of the program.

Retiree Benefits – Inflation and the rising costs of health care make it increasingly difficult for the neediest retirees to get by on their pensions. The retirees, widows and widowers at the bottom of the scale need an increase in their meager monthly benefits. Our lowest-paid retirees receive \$600 per month and spouses of deceased retirees receive only \$400. A 14 percent increase would cost the contractors an estimated \$4.1 million and would have little or no impact on the long-term fiscal health of the pension fund. The increase would raise monthly pensions to \$684 and \$456 respectively for these two groups of retirees. The contractors support this minimal increase and we wholeheartedly urge you to implement this small, humanitarian adjustment.

With many years of effort spent on behalf of each of these endeavors, we urge you to bring them to a close before you leave office as part of your lasting legacy at DOE. Thank you for your consideration.



We are writing to request your support to complete the transfer of excess facilities and materials at the Idaho National Laboratory to the Office of Environmental Management (EM) this year.

When the INL was created, inadequately informed decisions were made about which facilities and materials would transfer to EM and which would remain with the Office of Nuclear Energy (NE). While the EM program and its contractor have made great progress addressing cleanup issues at the site, NE has not had the resources to address the INL's environmental management legacy.

Congress has made it clear that cleanup work and waste disposition ought to be handled by the EM program and we believe it makes no sense for the INL to begin executing cleanup work when a cleanup contractor is already operating at the site.


In order for DOE to meet its commitment to build the new INL and to complete its environmental obligations, we request that all unfunded legacy liabilities assigned to NE at transition be immediately and unconditionally transferred to EM and that the 2010 congressional budget request include language that finalizes this transfer.

We also wish to express our disappointment in the continued under funding of the INL infrastructure in the DOE's annual budget request. Numerous assessments including the recent review by the National Academy of Sciences have found this to be the case. We will continue to work with our colleagues in the Congress to direct the Department toward an adequate level of funding for the INL and all critical R&D infrastructure.

We also note that the State of Idaho and the DOE have made great progress resolving their differences over the remediation of buried waste. This expected agreement reflects the State of Idaho's desire to support the INL's role as the lead nuclear laboratory.

The INL has enormous potential to help meet the energy demands of this nation and to support critical national security missions. In the past three years we have been pleased to see new work at the site and a great deal of support from other federal sponsors. DOE and specifically NE remain our primary sponsors and we wish to continue to work with both to achieve mutual objectives through a clear understanding of mutual expectations.



We understand that the Department of Energy (DOE) is assessing various approaches to the disposition of DOE's high-assay depleted uranium tails (tails). Given the nearly 10-fold increase in uranium prices, a portion of the 560,000 metric tons of depleted uranium inventory can be economically re-enriched and sold for at least \$2 billion. How DOE decides to manage this asset will determine whether the benefits flow to American taxpayers or private interests.

The Committee on Energy and Commerce and its Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations asked the Government Accountability Office (GAO) to evaluate various models to re-enrich the economically valuable tails and return the proceeds to the U.S. Treasury.

One legislative proposal calls for DOE to enter into a contract with United States Enrichment Corporation on a sole source basis to re-enrich these tails, but this arrangement "presents numerous business risks; moreover, sole source contracting will diminish the Government's bargaining power to maximize returns on behalf of taxpayers.

One alternative to a sole source contracting arrangement is to sell the tails outright in an auction to qualified buyers. This could be a very simple transaction. Using a competitive auction, the buyers would pay DOE cash for the tails, enrich the tails at their own cost, and return the remaining low-assay tails to DOE for disposition. We believe market-based business models should be explored and market interest tested as an option to assess the best outcome for taxpayers.

To test whether there might be market interest, we recommend that the Department issue a request for **expressions** of interest (RFI). The RFI should test market interest on matters such as duration of sales contracts, preferred lot size, overall quantity that **might** be acquired relative to constraints on available **uranium** enrichment capacity, and legal and policy **issues** that need to be considered. To calibrate market interest, DOE will need to inform the public on the specific quantities of available tails for each assay.

We are writing to express our concern regarding the February 19-21, 2008, workshop jointly announced by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Department of Energy on February 6, 2008, to explore the "technical issues and research topics for potential extended operation of the nation's nuclear power plants beyond 60 years." The initiation of this effort without consideration of recent assessments that identify re-licensing problems is both troubling and ill-advised.

With safety and public health concerns plaguing many of the nation's 104 aging nuclear power plants – from collapsed cooling towers, to football-sized holes in vessel reactors, missed deadlines for emergency warning sirens, and the release of radioactive materials into our rivers and groundwater – it is irresponsible for your agencies to begin a process to consider the potential for license extensions beyond an already-lengthy 60 years.

The Atomic Energy Act and NRC regulations limit commercial power reactor licenses to an initial 40 years, but also permit such licenses to be renewed for additional 20-year periods. The Department and the Commission have repeatedly assured Congress and the public that the original 40-year term for reactor licenses was based on economic and antitrust considerations – not on the limitations of nuclear technology. Yet, repeated safety incidents at nuclear power facilities underscore that structures and components of nuclear power plants were engineered for an expected 40-year service life and are now experiencing strain due to extended operations and boosted power output levels.

We are concerned that the NRC already faces significant challenges in meeting its current safety oversight functions with respect to aging plants:

- In 2006, the Government Accountability Office released a report on safety oversight, which concluded that the NRC "has been slow to act on needed improvements, particularly in improving the agency's ability to identify and address early indications of declining safety."

- Last fall, the NRC Inspector General highlighted significant problems with the current re-licensing process, including the troubling finding that the Commission frequently lifted language verbatim from a licensee's re-license application to incorporate into NRC reports.
- The NRC issued Generic Letter 2007-01 to its licensees last May about unexpected age-related failures of power cables. The NRC solicited information from licensees about cable failures at their facilities and the programs in place to monitor cable aging.

Given these recent reports, it is highly premature for your agencies to begin looking at extending the lifetimes of the current nuclear fleet beyond an already-lengthy 60 years, when in fact many of those plants should no longer be operating. Additionally, we believe that enough evidence exists to warrant a reexamination of the license renewal regulations and to restrict unlimited 20-year facility life extensions. Rather than hold workshops to initiate theoretical discussions of possible plant life extensions beyond 60 years, which would take place in 2020 at the earliest, we ask that you provide answers to the following questions regarding real safety problems at our nation's nuclear power plants:


1. What actions have you already taken and/or plan to take in response to the GAO's September 2006 report?
2. What assessment methods will be used to determine if the steps taken in response to the GAO's report successfully resolved the GAO's recommendations?
3. What actions have you already taken and/or plan to take in response to the NRC Inspector General's report on license renewal?
4. What assessment methods will be used to determine if the steps taken in response to the Inspector General's report successfully resolved those recommendations?
5. Why did the NRC wait until May of 2007 to issue Generic Letter 2007-01 addressing safety concerns raised by cable problems identified at Oyster Creek (1996), Oconee (1999) and Davis-Besse (2004)?
6. How did the NRC's nuclear plant aging research (NPAR) program and generic aging lessons learned (GALL) program fail to predict and prevent the recurring age-related cable failures? In other words, the lessons learned by the 1996 failure at Oyster Creek should have prevented the 1999 failure at Oconee and the 2004 failure at Davis-Besse. Furthermore, the 1996 failure at Oyster Creek and the 1999 failure at Oconee should have prevented the 2004 failure at Davis-Besse.
7. What actions have you already taken and/or plan to take to identify and plug any other gaps in the NRC's license renewal program similar to the gap implicitly conceded in Generic Letter 2007-01?

Given our concerns about safety related issues at aging nuclear plants, and the concerns of our constituents, we look forward to your prompt reply.

I have received a copy of a letter from Mr. Sergey Kiriyeenko, Director of Russia's State Corporation on Atomic Energy (ROSATOM). The letter comments on an amendment which I sponsored that was added by the Senate to the supplemental appropriations bill H.R. 2642. The amendment offers commercial incentives for Russia to downblend an additional 300 metric tons of highly enriched uranium (HEU). I will take this opportunity to address the concerns Mr. Kiriyeenko raises, correct some apparent misunderstandings he has about the language and offer my own views.

The issue of Russian access to the U.S. nuclear fuel market is an important one. There are essential interests to balance in ensuring adequate supply to our growing nuclear industry and advancing global nonproliferation interests. I believe it is the current status quo, and not my legislation, that fails to strike a proper balance.

In his letter, Mr. Kiriyeenko expresses concern about uncertainty in the U.S. market for nuclear fuel. I share his concern. Promoting market certainty is a major motivation of my amendment, second only to national security.

It is important to view this letter in the context of current uranium trade policies. Despite advocating for market certainty, Russian interests have pursued a legal defense of a trade policy that eliminates any restrictions on Russian imports. The overwhelming uncertainty that exists in the market today would benefit Russia enormously, to the detriment of U.S. suppliers.

Mr. Kiriyeenko points out that my amendment would allow Russia to supply anywhere from 17% to 25% of U.S. demand depending on its HEU downblending activities. He instead offers support for the Amendment to the Russian Suspension Agreement signed in February, the text of which provides Russia with 20% of the market, without any incentive to reduce its HEU stockpiles. Mr. Kiriyeenko fails to point out that under current law the Suspension Agreement provides no limitation on Russian enrichment

services. Therefore contracts to deliver low enriched uranium under enrichment contracts are deemed to be contracts for services and are not covered by the 20% limitation in the Suspension Agreement.

The level of Russian access to the U.S. market is particularly relevant due to the concerns over unfair market competition expressed by the Department of Commerce in its recent sunset review of the Suspension Agreement. In June 2006, the Commerce Department found that removing limits on Russian imports would likely lead to a continuation or recurrence of injurious dumping.¹ In September 2007, the Commerce Department reaffirmed its conclusion that that “dumping is likely to continue” and that “imports of Russian uranium and SWU would likely undercut and depress, or suppress, U.S.-market prices for uranium products” unless continued protections are provided.² Among the evidence cited by Commerce in support of its determination was a quote from the former Russian Minister for Atomic Energy that “we shall always supply our fuel at 30% less than western producers.”

Mr. Kiriyenko also took strong exception to the provision of our text that forbids Russia any commercial access if it backs out of the current HEU deal. This is puzzling as my text only applies in a situation where the Secretary of Energy “determines that the Russian Federation has taken deliberate action to disrupt or halt the importation into the United States of low-enriched uranium under the Russian HEU Agreement.” If Russia acts in good faith to implement the Agreement, as they have for over a decade, there should be no concern. Mr. Kiriyenko also fails to point out that I even took steps to provide Russia greater commercial access while the HEU deal is being implemented.

Finally, the letter states that Russia considers its HEU to be a “valuable energy resource,” and notes Russia’s own nuclear energy needs and desire for exports to other regions of the world. Perhaps Mr. Kiriyenko is misinterpreting my legislation. I fully recognize Russia’s legitimate interest in using its HEU—as it sees fit—to promote the peaceful use of nuclear energy. That is why I have gone to great lengths to draft legislation that gives Russia the greatest flexibility possible. Under my amendment, Russia need only blend its HEU to less than 20%. It may keep the resulting low enriched uranium (LEU) for use domestically or sell it on the global market. Unlike the existing HEU Agreement, Russia would not be forced to produce 1.5% enriched blendstock to meet U.S. reactor fuel specifications, resulting in major cost savings.

My legislation not only makes it easier for Russia to downblend HEU, it includes significant rewards for Russia if it does. The expanded market access is worth two to three hundred million dollars each year. Russia can also contract directly with U.S. utilities, without having to go through a third party, something I know is important to Russia.

I hope you will engage Mr. Kiriyenko directly and explain these points to him. As head of ROSATOM no doubt understands the importance of eliminating surplus stocks of weapons usable material.

It is with great alarm that I write you concerning your recent agreement with King Abdullah of Saudi Arabia regarding nuclear energy cooperation. Your decision to assist Saudi Arabia with the development of nuclear technology is inexplicable given that country's bountiful energy reserves, but more disturbingly, it is deeply flawed given the extraordinary tension in the Middle East today over Iran's nuclear program. I urge you to reconsider this decision and to not begin or continue any discussion or negotiations with the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia on a formal Agreement for Nuclear Cooperation.


As you know, Saudi Arabia possesses the world's largest proven oil reserves. It remains a mystery to me why a country with such vast and inexpensive energy resources would be interested in nuclear energy, which is a far more technically challenging, expensive, and dangerous energy source. I do not believe that Saudi Arabia has made or could make a cogent case for why nuclear energy is in its economic interests, given its other energy resources.

Another country in the region with enormous oil and gas resources, Iran, has argued that nuclear energy is a cost-effective and necessary investment for domestic energy production. But that argument has proven unpersuasive both to our allies and here in the United States. On October 25, 2004, Vice President Dick Cheney said, "[Iran is] already sitting on an awful lot of oil and gas. Nobody can figure why they need nuclear, as well, too, to generate energy." Vice President Cheney was right in saying that Iran has no need for nuclear power, and the same can be said regarding Saudi Arabia today.

If Saudi Arabia is truly interested in diversifying its energy portfolio, I am puzzled that your administration would not have offered technologies and expertise in the renewable energy area, especially solar energy. A square kilometer of desert typically receives solar energy equivalent to 1.5 million barrels of oil. Under the previous administration, the U.S. Department of Energy joined with the King Abdulaziz City for Science and Technology in Riyadh on a comprehensive joint solar radiation resource project to assess the solar energy capability of the Saudi Kingdom. Further engagement on both solar energy research and deployment would help both the United States and Saudi Arabia move towards a more sustainable energy and economic future.

I am concerned that Saudi Arabia's interest in acquiring U.S. nuclear assistance has nothing to do with energy and everything to do with Middle East politics. By receiving a pledge of support from the United States on nuclear technology, Saudi Arabia is sending a signal to the leaders of Iran that if Tehran continues down the nuclear path Riyadh will do so as well. It would be folly for the United States to enable and encourage such a dangerous cycle. I urge you to reconsider this decision, and to immediately halt any further discussions or negotiations with the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia on the development of nuclear technology.

We are writing to express concern regarding the availability of adequate supplies of Helium 3 gas needed for the manufacture of neutron detectors used in homeland security instruments. We would appreciate your prompt attention and action to resolve this situation.

Helium 3 gas-filled neutron detectors are used in radiation detection systems, hand-held portal monitors, and an assortment of specialized devices used by the Department of Homeland Security and the Department of Defense, as well as state and local first responders. Helium 3 is the technology of choice because of its low cost, high sensitivity and low false alarm rate. The Department of Energy (DOE) plays a critical role in all of these programs by serving as the only U.S.-based source of Helium 3 gas. It is our understanding that the only currently viable alternative source of this gas is from Russia. Accessing this supply would first require Russian suppliers to be willing and able to sell to U.S. companies. We hope that you share our concern that this important element of our nation's homeland security strategy not become overly dependent on foreign suppliers.

The Department's last auction sale of Helium 3 occurred in July 2006. Industry needs new supplies now in order to meet current and future demand created by various governmental homeland security programs. However, it is our understanding that the Department does not plan to begin the sales process for the next release of Helium 3 gas until fall, at the earliest. We question the rationale behind the delay in releasing additional quantities of Helium 3, and are concerned that the existing supply will be used before additional gas becomes available, resulting in disruption to the testing and production of new technologies to protect against a nuclear attack.


Over the long term, there is substantial uncertainty regarding the outlook for DOE's continued production of Helium 3 for sale to industry. We question how the periodic auction process provides reasonable assurance that a stable supply of gas will be available to justify greater investment by the commercial sector. Greater clarity is needed regarding the projected future availability of Helium 3 from the Department, the timing of releases, and the mechanisms that will be available to allocate available supplies.



We would appreciate learning how the Department proposes to address the near-term need for Helium 3 gas. Additionally, we would be interested in learning of the Department's future production plans, including how much of that production is likely to be released for sale to industry. Finally, we would like to understand the extent to which the Department coordinates with the Department of Homeland Security to ensure that an adequate supply of Helium 3 will be available to meet the need for neutron detectors for use in the interdiction of fissile nuclear materials.

The undersigned members of the California Congressional delegation respectfully request that the U.S. Department of Energy (USDOE) provide the technical and fiscal resources needed to replace the nation's sole potential domestic source of Iodine-125 (I-125) production located at the University of California, Davis McClellan Nuclear Radiation Center (MNRC).

The MNRC is the newest research reactor in the United States. It began operation in 1990 and has about 30 years of productive service life remaining. The reactor is a custom designed TRIGA (Training, Research and Isotope Production General Atomics) reactor with capability to operate at a steady-state power level of up to 2 Megawatts (MW) and can pulse to approximately 1,000 MW for 20 milliseconds.

In July 2001, UC Davis/MNRC entered into an agreement with USDOE for an I-125 loop patent license. The technology for producing I-125 in a nuclear reactor was first developed at the USDOE's Sandia facility. USDOE personnel assisted in the transfer of this technology from Sandia as well as construction of the production system at MNRC. The first production of I-125 commenced at MNRC in January 2002. By 2004, nine out of the 13 pharmaceutical companies selling I-125 were receiving it from MNRC. However, in April 2004, the loop system experienced its fourth failure causing production to cease. The production system remains inoperable today.

MNRC was the sole domestic supplier of I-125 until production failed and it remains the only existing potential domestic supply source for the material. Our nation's primary supply of I-125 from Canada is now also jeopardized due to changes occurring with Canada's nuclear facilities. Soon, our nation may be faced with no North American supplier of this critical isotope, and potentially no path to reinstituting the production loop at MNRC.

UC Davis initially assumed responsibility and stewardship of the MNRC reactor as part of its public service to the nation. The MNRC has supported the U.S. Air Force and the Department of Defense in their respective missions and more recently has produced the I-125 radioisotopes to support the treatment of prostate cancer. MNRC is also an excellent facility for training nuclear engineering, physics, and other students that will be needed for our country's future, as recognized by the America Competes Act.

To date, UC Davis has invested millions of dollars in the operation and maintenance of MNRC with an implicit understanding and expectation that it would eventually receive some additional federal financial support for the facility. The campus was able to operate MNRC, albeit with continued institutional investment and subsidy, given revenue generated from I-125 sales. Now that the loop system is inoperable, the sales revenue is gone, and limited other resources exist to support MNRC's operations, UC Davis now faces the very real prospect of having to close the facility. Simply stated, UC Davis can no longer continue to provide the sole support for a facility that serves a national need without receiving some financial support from the federal government.

Over the past two years, UC Davis and MNRC staff has been working with USDOE's Office of Nuclear Energy personnel to secure the resources needed to replace the defective loop system, thereby permitting restored production of I-125. Campus personnel estimate replacing the defective system will cost approximately \$900,000. Unfortunately, to date, the campus' requests for assistance to the USDOE Office of Nuclear Energy have not been approved.

The undersigned members of the California Congressional delegation respectfully request that you reconsider the campus' request for \$900,000 of federal assistance. These funds would enable the restoration of I-125 production for our nation, and through that production permit MNRC's continued operation. Without such revenue, UC Davis may need to decommission a facility that has clearly demonstrated its ability to serve national needs.

We thank you for your prompt consideration and action on this critical national issue.

**Restore UC Davis - McClellan Nuclear Radiation Center -
The only domestic producer of I-125 - an isotope used to help
diagnose/treat prostate cancer.**

Dear California Colleague:

Please join us in cosigning the attached letter to help secure federal funding needed to restore the McClellan Nuclear Radiation Center (MNRC), which is located in Sacramento, California. The MNRC is a research facility owned and operated by the University of California, Davis. In 2001, UC Davis was convinced by the Department of Energy (DOE) to purchase an Iodine loop production system owned by the DOE. The DOE assisted with the transfer of technology and the construction of the production system. In January 2002, production started and the MNRC became the only facility in the United States capable of producing Iodine 125 (I-125). By 2004, nine out of the 13 pharmaceutical companies selling I-125 were receiving it from MNRC.

I-125 is a radioisotope used in a variety of applications worldwide. These range from medical treatment and diagnostics, as well as on-going biomedical research. One of the most important uses of I-125 is to clinically test thyroid disorders. The most common use for I-125 is for the treatment of prostate cancer. Currently, the majority of the U.S. demand for I-125 is met by suppliers located in Canada, with several smaller suppliers located in Russia and Eastern Europe. When production failed in 2004, there ceased to be a domestic supply of I-125. The production system remains inoperable today.


MNRC remains the only existing potential domestic supply source for I-125. Our nation's primary supply of I-125 from Canada is now also jeopardized due to changes occurring with Canada's nuclear facilities. Soon, our nation may be faced with no North American supplier of this critical isotope, and potentially no path to reinstitute the production loop at MNRC.

In 2006, the DOE made an initial offer of a \$600,000 grant to create an operational I-125 loop system. Unfortunately, due to budgetary constraints, the DOE subsequently rescinded that offer. Now the cost to restore this facility is \$900,000.

We encourage the California congressional delegation to join us in urging the Secretary of the Department of Energy to revisit its decision to rescind the initial grant offer, and search for an alternative source of funding for the replacement system. Given the critical importance of I-125 production domestically, it is our belief that DOE ought to move immediately to explore any and all opportunities to secure the availability of this life-saving radioisotope. The MNRC is uniquely positioned to help DOE achieve that goal.

Dear Secretary Bodman:

I am writing to call your attention to an urgent problem that is unique to Southern California, and that I believe the Department of Energy can help solve. The problem is the removal of spent fuel from a nuclear research reactor site in La Jolla, California. While strong measures are in place to protect the fuel – which includes bomb-grade, highly enriched uranium (HEU) and related material – it is still a potentially attractive target for terrorists.

The risk of an incident involving this sensitive nuclear material is slight, but it is an unnecessary risk. I believe it can be eliminated by transferring the material to a DOE facility. Indeed, I believe that not to transfer this material out of the densely populated Southern California area would be a mistake. As explained below, it is my understanding that DOE can play an important role in solving this problem, and I urge you to do so.

By way of background: the spent nuclear fuel is from two research reactors that were operated by General Atomics. Both reactors have now been shut down. Despite the best efforts of General Atomics, the spent fuel continues to be stored at their facility in La Jolla. In the unlikely, but not impossible, event that terrorists gained access to the uranium, the HEU could conceivably be used in a rudimentary nuclear device or a radioactive “dirty bomb.” In addition to HEU, the spent fuel includes low enriched uranium (LEU), which could likewise be used to form a “dirty bomb.”

Fortunately, there is ample authority for the spent fuel to be removed from the site under existing law. The Atomic Energy Act authorizes the Department of Energy to "take ... or otherwise acquire any special nuclear material or any interest therein" to the extent the Department deems it necessary to carry out the Act. According to longstanding DOE policy and practice, this authority was not abrogated by the subsequent enactment of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act (NWPA).

Moreover, DOE has already authorized eight shipments of spent fuel from General Atomics. That authorization, in a 1996 DOE Record of Decision amendment, was supported by an environmental impact statement. Yet none of those shipments has taken place. The HEU and LEU stored at the General Atomics facility could be removed in no more than three shipments.

I have learned that the Department of Justice may have concerns about whether the removal of this spent fuel would prejudice the government's position in litigation relating to the NWPA. I believe those concerns are not well founded, for reasons that include the following:

- The spent fuel at issue here is unique: it is the only privately owned HEU stored at the site of a permanently shut-down reactor in the United States;
- This unique HEU is more sensitive, and potentially more dangerous, than the LEU at issue in the other NWPA lawsuits;
- The NWPA, by its terms, applies to "civilian nuclear power reactors," and does not address the much different circumstances of research reactors like the ones at issue here;
- The quantity of spent nuclear fuel at the General Atomics site is orders of magnitude less than the quantity at any civilian power reactor site;
- The research performed at the General Atomics reactors was primarily done for the government, and if the spent fuel were government-owned it would already be stored by DOE;
- General Atomics has stated its willingness to pay for the fuel's removal and to drop its pending NWPA lawsuit once the fuel is removed; and



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- The General Atomics site can be decontaminated and converted to another use as soon as the HEU and LEU are removed, because the reactors on the site have been shut down.

If the HEU were located in a foreign country, it would be a top-priority national security interest to ship it to a secure DOE facility within the United States – and such transfers of foreign nuclear waste have already occurred on several occasions. It should be at least of equal importance to move the spent fuel from this densely populated area, which includes important research & development facilities and U.S. military installations, to a secure DOE facility.

I urge you and the Department to recognize that this unique situation can and should be resolved without affecting the vastly different realm of civilian power reactor waste and the related NWPA litigation, and to cooperate with the Department of Justice to ensure the fastest feasible removal of the HEU and LEU from the La Jolla site. I have also written to Attorney General Mukasey to urge his cooperation on this issue.

As part of our ongoing oversight into the threat of nuclear terrorism, the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee is reviewing the readiness of the nation's military and civilian agencies to protect the population of the United States from nuclear terrorism.

The effects of a nuclear attack on the United States are almost beyond comprehension. Even if we only consider the impact that a relatively small 10-kiloton nuclear device would have on a city center, the devastation would be catastrophic. From the epicenter of the blast to a distance of approximately one-third of a mile, every structure would be destroyed and virtually no one would be left alive. In the second circle of destruction, extending three-quarters of a mile from ground zero, buildings would experience devastating structural damage and most people in this ring would be killed or seriously injured. A third circle reaching out one mile would be ravaged by fires and radiation. Downwind of the blast, radioactive debris would begin to spread across the region, potentially exposing tens of thousands of people to lethal doses of radiation. Immediately after such an attack, our country would face challenges that we have never faced before.

Although improved security for nuclear stockpiles and fissile materials in Russia and elsewhere have helped to reduce the risk of nuclear terrorism, the threat of terrorists building or acquiring a nuclear weapon remains. While building an improvised nuclear device remains a difficult undertaking, the frightening truth is that simple nuclear weapons are based on 60-year old technology and such weapons are relatively easy to design and make. The primary obstacle to terrorists building a nuclear weapon is not the know-how required, but rather the difficulty of obtaining fissile material. However, there are many hundreds of tons of fissile materials, including highly enriched uranium, being stored in hundreds of sites worldwide, often under inadequate security arrangements. Potential sources of fissile materials and the knowledge necessary to build nuclear weapons continue to proliferate in countries with ties to radical and terrorist organizations. In addition to the threat of a terrorist organization building an improvised nuclear device, there remains the constant threat of a bomb being stolen or otherwise acquired from existing nuclear stockpiles that are not always adequately secured.

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While our primary goal must be the prevention of such an attack, we must also prepare for the eventuality that a determined terrorist may succeed despite our best efforts. The threat of nuclear theft by terrorist groups and the catastrophic consequences of such an attack dictate that our country be prepared. An effective response requires well-exercised plans that clearly enumerate roles and responsibilities at all levels of government. While the responsibility for responding to most small and medium-sized disasters naturally begins at the local level, planning and responding to a large-scale disaster, such as the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States, clearly require a robust Federal role. The destruction and devastation of such an attack would present humanitarian and logistical challenges that would overwhelm the capabilities of cities and states and require the Federal government to quickly marshal all of its assets and capabilities, as well as those of other States, localities, the private sector, and non-profits. However, the Government Accountability Office recently described the Federal government's ability to prepare for, respond to, recover, and rebuild from catastrophic events as needing "fundamental reform" and included catastrophic planning as a key area for Congressional oversight.

The Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006 (6 U.S.C. 741, *et. seq.*) requires the development of a national preparedness system and a target level of preparedness that can ensure the nation's ability to prevent, respond to, and recover from natural disasters, acts of terrorism, and other man-made disasters. The Act requires, among other things, that the President ensure that each Federal agency with responsibilities under the National Response Plan ("NRP") and its successors, including the National Response Framework ("NRF"):

- 1) has the operational capability to meet the national preparedness goal;
- 2) complies with the National Incident Management System;
- 3) develops, trains, and exercises rosters of response personnel to be deployed when the agency is called upon to support a Federal response; and
- 4) develops operational plans and the corresponding capabilities, including crisis planning, to respond effectively to natural disasters, acts of terrorism, and other man-made disasters to ensure a coordinated Federal response.

Pursuant to the Act, the Administrator of FEMA, acting in coordination with the heads of appropriate Federal agencies, is required to submit to Congress a report on the Nation's level of preparedness for all hazards. To date, we have not yet received this report.

Protecting our nation against nuclear terrorism involves many critically important tasks, including: non-proliferation activities, collecting and analyzing intelligence about the evolving threat of nuclear terrorism, devising a global and domestic nuclear detection system, and planning and preparing to respond to the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States. However, at this time, non-proliferation activities are not included in this particular inquiry. Rather, the Committee's current review of the nation's readiness to protect the population of the United States from nuclear terrorism builds upon work already conducted with respect to the programs of the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office at the Department of Homeland Security, the role of FEMA in preparing the country to respond to a catastrophic event, and other Federal programs.

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To assist the Committee in determining the current state of the nation's operational readiness to protect the people of the United States from nuclear terrorism and to carry out critical response missions in the event of the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States, we ask that you provide written answers to the following questions on behalf of your department or agency:

- I. Describe the roles, responsibilities, and authorities (under Federal law, Presidential directive, or any other relevant strategic or operational plan) of each component in your department or agency that relates to:
 - A. collecting and analyzing intelligence on the current threat of the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States;
 - B. developing, testing, evaluating, acquiring, and/or deploying radiation detection technologies either overseas or in the United States; and
 - C. responding to the discovery of nuclear weapons and/or fissile materials within the United States (including your department or agency's role, responsibilities and authorities in identifying, destroying, securing, disabling, or disposing of such weapons or materials).
- II. With respect to each specific role, responsibility, or authority identified in response to Question I:
 - A. provide a detailed inventory (including the specific resources, funding, personnel, and operational assets) of your department or agency's current capabilities to carry out each specific role, responsibility or authority; and
 - B. list the names and positions of the key personnel involved in acting pursuant to that authority or discharging that role and responsibility.
- III. Describe the roles, responsibilities, and authorities of each component in your department or agency in responding to the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States. Include your department or agency's roles, responsibilities, and authorities under Federal law, the National Response Framework (NRF), any annexes to the NRF or its predecessor, the NRP, any other government-wide, departmental, or agency disaster preparedness plan, or any relevant strategic or operational plan. With respect to each specific role, responsibility or authority:
 - A. list the names and positions of the key personnel involved in acting pursuant to that authority or discharging that role and responsibility; and
 - B. provide a detailed inventory (including the specific resources, funding, personnel, and operational assets) of your department or agency's current capabilities to


1. a detailed description of how your department or agency's capabilities would be utilized in response to the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States;

 3. the current state of readiness of these capabilities to respond to such an event;
 4. the emergency communications assets maintained by your department or agency; and
 5. the names and positions of the individuals that are most knowledgeable about the inventory of your department or agency's response capabilities.
- IV. Describe how, after the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States, your department or agency would support the NRF, any annexes to the NRF or its predecessor, the NRP, any other government-wide, departmental, or agency disaster preparedness plan, or any relevant strategic or operational plan. In addition:
- A. specify all operational plans that have been developed by your department or agency to respond to such an event; and
 - B. list the names and positions of the individuals who are most knowledgeable about your department or agency's planning activities to respond to such an event.
- V. Describe how your department or agency is coordinating with other Federal agencies in preparing, planning, and training for responding to the detonation of a nuclear device in the United States. Please:
- A. specify the dates and locations of interagency meetings that officials from your department or agency have participated during the last 24 months regarding the development of interagency response plans to respond to such an event;
 - B. describe your department or agency's participation in any interagency training activities during the last five years that simulated such an event; and

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
- C. provide the names and positions of the individuals who are most knowledgeable about your department or agency's participation in such interagency activities and who have direct responsibility for ensuring the readiness of your department or agency to carry out its missions.
- VI. Identify all operational plans, inventories of your department or agency's response capabilities, or any other documents or information that your department has provided or will be providing to the Administrator of FEMA or the White House that will enable the President to fulfill his annual certification obligations under 6 U.S.C. 753(d).

We request you provide the requested information as it becomes available, but not later than February 29, 2008. Should you believe that your response to this letter will require the disclosure of classified information, please let us know in advance of this date so that we may determine whether alternate arrangements for production are appropriate. The JASON review of the Reliable Replacement Warhead (RRW), completed in September of 2007, earned praise for its assessment of the risks and uncertainties associated with the proposal to design, produce, and certify the RRW without underground testing. We welcomed that review and, as we noted in the conference report accompanying the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008, their findings "begin to identify the challenges of the RRW program and the scientific work and general processes that need substantial focus and attention."

Since the RRW program was first proposed, our committee has urged a cautious approach with strict attention to the objectives established in the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2006. We reaffirmed those objectives in the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2008 and urged the National Nuclear Security Administration to consider regular external review of the program. We trust that the NNSA will adopt a path forward for the broader Stockpile Stewardship Program that offers the greatest assurance the nation can continue to annually certify the safety, security, and reliability of our nuclear weapons.


To that end, we ask that you direct the JASON panel this year to undertake a technical review of the Life Extension Program (LEP) analogous to their review of the RRW program. We have confidence in both the Stockpile Stewardship Program overall and the current LEP approach in particular, but as we look ahead, a fuller understanding of the risks, uncertainties, and challenges associated with the LEPs will enable a more robust comparison between the current program and any proposed alternatives, including the RRW proposal.

The Department of Energy's Complex Transformation Supplemental Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (SPEIS) is of great importance to the Amarillo community.

As an elected official representing the Amarillo area, I am proud of the **Pantex** plant and its workers. **Pantex** has been a good neighbor, and I am pleased that the **Pantex** plant calls the State of Texas home. Accordingly, I strongly support **Pantex** continuing its current functions; I advocate for **Pantex** receiving the new functions and facilities listed in the preferred alternatives for the SPEIS; I advocate for **Pantex** receiving any other new functions discussed in the SPEIS (such as the Consolidated Plutonium Center, Consolidated Uranium Center, Consolidated Nuclear Production Center, and the Consolidated Nuclear Center); and I urge **DOE** to reject any option that would result in the reduction or cessation of current functions at **Pantex**.

More specifically, I support **Pantex** remaining the Assembly/Disassembly/High Explosives (HE) production (formulation, processing, and testing) and manufacturing (machining) center with all HE production and machining to support nuclear explosive package development and HE experiments up to 22 kg, as well as consolidating non-destructive surveillance operations at **Pantex**. I also support **Pantex** being established as the "Center of Excellence for Assembly/Disassembly" for nuclear weapons and the "Center of Excellence for High Explosives Production and Machining." In addition, I advocate **Pantex** receiving non-destructive weapon/pit surveillance with the existing Weapons Engineering and Testing Lab and the new Weapons Surveillance Facility, receiving updated HE machining and production facilities, and consolidating weapon and pit storage with a new underground storage facility located in Zone 12 of the plant.

I believe that the addition of a Consolidated Plutonium Center, Consolidated Uranium Center, Consolidated Nuclear Production Center, and/or the Consolidated Nuclear Center (under the "Distributed Centers of Excellence" or "Consolidated Centers for Excellence" options) would be consistent with the historic disassembly and storage mission of the plant. **Pantex** currently stores more than 12,000 pits and has a long history and an excellent safety record in handling pits. The operation of most of these facilities will be an entirely new mission for any site ultimately selected. These facilities will require new construction, recruitment, and training of additional personnel, as well as the creation of provisions for supporting infrastructure. DOE

must essentially seek to establish a production capability that has never existed at any of the sites under consideration for these new facilities. It is my belief that **Pantex's** excellent and well-trained workforce makes **Pantex** the safest and most cost-effective site to take on this new mission. Further, designation of **Pantex** would greatly reduce transportation of special nuclear materials (SNM) and its attendant costs and risks.


I strongly believe that DOE should reject any option under the "Consolidated Centers for Excellence" option which may result in the cessation or reduction of weapons activities currently at **Pantex**.

As a U.S. Senator, I am in regular contact with elected officials, leaders and ordinary citizens in the Amarillo area. I can say without hesitation that the **Pantex** plant enjoys tremendous public and bipartisan political support for existing and new missions and can ably perform those missions at the lowest additional costs to the taxpayers. DOE must have this strong, broad-based political support to accomplish anything relating to new missions dealing with SNM. DOE has the necessary support from local elected officials to help its initiatives succeed.

I believe that DOE's Record of Decision for this SPEIS should maintain current functions at **Pantex**, award the new functions and facilities listed in the preferred alternatives for the SPEIS, designate **Pantex** as the preferred site for other new functions discussed in the SPEIS (such as the Consolidated Plutonium Center, Consolidated Uranium Center, Consolidated Nuclear Production Center, and/or the Consolidated Nuclear Center), and omit **Pantex** from any site list from which such functions would be consolidated, relocated, or eliminated.

Thank you for your service to our nation. I appreciate your attention to this issue, and I urge you to give my comments every consideration.

We are writing you today regarding solutions that could improve the business environment for potential users of the Nevada Test Site (NTS) and make far greater use of this world-class research and operations facility. As you know, NTS is at a disadvantage to other sites in attracting new defense and security-related projects because the Department of Energy's (DOE) policy requires non-DOE entities doing business at NTS to pay their entire overhead costs without reimbursement.

When you and Senator Reid met before your confirmation, and again last November, you indicated this policy could be improved and such improvements were worthy of consideration. We recognize that the Department needs a reasonable system for allocating costs. However, the current system is out-of-date and does not fairly match the Department's overhead costs with the amount it charges potential NTS users. As a result, federal agencies and other entities are discouraged from locating their projects at NTS, despite the fact that it is a secure location with desirable working space that could accommodate increased operations and a highly-skilled professional workforce.

We are happy to work with you to reduce the cost to potential NTS users while ensuring that NNSA is reimbursed a fair and reasonable amount to cover its overhead costs. Please let us know how you intend to proceed on this issue and how we can be of help. 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

We are writing with respect to the Department of Energy National Nuclear Security Administration's (NNSA) Global Initiatives for Proliferation Prevention (GIPP) program and the program's funding of Russian institutes, which are involved with work on nuclear projects in Iran. 

I would like to thank the Department and the NNSA for all its hard work in developing the proposed complex transformation initiative. The proposals included in the "preferred alternative" represent a thorough review of the program, facilities and mission of the nuclear weapons complex. Correctly, the NNSA has proposed an aggressive strategy to consolidate and dispose of excess special nuclear material that consumes an extraordinary amount of federal resources to meet security requirements.

For the most part, I support the plan of action described in the "preferred alternative." In particular the support for the Chemistry and Metallurgy Research Replacement (CMR-R) facility and the goals of the Reliable Replacement Warhead (RRW) program. However, there are several areas of concern that I wish to call to the attention of the Department.

As the complex is transformed it must not measure success only in terms of floor space and manpower reductions but also in terms of enhancements to the science base that is the lifeblood of stockpile stewardship. The preferred alternative falls short in this regard. High performance computing is not supported at Sandia National Laboratory. Much needed investment in scientific facilities at Los Alamos National Laboratory, specifically the necessary refurbishment at LANSCE, is also missing. The enduring national security mission of the laboratories can only be fulfilled if their high level of scientific excellence is sustained.

Key elements of the national security mission touch on complex transformation and should also be considered. Plutonium disposition is a major U.S. nonproliferation initiative. Sustained investment in facility construction is necessary for its completion. As consolidation proceeds at the Sandia California site, its mission should be reconsidered to ensure the resulting arrangement is sustainable.

More generally, complex transformation under the "preferred alternative" will be a major undertaking. During its implementation, care must be taken to avoid unintended consequences. Job reductions of the magnitude contemplated could cripple key mission areas and must be managed carefully.

As the end of the public comment period draws near, I offer additional comments in the following attachment. Some have called for an extension to the existing comment period which, as you know, exceeds the statutory requirement. I believe the Department has met its obligations in this regard and has been highly accommodating in its pursuit of public input to date. As such there is no need to extend the comment period beyond a week or two which would only serve to delay the review process.

I encourage the Department to adopt the changes I recommend and proceed quickly with its decision on the SPEIS so that we can begin to realize the benefits of a more capable and responsive infrastructure that we both desire.

Comments on the SPEIS for Complex Transformation Senator Pete V. Domenici

CMR-R

I support consolidating the remaining plutonium operations at Los Alamos, which since its inception during the Manhattan project, has been the leading plutonium research facility in the U.S. Independent analyses also demonstrate that completion of all three phases of the CMR-R facility as proposed in the "preferred alternative" is the most cost effective solution. The construction of this facility will be costly, but it is primarily due to high security and safety requirements, including seismic and state-of-the-art air handling requirements.

Worker safety and security are two areas where we must not cut corners. It is unacceptable to continue to utilize the existing CMR facility any longer than absolutely necessary. This facility was built in 1952 and doesn't provide modern safety and security features that the New Mexico workforce deserves and should expect. The Defense Nuclear Facilities Safety Board has directed the NNSA to close the existing facility by 2010 for safety reasons.

Today, Los Alamos serves as the only pit manufacturing capability in the nation, albeit at a fraction of the capacity that was maintained at the Rocky Flats plant in Colorado. So long as our country maintains a nuclear deterrent, we will need some basic level of production capacity to support that mission.

Opponents have incorrectly argued that the CMR-R facility constitutes a new pit production facility at Los Alamos. This is not accurate, and I believe a deliberate attempt to confuse the issue. NNSA has been very clear that the only location in the complex that will manufacture nuclear pits will be Technical Area 55 and not CMR-R. The new facility will provide essential chemistry and analytical support to the existing production mission in Technical Area 55 behind the security perimeter.

With regard to the pit production capacity, it is important to note that Congress has given careful consideration to this matter. In the fiscal 2006 Energy and Water Conference, we eliminated the funding for a new modern pit facility. In fiscal year 2008 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 110-161), Congress directed the NNSA to limit their potential pit production capacity to no greater than 80 pits per year. This is consistent with the "preferred alternative," which proposes a production capacity of 50-80 pits per year.

RRW

I believe that the RRW study, which Congress initiated in the fiscal year 2005, has enabled scientists and policy makers to consider even safer, more secure and ultimately

lower cost ways to produce the replacement systems necessary for our stockpile, all while maintaining the high level of reliability demanded. Design changes can reduce the complexity of the stockpile and the national infrastructure that supports it. The prospect for enhanced use controls is particularly attractive. Completion of the RRW feasibility study will enable policy makers to make informed, rather than emotional, decisions about the nuclear deterrent.

I am encouraged by the Department's efforts to minimize the use of hazardous materials in the weapons complex. It is imperative that the Department continue to pursue technology improvements as part of the life extension program that will improve worker safety. The integration of improved warhead security features should also be a priority.

High Performance Computing

I find no scientific or economic justification for discontinuing the investment in high performance computing and simulation capability at each of the three national security laboratories. Despite its claim to support a capability based approach, the SPIES undermines Sandia National Laboratories computing capability without any explanation of how the lab will compensate for this loss.

Moreover, there is no strategy within any of the supporting documents that provides a long-term vision for advanced computing architecture and algorithm development necessary to sustain NNSA's leadership in world class computing and simulation. Development of the high performance computing capabilities by the three national labs has made the stockpile stewardship program a success and enabled the U.S. to maintain a moratorium on underground testing. It would be unwise to neglect this vital capability.

The Department should reject its proposal to consolidate its computing investments from three to two laboratories, and instead should outline a strategy to sustain the long term investments at each of the labs and to develop a joint research and development program between NNSA, the Office of Science and U.S. industrial partners to drive the development of advanced computing architectures and algorithms consistent with the direction of the fiscal year 2008 Omnibus Appropriations. Further, the NNSA should specifically address the computing needs of the nonproliferation programs, which require different data processing and algorithms.

LANSCE

The SPEIS does not give adequate consideration to the investment in the overall science mission necessary to sustain cutting edge science at the national laboratories. The NNSA should be commended for its support of the existing facilities, including Z Machine, the National Ignition Facility, DARHT, and MESA. All of which already, or soon will, contribute to the science-based stockpile stewardship program as well as broader scientific and energy research endeavors.

However, facilities such as the Los Alamos Neutron Science Center, which supports both weapons and non-weapons missions, need a long term investment strategy to ensure their availability for Stockpile Stewardship activities and to serve as a magnet to attract top scientists. I believe that Los Alamos is well positioned to lead advanced research and development efforts focused on evaluating material behavior in extreme environments including high radiation and pressures.

I suggest that the NNSA develop and implement a long-term science strategy for each of the three laboratories, similar to the 20 year investment strategy developed by the Office of Science, including a specific plan to invest in near term science capabilities at Los Alamos.

MOX

In order to achieve lasting savings from complex consolidation, excess nuclear material must have a final disposition pathway. It has long been decided that the Mixed Oxide Fuel (MOX) Facility under construction at the Savannah River Site, South Carolina, would transform our nation's surplus plutonium into civilian reactor fuel. The successful execution of this program is important in terms of fulfilling our international nonproliferation commitments as well. There continue to be difficulties in maintaining progress with this effort. The Department should do all it can to ensure that the MOX facility is completed and the plutonium disposition program proceeds on schedule.

Sandia California Site

I believe that the NNSA should take a more strategic view of its plans under the "preferred alternative" for the Sandia California site. I support the proposed consolidation of the classified activities and weapons engineering mission to a fewer number of buildings on the site, thus reducing the overall security footprint. However, in doing so the mission for the remainder of the site needs better definition. An effort should be made to ensure its sustainability through the joint efforts of NNSA and DOE.

I recommend the Department build upon the existing capabilities of the state-of-the-art Combustion Research Facility on the site. By integrating the relevant offices within the Department of Energy, as well as engaging university and private sector participants in the San Francisco Bay area, the Department can promote a collaborative effort to transform our transportation sector through a combination of basic and applied science. Sandia California, can also serve as a major location for collaboration for non-weapons scientific research within Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, similar to the gateways provided by the Office of Science nanotechnology centers.

Comment Period

Based on the high degree of public engagement that has been achieved, evidenced by the large number of comments received during the comment period on the Notice of Intent and the well attended meetings conducted across New Mexico on the SPEIS, I believe the

NNSA has provided adequate time for public comment and review and should not extend the comment period beyond a week or two.

The Department of Energy and the NNSA, along with the national laboratories and the manufacturing facilities in the complex, have worked very hard to develop a proposal for complex transformation that was inclusive of a wide range of views and opinions. Beginning in October 2006 the NNSA published its first Notice of Intent, which outlined the initial draft of the Complex Transformation proposal. After digesting 33,000 written requests and conducting 12 separate hearings at each site, the NNSA published the Supplemental Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement in December 2007, which incorporated several recommendations from the public comments.

While the National Environmental Policy Act requires a 45 day minimum comment period, the NNSA has provided 90 days for review and comment since its release and in the end will have conducted 20 community meetings nationwide, including 7 hearings in New Mexico. I also appreciate the fact that you expanded the site hearings to include Espanola, New Mexico, a community that contributes heavily to the laboratory workforce and its success as a scientific center of excellence.

Taken together the Department has gone out of its way to solicit and accommodate input from the public. I trust that it will take these comments into account as it moves forward, acting on them where appropriate as it has done in the past.

I am writing to you to obtain clarification on the treatment of certain locations in Nevada under the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act (EEOICPA). In light of the ongoing processing of EEOICPA claims and the pending Nevada Test Site (NTS) Special Exposure Cohort Petition (SEC-00084), I urge you to resolve the uncertainties discussed in this letter as soon as possible.

The mission of the program is to provide compensation and health benefits to eligible Department of Energy (DOE) employees, contractors, or subcontractors who developed illnesses as a result of their employment at a DOE facility. Under the statute, eligible facilities include any building, structure, or premise, including the grounds upon which such building, structure, or premise is located, (1) in which operations are, or have been, conducted by, or on behalf of, the DOE; or (2) with regard to which DOE has or had a proprietary interest or entered into a contract with an entity to provide management and operation, management and integration.

As you know, one of DOE's roles in implementing the program is maintaining a list of these eligible facilities. The DOE's database, which currently includes six locations in Nevada, is silent on certain nearby places where former NTS employees may have entered as part of their

work and incurred harmful occupational exposures. There is one such area that was withdrawn from public use in 1958 by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, a predecessor agency to the DOE, under Public Land Order 1662. Although DOE is no longer active in this area today, NTS workers have filed EEOICPA claims citing work activities performed there at the time it was under DOE administration. Unfortunately, the eligibility status of this area remains unclear, although NIOSH has indicated that dose reconstructions based on dosimeter badge readings from NTS could potentially include doses incurred there.

As such, I am asking you to formally clarify exactly how your agency is interpreting the EEOICPA statute with respect to the occupational exposures experienced at locations that are currently excluded from DOE's database. In addition, please provide an accounting of how affected claims in the past, present, and future were or will be processed to ensure a claimant-friendly outcome.

Definitive guidance is needed now more than ever, especially given the inadequate and contradictory information provided thus far. While NIOSH depends on a determination by DOL and DOE on what is a covered facility and what constitutes covered employment, my understanding is that DOL is still awaiting a response from DOE regarding DOE's operations in certain areas in Nevada. Most recently, when asked by a member of the public during the recent 54th meeting of the Advisory Board on Radiation and Worker Health, DOL officials simply answered that they could not respond.

It is unacceptable that eight years after the enactment of EEOICPA, the public must be kept in the dark about such basic questions. Moreover, I am concerned that individual claim adjudication, the development of Technical Basis Documents for the NTS, and the NTS Special Exposure Cohort Petition evaluation have moved forward even as uncertainties about the application of EEOICPA to key areas remain unresolved. Our Cold War veterans deserve better.

I am writing to follow up on my letter to you dated January 22, in which I urged you to expedite the removal of spent fuel from a General Atomics nuclear research reactor site in La Jolla, California. As that letter explained, there are many reasons why the spent fuel at the La Jolla site is unique, and there is a compelling need for the fuel to be removed. The letter also explained why this issue is vastly different from the realm of civilian nuclear reactor waste.

To date I have not received a response to my January 22 letter. However, recently I received a letter from the Department of Justice on this issue (attached). In its letter DOJ explains that it has not told DOE that the removal of this spent nuclear fuel would prejudice DOJ's pending litigation relating to the Nuclear Waste Policy Act. The letter further makes clear that DOJ believes it is up to DOE to decide whether to accept the spent nuclear fuel from the La Jolla site.


Now that DOJ has indicated it will not stand in the way, the time has come for DOE to act. For these and all the reasons stated in my previous letter, I believe DOE can and should move urgently to transfer this spent nuclear fuel to a DOE facility. Existing authority under the Atomic Energy

This responds to your letter, dated **January 22, 2008**, to the Attorney **General** regarding the removal of spent nuclear fuel (SNF) from a nuclear research reactor, owned by General Atomics, in **La Jolla**, California. The Department of Justice (DOJ) did not receive **your** letter until February 7, 2008. We apologize for the delay in our response.

Your letter suggests that the Department of **Energy** (DOE) should accept General Atomics' SNF immediately under the **authority** of the Atomic Energy Act (AEA), 42 U.S.C. § 2013-2297g. You further **express** a concern that DOJ may be precluding DOE from accepting the SNF in an attempt to avoid any prejudice to the **Federal** Government's **position** in litigation currently **pending** in the United States **Court** of Federal Claims.

With regard to your understanding that DOJ "may have concerns about whether the removal of [**General** Atomics'] spent fuel would prejudice the government's position" in pending litigation, please be assured that we have expressed no such position to DOE. With regard to issues surrounding whether DOE has sufficient justification to remove General Atomics' SNF **at** this time under the auspices of the **AEA**, that determination **is** one that DOE itself **must** make. DOE is the agency with the expertise in **and** responsibility for evaluating nuclear **waste safety** and storage issues, and any acceptance of SNF from **any** SNF disposal contract holder must, of course, be conducted in accordance with existing **law**.

I write to express my grave concern regarding the potential submission to Congress of an Agreement for Nuclear Cooperation that you have negotiated with the Russian Federation. I believe that seeking the approval of Congress for nuclear cooperation with Russia without first addressing the numerous outstanding questions regarding Russia's assistance to Iran in the fields of nuclear energy and missile technology is a prescription for an unnecessarily divisive debate, which is in neither U.S. nor Russian interests.

On April 16, 2008, the House Energy and Commerce Committee submitted Questions for the Record to Secretary of Energy Samuel Bodman. Included in this package were seven questions from me regarding recent revelations that the same Russian research institutes which receive DOE nonproliferation funding are engaged in assisting Iran's nuclear program. As we all know, money is fungible, and I am extremely concerned that U.S. taxpayer dollars that are supposed to be making the world safer by redirecting former Soviet WMD scientists to peaceful activities may in fact be indirectly assisting Iran's nuclear program. I asked the Department to provide a legal analysis of whether this program is in full compliance with the Cox-Markey Amendment of 2005, which bars nuclear trade, whether direct or indirect, to countries named by the Department of State as State Sponsors of Terror. As you know, Iran has topped that list for many years. Secretary Bodman's responses to these questions are due on May 26, 2008. I urge you to not submit any Agreement for Nuclear Cooperation with Russia to the Congress for approval until Secretary Bodman responds in full to the questions that have been raised about Russian nuclear cooperation with Iran.

More generally, it would be a mistake for the United States to provide Russia an important civilian nuclear benefit while Moscow itself continues to assist Iran's nuclear and missile programs. Only last year, the Director for National Intelligence confirmed that Russia continues to assist both programs.

In addition, according to recent press reports, Azerbaijan has halted a shipment of Russian nuclear equipment bound for Iran pending a determination of whether the shipment violates United Nations Security Council sanctions on Iran.

All of these issues need to be properly addressed and resolved before we proceed to finalize a nuclear cooperation agreement with Moscow. It certainly is a mistake to argue, as some Administration officials have already, that we must formalize a nuclear cooperation agreement with Russia to promote the Global Nuclear Energy Program or to stand up an international nuclear fuel bank. Both efforts can proceed without such an agreement. More importantly, if Russian assistance to Iran's nuclear and missile programs are not openly acknowledged and properly challenged, our efforts to halt Iran's steady march towards a nuclear weapons capability become far less likely to succeed.

I look forward to working with you on these important matters.

We understand that the Administration has negotiated an Agreement for Cooperation Regarding the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy (123 Agreement) with the Russian Federation, which you may sign and subsequently submit to Congress. Section 123 of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (P.L. 83-703) delegates to the Executive the authority to negotiate such Agreements and provides for Congressional review.

The U.S.-Russia Strategic Framework Declaration that was announced by you with President Putin on April 6, 2008, states that the parties will sign and bring into force this Agreement "to create the necessary legal basis for our cooperation in the peaceful use of nuclear energy," and will permit "the transfer of nuclear materials, reactors and major reactor components between our two countries" that will "further cooperation under bilateral programs" such as "the Global Nuclear Energy Partnership."

While we strongly support the expansion of a strategic partnership with Russia, sending this Agreement to Congress before key questions are answered will most assuredly raise Congressional and public objections that could defeat the ultimate purpose of such an initiative, to improve and solidify our relations with Russia.

When the House of Representatives passed the Iran Counter-Proliferation Act of 2007 (H.R. 1400), it prohibited Agreements for Cooperation between the United States and any country which is assisting Iran's nuclear and missile programs. The bill, which was approved by the House by a vote of 397-16 on September 25, 2007, specifically states that no such Agreement shall "be submitted to the President or to Congress" and "enter into force with such country" unless the (1) President reports that Iran has ceased its efforts to design or acquire a nuclear explosive, or (2) nuclear and missile assistance to Iran has been terminated by such country.

Although the Senate has yet to act on this legislation, H.R. 1400 clearly reflects the bipartisan concern of the House regarding continued U.S. nuclear cooperation with countries that in any manner support the current Iranian regime's pursuit of technologies and materials for a nuclear program whose objectives remain uncertain. Moreover, unless a major change has occurred in Russian support for Iranian nuclear and missile programs since last September, it is highly questionable to send Congress the 123 agreement without first assuring the Congress and the American people that Russia is conforming to the letter, as well as the spirit, of H.R. 1400.

Outlined below are three areas of concern that your Administration should publicly address before this Agreement is sent to Congress.

I. Risk of Technology Diversion to Countries of Proliferation Concern

Congress needs detailed information regarding Russian ability to limit the flow of nuclear technologies from its industrial base and research institutes to countries of proliferation concern such as Iran. Investigations conducted by the Committee on Energy and Commerce uncovered Russian nuclear institutes, who while receiving nonproliferation funds from the Department of Energy (DOE) to help redirect former weapons scientists away from work in countries of proliferation concern, were also selling nuclear technology to Iran.

In some cases, DOE officials were unaware of the activities of the Russian institutes with and in Iran until after these projects were completed. We have learned that DOE's nonproliferation program appears to have been so loosely run that the Department only focused on this problem once this Committee brought it to their attention by providing publicly available advertisements from Russian nuclear institutes. Whether Russian nuclear institutes continue to assist other countries of proliferation concern is unclear, since DOE has not yet responded to this Committee's request for information on this matter. If DOE lacks adequate information about the activities of institutes receiving U.S. funds, how can Congress be assured that your new proposal will not lead to the diversion of nuclear technologies and materials to countries of proliferation concern?

II. Global Nuclear Energy Partnership (GNEP)

Pursuant to this Committee's jurisdiction over civilian nuclear energy, we have an ongoing investigation of GNEP, a program involving the recycling of plutonium, separated from spent-reactor fuel, for use in a new generation of nuclear reactors. Our inquiry revealed that there is still no consensus as to whether the United States should depart from a 30-year nonproliferation policy that prohibits the reprocessing of nuclear fuel. Commercial reprocessing in the United Kingdom, France, Japan, and Russia has resulted in the accumulation of more than 150 metric tons of separated plutonium that can be used to make nuclear weapons, exacerbating the risk of terrorists gaining access to this material. Similarly, DOE's plans for GNEP would also result in material that could be processed for use into nuclear weapons.

At a time when the United States is seeking to limit the spread of reprocessing technology and expertise to other countries, resuming reprocessing would reverse decades of U.S. leadership that contributed to countries such as Argentina, Brazil, South Korea, and Taiwan abandoning their reprocessing ambitions. If we commit to developing GNEP with Russia, as authorized by your proposed 123 Agreement, does this imply that the U.S. is abandoning deep geologic disposal, which is viewed by many experts as the most proliferation-resistant form of disposal?

We are particularly troubled that your proposed 123 Agreement with Russia encourages greater cooperation on the GNEP program, while DOE has yet to develop a proliferation risk assessment for GNEP. Is it premature to enter into an international agreement on nuclear cooperation, predicated upon the GNEP program, before the proliferation risks of GNEP have been assessed?

GNEP technology is in a research and development phase, and is decades away from maturity. Taxpayer costs have yet to be assessed. Given the consistently deep cuts to the Administration's budget requests for GNEP, is it premature to submit this Agreement with Russia to the Congress when there is little consensus that GNEP will be pursued, in its current form, beyond the end of this Administration? Will this 123 Agreement implicitly bind the U.S. to a long-term joint venture with Russia involving yet-to-be developed technologies?

III. Assessment of Russian Assistance to Iran

Prior to consideration of this Agreement, Congress needs a detailed assessment of Russian assistance to all aspects of Iran's nuclear and missile programs. Our concern reaches beyond the potential re-transfer of technology from Russia to Iran and other nations of proliferation concern. We want assurance that Russia's support for the Iranian nuclear and missile programs are not at odds with our nuclear nonproliferation policy with respect to Iran.

While it is encouraging that Russia has a fuel take-back arrangement for the Buhsher reactor, this is insufficient for a country that has had nuclear weapons ambitions. We believe that Russia should not transfer technology and materials to Iran until we can verify, through real-time video monitoring or unannounced International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) spot inspections, that such technology and materials will not be diverted by Iran for weapons-related purposes.


In addition, we have concerns about the training of Iranian scientists and engineers by Russia, regardless of the location of that training. To what degree does such training occur today, and how much has occurred over the last 36 months? In what ways might this training advance Iran's nuclear or missile programs?

Prior to transmitting this Agreement and setting off the 90-day clock for Congressional review, we urge you to address these questions regarding the need, justification, and timing of this Agreement. A failure to engage Congressional concerns on these issues would needlessly

imperil an opportunity to advance our shared goal of strengthening the U.S.-Russia partnership. We look forward to working with you to assure that all of these issues are properly addressed.

We have recently learned that the Department of Energy's National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) has announced plans to transfer up to 198 NNSA federal and contractor staff from Germantown, Maryland to the Forrestal Building in Washington, D.C.

Unless a strong justification and cost savings can be shown, we are concerned that this move will not benefit the Department or the NNSA but will, in fact, weaken it by imposing sufficiently severe hardships that many employees will choose either to leave NNSA for other employment or to retire. We understand that NNSA management is already concerned that many of its staff with critical skills may retire over the next four years and is actively trying to fill this looming skills gap. If the move to the Forrestal Building causes a high number of employees to leave NNSA, this experience gap will only be exacerbated as even more new employees await their security clearances and slowly acquire the requisite skills and experience.

This relocation decision also has a tremendous impact both on environment and "quality of life" issues for the affected employees. Commuting time for many of the employees would increase by two to three hours each day, at a cost of several thousand dollars per year per employee for transportation and parking. The extended commutes would also increase energy consumption and adversely impact the environment, at a time when you, as Secretary of Energy, have launched a highly publicized "Transformational Energy Action Management" Initiative for the Department. The forced relocation is also inconsistent with legislation enacted in 2000 that established telework requirements for the federal government (P.L. 106-346).

We are deeply concerned about the effects of this relocation on the workforce and would appreciate your providing us with information about this decision, including responses to the questions below.

- When was this relocation decision made and when was it communicated to the affected employees? Did the employees have an opportunity to participate in the decision-making process?
- What is the rationale for this move?
- Does the Department of Energy anticipate a cost savings from this move? If so, please provide me with the specific details of the anticipated savings and whether a formal cost-benefit analysis has been conducted. Please provide me with a copy of any such analysis.
- Has the Department conducted a survey of the affected employees to determine how this proposal will affect their commuting patterns, or their decisions to accept the transfer or terminate their employment with the Department? If not, does the Department plan to conduct such a study and what impact, if any, would such information have on the decision to proceed with this relocation?

As noted above, we are very concerned that this planned relocation will impose severe costs that must be balanced against any potential benefits, including any short or long-term effects on the safe management of the nuclear weapons complex. We have been advised that this transfer is planned to occur within the next 120 days. Given that short timeframe, we would appreciate your responding to these issues as expeditiously as possible.

Thank you for your reply to my letters of January 22 and April 30. I welcome the Department's decision to review whether it has justification to take custody of the spent nuclear fuel from the General Atomics research reactor site in La Jolla, California.

I am concerned, however, that the Department may ultimately decide to take only part of the spent nuclear fuel from the site. The La Jolla site contains both highly enriched uranium (HEU) and low enriched uranium (LEU), but your letter of April 30 refers only to the HEU and suggests that DOE is evaluating whether to take custody of "this fuel."

I strongly urge the Department to remove all of the spent nuclear fuel – both HEU and LEU – from the site. As noted in my letter of January 22, the LEU on the site could be attractive to terrorists for potential use in a "dirty bomb." This risk, which is unacceptable in a densely populated area that contains important military and research installations, would persist for many years if DOE misses the opportunity to remove the LEU together with the HEU.

Moreover, it would be inefficient to remove the HEU and LEU separately. A subsequent shipment of LEU from the site would require additional planning, would impose additional costs, and would unnecessarily repeat the safety risks that accompany any shipment of nuclear waste. By contrast, the incremental costs of removing the LEU together with the HEU at this time would be small.


It is my understanding that DOE has already set a precedent of removing U.S.-origin LEU, in addition to HEU, from foreign reactor sites for safety reasons. And finally, both the HEU and the LEU at the La Jolla site were primarily used for government research programs. Thus, neither type of spent fuel at the site is analogous to the civilian nuclear power reactor fuel that is intended for storage at Yucca Mountain under the Nuclear Waste Policy Act.

For all of these reasons, my letter of January 22 did not simply urge the removal of the HEU – it urged DOE to remove all the spent nuclear fuel from the site. Similarly, when the Department of Justice wrote its letter to me on April 3 and stated that it had no reservations about DOE removing this spent fuel, DOJ drew no distinction between the HEU and the LEU.

Removing all the spent fuel from the La Jolla site is the most logical and efficient solution to this problem, and I urge DOE to do so promptly. It would reduce the number of sites containing sensitive nuclear materials, with tangible benefits to our national security. It would also allow this site – at which valuable research was performed for the government – to be cleaned up and converted to a new use.

I look forward to your decision, and again, I thank you for your attention to this matter.

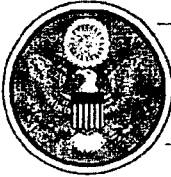

Dear Administrator D'Agostino:

I am writing to request that you include the DOE Electronic Records Management Program in future NNSA budgets. The Program was started in 2001 to preserve DOE's worker safety and health records in digital form. Today, the records management system is almost complete, and with minimal further investment could help the NNSA and the DOE solve some of the most challenging recordkeeping problems, including moving the Agencies decisively towards digital recordkeeping.

For the last several years, UNLV has been using some of its project development funding to scan and preserve Nevada Site Office worker safety and health records. This work originally supported necessary research and also gave UNLV an initial database of documents with which to test and demonstrate the records management system. However, the database has also become a useful tool for DOE to respond to the many document requests it receives from ill workers seeking compensation under the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act (EEOICPA). Nevada Site Office employees are using the system right now to retrieve records much more efficiently than would be possible if searches had to be accomplished manually. The UNLV system is providing a significant current benefit to the Agency.

In spite of its benefits to the Nevada Site Office, DOE has not yet included the UNLV program in its budgeting; rather, funding has come from annual appropriations bills. However, the program did not receive funding during the last two fiscal years. I have strongly supported this program and would like to see NNSA budget for it to consistently meet future recordkeeping challenges. I understand that your staff has initiated an evaluation of the UNLV program, and is considering, among other things, whether to budget for the UNLV program or to utilize instead one or more commercially available products to meet future record management needs. I welcome that evaluation, and feel it is long overdue. I encourage NNSA to take the time necessary to conduct its inquiry thoroughly, and to pursue the solution that on its merits best (and most cost-effectively) addresses NNSA's records management needs.

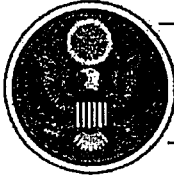



As you know, the transfer of security equipment, crime control and detection instruments, and military equipment, parts, and technology to communist China is regulated by Section 902 of the Foreign Relations Authorization Act, Fiscal Years 1990 and 1991 (P.L. 101-246; 22 U.S.C. 2151) and by Executive Order 13222, issued August 17, 2001, pursuant to the authority granted under Section 203 of the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (P.L. 95-223; 50 U.S.C. 1702). Given communist China's massive military build-up, lack of military transparency, continued espionage to acquire United States defense intelligence, and history of proliferating weapons and weapons related technology, it is important this recent transaction receive Congressional oversight.


Furthermore, in light of communist China's severe and continuing repression of its people, this transfer could pose a profound moral problem if communist China uses American-designed advanced technologies to repress the Chinese people in the name of security. Tragically, this consideration is not merely hypothetical. At present, communist China brutally persecutes its Uyghur citizens under the guise of counterterrorism. Additionally, communist Chinese authorities aggressively pursue members of the Falun Gong spiritual movement, which the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) considers an "evil cult" and an ideological enemy.

Thus, to perform our Constitutional duty to exercise oversight of the sensitive equipment and technology transfer to communist China, we urge you to inform Congress of the details of this export arrangement.

Thank you for contacting me regarding Los Alamos National Laboratory. I appreciate hearing from you on this very important issue.

During my nearly ten years of service in Congress, I have proudly and strongly represented Los Alamos National Laboratory and its workers. The scientists at Los Alamos and Sandia National Labs conduct some of the greatest research in the world, and they are an integral part of our national defense. These men and women take enormous pride in their mission, they understand the unique undertaking of the Labs, and it is my honor to represent them.

Throughout my career I have fought to protect Los Alamos and Sandia National Laboratories because of their critical role ensuring American security and the vital economic foundation they provide for New Mexico. As we look to the future, it is important that our labs are prepared to face the changing national security threats now facing our country.

For more than a year, I have worked with our labs to encourage growth in new areas of research as a way to ensure their long-term viability and to move towards the future. In addition to their indispensable role maintaining our nuclear arsenal, I believe the labs' work should grow in the areas of nuclear nonproliferation, homeland security, counterterrorism, intelligence analysis and expanded energy research. It is also essential that adequate funding is provided for the cleanup of hazardous legacy waste from the labs.

A vision paper recently released by the National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) addressed the need for broader missions at their labs, including Los Alamos and Sandia National Labs. These statements on diversification suggest that the Administration is ready to make the changes I've been advocating that will keep Los Alamos and Sandia strong for years to come. 

I am writing to inquire about the progress of U.S. negotiations with Russia over the disposition of their weapons grade plutonium. For well over a decade now, the U.S. has been working to solidify a path by which Russia will disposition at least 34 to 40 or more metric tons of their surplus weapons plutonium.

As you know, the original and ongoing premise of the plutonium disposition program is that the U.S. and Russia will move together to put into place the facilities needed to dispose of their respective surplus plutonium. However, with the multi-billion dollar Mixed Oxide (MOX) Fuel facility well under construction at Savannah River Site (SRSO), there is still no agreed upon disposition path for the Russians.

In this context, I would like you to provide answers to the following questions:

1. What is the current status of and schedule for concluding negotiations with the Russians on their plutonium disposition path?
2. At this point, what are/is the likely disposition path(s) for the Russians'?
3. What is the DOE/NNSA position with regard to U.S. funding for the Russian Plutonium disposition program? My understanding is the administration's position has been that the U.S. will provide the Russians with no more than \$400 million for their disposition program. Is that correct?
4. It is my understanding that, in the face of this \$400 million limit, the Russian position on their disposition path has "hardened" around using their BN-600 fast reactor to begin the disposition, but to fully develop their next-generation BN-800 fast reactor to complete the disposition task. Is this correct?
5. Is it correct to say that in the Russian's eyes, the primary reason for developing fast reactors, including the BN800, is for the purpose of breeding plutonium for their civilian power program? If so, how is it that a U.S. contribution of \$400 million to the development of the BN-800 reactor is not

ultimately facilitating the creation of more plutonium in Russia?

Notwithstanding Russian assurances of not having a fertile blanket in the BN-800 while they are burning their weapons plutonium, what guarantee do we have that the BN-800 will not ultimately be used as a breeder?

Notwithstanding Russian assurances of not reprocessing the spent surplus weapons fuel for some period of time, what guarantees do we have that this spent fuel will not ultimately be reprocessed for the purpose of extracting the remaining plutonium?

6. At this point, what other options are there for plutonium disposition in Russia?
7. Is the high temperature gas cooled reactor still a viable option? Why or why not? From the technical point of view, what advantages or disadvantages would Plutonium disposition in the high temperature gas cooled reactor have? With an aggressive program, could the Russians have a GT-MHR constructed by at least 2021 in parallel with the schedule for the Next Generation Nuclear Plant in the U.S.?
8. Since DOE is currently in the process of developing a high temperature gas cooled reactor under the Next Generation Nuclear Plant project and also has a so-called "deep burn" research and development program to utilize high temperature gas cooled reactor fuel for the destruction of nuclear waste, including plutonium, is there a possibility of a U.S. - Russian collaboration that would benefit the U.S. gas reactor program while at the same time resulting in Russian progress toward utilizing the gas cooled reactor for plutonium disposition?

Thank you in advance for your timely answers to these questions.



I write to thank you for your hard work and willingness to work with our offices and the State of Montana as the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) continues to review the draft environmental impact statement (EIS) for the proposed Montana Alberta Tie, Ltd. (MATL) merchant power transmission line. We appreciate the countless hours and resources that your staff has dedicated in recent weeks toward completing the final EIS. However, I also write to express my concern at the slow pace of the review and encourage timely completion of the project.

The environmental review process began in November 2005 when MATL filed a draft EIS. After DOE initially issued a draft environmental assessment (EA) in March 2007, MATL was informed on May 4, 2007 that DOE would require a fuller review than the initially published EA and that the process for a formal EIS would take approximately 20 weeks. The revised draft EIS was issued in February of this year with the public comment period ending on March 31. A total of 201 comments were received, with 90 percent in favor of the project and DOE publicly stated that a final EIS should be issued by the end of May. While we understand that the final EIS is nearing completion we urge your office to issue the final product as soon as possible.

After almost three years, the delays in the DOE review process are affecting the timing and conditions of financing for the completion of this important project. The delays have caused the project costs to increase by one-third and forced the project developers to seek additional equity financing while awaiting the final presidential permit necessary to secure permanent construction financing. This line is being constructed primarily for wind power development linking Montana to Alberta. Delays have hindered the development of more clean energy development in our region.

I appreciate your concern that the lack of transmission is one of the major impediments to the development of renewable energy resources in the United States. I respectfully request that the Department act to timely complete its regulatory responsibilities with respect to the MATL project as soon as reasonably possible consistent with its statutory mandate.

Please continue to keep me and my staff advised of the Department's progress on this vital matter. Several other large-scale transmission projects have been proposed in Montana and we look forward to working closely with the Department of Energy as those projects develop.


Dear Mr. Secretary:

I'm writing to express my concern regarding a recent U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) proposal that would require a refiner to submit a written report to the Department of Energy within 60 minutes of any emergency disruption of refinery operations. I share the Department's concerns about learning of refinery and critical infrastructure outages as soon as practicably possible. However, I am very concerned about specific aspects of the proposal, as currently drafted.

First, I'm concerned about the real and dangerous possibility that the 60-minute reporting period to submit a federal form could compete with what should be the primary focus at hand – public health and safety, including workplace safety and the safety and health of surrounding areas and neighborhoods. It makes little sense to force managers to spend time dealing with federal paperwork rather than trying to assess, respond to and to mitigate against current and future dangers to the workers and the public in such instances. I urge you to extend this proposed reporting period to three hours from the time of the original incident at a minimum.

Second, it seems that if policy makers are concerned about reporting on the loss of fuel production that we should encourage managers at the scenes of incidents to spend their time mitigating against the loss of production capacity rather than reporting about what production capacity was lost and might have been saved, but for managers being forced to fill out federal paperwork notifications too quickly. This hardly seems a rational expenditure of the staff's and manager's time when responding to an emergency production incident. I do hope that the reporting window will be lengthened when the Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability proposes a formal form for refiners to use to report "unplanned" refinery outages in the near future.

As the ~~Department~~ of Energy (DOE) begins to formulate the process and congestion ~~metrics~~ for the 2009 National Electric Transmission Congestion Study (Congestion Study), we request that the study include a detailed analysis of congestion chokepoints in the Lower Hudson Valley and Westchester County in New York, as identified in the 2006 Congestion Study that might prevent or inhibit future improvements in transmission capacity from reaching ~~consumers~~ in New York City.


The 2006 Congestion Study concluded that "Southeastern New York also needs improved voltage ~~support~~ that will require transmission ~~reinforcements~~ in the Lower Hudson Valley, more generation and demand-side management." Specifically, the ~~study~~ identified serious constraints on transmission existing at the UPNY-ConEd interface, between Westchester County and New York City, and between Westchester County and Long Island.

It is our ~~hope~~ that DOE will include a detailed description of the extent of electric transmission ~~constraints~~ through these points, including the ~~amount~~ of unused capacity during normal, peak and ~~emergency~~ conditions, in its 2009 National Electric Transmission Congestion Study. This information will be ~~instrumental~~ in evaluating ~~future~~ proposals for ~~new~~ transmission projects to reduce congestion within the Mid-Atlantic ~~NIETC~~ and should be completed before any projects are considered. To do otherwise would ~~risk~~ granting authority for a project that does nothing to address New York State's congestion ~~problem~~.

Thank you for considering our request to include this information in the Department's 2009 Congestion ~~Study~~.

As I know you are aware, Louisiana has recently suffered serious damage to most of the state from Hurricanes Gustav and Ike. I would like to thank you for your agency's hard work to help mitigate these disasters. One issue in particular has come to my attention as something that might fall under the purview of the Department of Energy.

I have been informed that the Calcasieu Ship Channel, home to the nation's 4th largest refinery, 11th largest port and carrier of 7.5% of our nation's daily oil consumption, is facing serious navigational impediments. The channel, which is authorized to a depth of 40 feet, is currently operating at a 38 foot draft restriction due to siltation from the recent storms. This restriction limits the size and load of the vessels supplying these refineries. Obviously, this has a direct and substantial impact on the price of fuel in the United States and our energy security.

In light of the fact that this ship channel represents a critical energy choke-point for the nation as a whole, I respectfully request that you examine whether the Department of Energy can designate resources to restore the Calcasieu Ship Channel to its designed depth. While maintenance of federal waterways is typically a Corps of Engineers responsibility, I feel that the extent to which this waterway effects U.S. energy security warrants exploring alternative methods. Please notify me of your findings at your earliest convenience.

As you know firsthand, Hurricane Gustav's impact has dislocated millions and left over one million families and businesses without power. As Governor Jindal has no doubt conveyed, we are in need of emergency energy assistance.

Initial estimates suggest that our constituents will be without power for time periods ranging from 10 days to 6 weeks. I request that you employ the full range of emergency response capabilities of the US Department of Energy's Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability. The addition of the Department's expert response teams and electrical generators would be invaluable at this time.


Furthermore, I ask that you release the remaining discretionary federal Low-Income Heating and Energy Assistance Program (LMEAP) funds at your disposal. Many Louisianans are ill-equipped to weather the economic effects of Hurricane Gustav. More than 800,000 Louisiana citizens are impoverished, and already struggling with high energy costs. Congress provided these LIHEAP resources for just such an emergency. Because these funds will lapse in less than 30 days, I urge their prompt release to help Louisiana's most at-risk citizens to get back on their feet.

Unfortunately, Gustav's strike has exacerbated already difficult economic conditions. Due to rising energy prices, virtually all of our current LIHEAP funds have been spent. Just two weeks ago, the State was compelled to commit \$10 million of its own resources to home energy assistance. However, those funds were enough to help only 12,700 additional families. Unfortunately, the energy needs of our citizens outstrip the State's capacity to help. At present, the fiscal 2008 Federal LIHEAP funding—which has already been consumed—helped just 45,000 Louisiana households. Gustav's landfall has greatly magnified our immediate need.

As you demonstrated in the aftermath of the 2005 hurricanes, Department of Energy resources and LIHEAP contingency funds can make a difference in disaster recovery. This assistance from the Federal government would be an immediate shot in the arm to Louisiana's families. We all appreciate your attention to this request.

In February 2007, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) issued a report entitled Uncertainty about Future Oil Supply Makes it Important to Develop a Strategy for Addressing a Peak and Decline in Oil Production. The report recommended that:

the Secretary of Energy work with other agencies to establish a strategy to coordinate and prioritize federal agency efforts to reduce uncertainty about the likely timing of a peak (in global oil production) and to advise Congress on how best to mitigate consequences.

I am writing to inquire whether the Department of Energy has acted upon this recommendation.


Congress acted to make our nation less susceptible to the impact of a downturn in global oil production when it passed the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007. But an unexpected drop in global oil production would still cause tremendous economic harm. The GAO found that we could more accurately forecast a peak in oil production with improved data on oil resources and use. Reducing uncertainty regarding available oil supplies would increase stability in oil markets and allow for informed decisions regarding the development of oil alternatives.

I would greatly appreciate if you would describe what course of action you have taken at the Department of Energy in response to this GAO report.

Please also describe the policy alternatives available to Congress and recommend a preferable approach.

Knowing that there is substantial debate regarding the potential for a peak in global oil production, I look forward to hearing your views on this matter. I hope that we can work together to take any actions that may be appropriate.

I am writing to seek your support in standing against Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez and his self-declared economic war against the United States.

After he nationalized Venezuela's oil industry last year, President Chavez made it crystal clear that free markets are not welcome in his socialist revolution and that he will stop at nothing to impose his leftist policies on the people and businesses of Venezuela and Latin America.

Last week in a major development, ExxonMobil won several preventive legal injunctions—issued by courts in the United States, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, and the Netherlands Antilles—freezing global assets of the Venezuelan national oil company PdVSA for up to \$12 billion. As you are aware, ExxonMobil is suing the Venezuelan government for having expropriated its oil assets in the Orinoco Basin last year without proper compensation.

In response to these lawful injunctions, President Chavez is threatening to cut off oil shipments to the United States. Specifically, during his weekly nationally televised address to the Venezuelan people, President Chavez said, "I speak to the U.S. empire, because that's the master: continue and you will see that we won't send one drop of oil to the empire of the United States." Later in his address, he threatened, "[i]f the economic war continues against Venezuela, the price of oil is going to reach \$200 [a barrel] and Venezuela will join the economic war. And more than one country is willing to accompany us in the economic war."

The United States cannot be held as an economic hostage to the whims of tyrants, thugs, and dictators like President Chavez and his anti-American allies such as Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad. While I applaud the United States and international

courts for standing up for American companies doing business in Venezuela and for standing against President Chavez's march on freedom and free markets, it is clear that the United States government needs to firmly protect our nation and our economy against a threatened oil embargo from Venezuela and its allies.


While I would hope President Chavez does not take retaliatory action against the rule of international law, this situation is a stark reminder that we must have proactive policies in place—such as increasing our Strategic Petroleum Reserve—should President Chavez attempt to punish the United States by cutting oil supplies. Specifically, with President Chavez threatening to cut off oil shipments to the United States, I believe that it is in our national security interest to begin increasing our Strategic Petroleum Reserve in order to replace Venezuela's supply to the United States should President Chavez follow through on his threats. By doing this, we will let the markets know that the United States government will protect the American people from those who would use oil as an economic and political weapon against our nation.

Make no mistake: if the United States is prepared for a shut-off of Venezuelan oil, our economy will withstand this assault. The impact on the Venezuelan economy, however, will be devastating. The Venezuelan people are already facing a shortage of everyday products such as rice, beans, milk, chickens, and coffee. Inflation in Venezuela is on the rise. Prosperity and opportunity are fading. Quite simply, should President Chavez cease shipping the 1.2 million barrels per day to the United States, the Chavez government will rapidly run out of money and his iron-fisted grip on the hopes and dreams of the Venezuelan people will quickly loosen.

The United States should respond with cautious preparation for a potential embargo by increasing our Strategic Petroleum Reserve, and we should take steps to assure the Venezuelan people that we will always stand by their side. Taking these prudent steps will ensure our economy will be stronger and our national security will be protected regardless of what course of action President Chavez pursues.

I am writing to urge you to use the influence of your office to help address dramatically inflated energy prices.

Record high crude oil prices are having far-reaching effects across my home state of Ohio and throughout the nation. The impact on the trucking industry is particularly dramatic. Small businesses unable to afford diesel fuel for their fleets are forced to lay off employees and independent truck drivers are struggling to make ends meet. Beyond the direct effects on the businesses themselves, the economic havoc wreaked by high energy prices is also felt by state and local economies. Ohio and other states are already facing enormous challenges in the economic arena; they can ill-afford the loss of more businesses and more jobs due to needlessly high energy prices.

There are actions you can and should take immediately to bring down fuel prices, to the benefit of the economy, the business community, and most importantly, the American people.

Your administration takes pride in its close, personal ties with many of the royal families of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC). In fact, last weekend, Vice President Cheney met with King Abdullah of Saudi Arabia. However, instead of pushing the Saudis and OPEC to increase output, the Vice President publicly lauded the Saudis for keeping a pledge made in 2005 to increase oil production. Three years ago is not today, and rather than take responsibility for failing to move OPEC to produce more, your administration has hinted that Americans are not doing their part to keep oil prices down. It is not surprising, then, that the markets failed to respond with a drop in oil prices following the Vice President's trip.

In a report released today, the Consumer Federation of America cited "OPEC resistance to increasing production," as a key reason for high oil prices. I strongly encourage you to call upon your OPEC connections and urge them to increase petroleum production. The amount of oil imported from these nations is a significant portion of our nation's overall petroleum imports. Our nation provides billions of dollars in assistance to OPEC member nations. Yet despite our long history of providing support to these countries, OPEC recently decided to keep production at the same levels, setting the stage for future record prices for oil.



You testified before the House Energy and Commerce Committee on February 7, 2008 regarding the Department of Energy's Fiscal Year 2009 budget. During this hearing, I asked you about oil and gas prices, specifically my legislation H.R. 594, the Prevent Unfair Manipulation of Prices (PUMP) Act.

Traditionally, trading of energy commodities has taken place on the New York Mercantile Exchange, with oversight by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC). However, an increasing amount of trading does not occur on NYMEX but in off-market deals, known as "over-the-counter" (OTC) trading.

OTC trading is conducted without any federal regulation or oversight. Without effective oversight, there is no way to know whether energy speculators are basing trades on market realities, or are instead taking advantage of the system to make money at the expense of hard-working Americans.

The PUMP Act would require off-market traders to operate under the same reporting requirements that traders that participate in on-market trading already do. By providing oversight and transparency to off-market trading, this legislation would allow the CFTC to better monitor these deals to prevent market manipulation, and will help eliminate the unreasonable inflation of crude oil prices, helping protect American consumers at the pump.

In fact, during a December 12, 2007 hearing I chaired of the Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee, economists testified that better federal oversight of these OTC trades could reduce the price of crude oil by as much as \$30 a barrel.

I asked you about this issue at last year's budget hearing as well. You explained by saying, and I quote, "You have markets that are in the hands of human beings. Human beings are essentially emotional souls..." You went on to say, "There are substantial

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swings in the marketplace." When I asked you on February 7, 2008, if you still believed that human emotions can cause substantial swings in these energy markets, and whether you were concerned that these swings are forcing consumers to pay higher prices, you said that you would look at the legislation and get back to me.

This past month, crude oil prices have broken records, reaching more than \$111 a barrel. It has been nearly two months since that hearing. Have you looked at the legislation? Are you prepared to provide your position on the PUMP Act?

Dear Mr. President:

In the past three weeks, three airlines have filed for bankruptcy protection. Today, Colorado-based Frontier Airlines filed for Chapter 11 reorganization because of cash flow issues caused by changes in credit processing that are directly attributable to broader problems in the airline industry. Those problems are driven in large part by the rapidly increasing price of oil.

If the price of oil remains at historic highs, these painful and unpredictable effects on our economy will only worsen. This is a difficult and complex problem, but I urge you to take two steps that will help bring down the price of oil.

First, I encourage you to place a one-year moratorium on additions to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve and to consider releasing oil from the reserve to address supply problems that contribute to the high price of oil for American consumers. At a time when Americans are struggling to pay for gasoline, I don't believe it makes sense for our government to be taking oil supplies off the market.

Second, I believe that given our billions of dollars of support for countries in the Middle East, your Administration should urge those countries to increase oil supplies in order to avoid a global economic downturn. Those countries share our interest in maintaining a stable price of oil that does not jeopardize economic vitality.

I believe this is a time for action. I hope you will consider these two recommendations as constructive steps toward addressing the economic hardships brought about by record-high oil prices.

Dear Secretary Bodman:

Everywhere I go in Maine, people share their frustration, anxiety and anger over skyrocketing fuel prices. Soaring fuel costs impact everyone who drives a car, heats a home or has a job that depends on affordable energy. They have been a tidal wave of red ink on family budgets and the spreadsheets of small businesses from farmers to fishermen. It was bad enough when consumers had to face these impacts at the pump and when the fuel bill arrived, but now they feel the pain in the grocery store, too. Exploding fuel prices contribute to a stagnating economy, helping to create a perfect storm of economic hardship for hard working Mainers.

The average price of gasoline in Maine has increased more than 69 cents per gallon since this time last year, and is at an all time high of more than 3.53 per gallon. The price of on-road diesel in Maine has increased by more than \$1.47 per gallon, or 34 percent over the same time period. Heating oil prices in Maine have increased by more than \$1.38 per gallon, a 36 percent increase. This price is significantly more expensive than the price of fuel after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita severely crippled our oil production in the Gulf of Mexico in 2005.

I understand the worldwide supply of crude is limited. I understand that there is significant crude production stranded in Iraq and that much crude supply is dependent on other unstable regimes. I realize that the demand for petroleum products has significantly increased in developing nations. What I cannot comprehend is how oil companies are making record profits at a time when the average consumer is paying twenty to thirty percent more for fuel.

Given the vertical integration of oil companies, and thus their tight control over production, refining, and distribution, the opportunity for price fixing, manipulation, and monopolistic practices is great. I note with interest that despite high prices (or perhaps because of them) and obvious demand, that there is more idle refinery capacity- 11.5 percent of total capacity -in the United States than at any time since 1992.

I am also very concerned about reports that speculation, undertaken in part by elements within oil companies or their representatives, is adding significant cost to the price of a barrel of oil. Speculation adds no value to the product and takes place in a nearly completely unregulated

or unmonitored environment. If the oil industry is driving this activity, it is more than just speculation, it is price manipulation.

The current prevailing situation in the petroleum products market is reminiscent of the California energy crisis of 2001, brought on and exacerbated by Enron's scandalous behavior. In that case, corporate greed combined with negligent regulation to gouge consumers and wreak havoc on the economy. I fear that today, we are seeing a repeat of that phenomenon on a larger and more ominous scale, and I firmly believe that the government has a responsibility to stop it by vigorously overseeing energy markets and investigating, prosecuting, and punishing any inappropriate or criminal behavior by oil companies, their subsidiaries, their agents or their employees. Therefore, I request that the Department of Energy undertake a formal investigation of price fixing, manipulation, rampant speculation and other unscrupulous behavior in the petroleum markets.

My constituents are held hostage by oil companies. Fuel use is, by and large, not a choice for Mainers in their day to day lives. Mainers cannot decide simply not to heat their homes during a harsh Maine winter, independent truckers cannot decide to stop hauling goods, and fishermen cannot sit idly at the dock. Oil company profits are rising at a faster pace than the disposable incomes of their captive customers. Failure to address fuel prices will cripple Maine businesses and Maine families trying to get by in a stagnant, possibly shrinking economy, exacerbated by the fuel crisis brought on by speculation and manipulation. That is why I again urge you to launch an immediate investigation into this matter.

Thank you in advance for your prompt attention to my request.

Dear Mr. President:

As the price of oil and gasoline continues to soar to record highs, we are writing to request that urgent action be taken to adequately investigate whether speculators are driving up prices in energy commodity markets through manipulative or deceptive practices.


One step that we believe should be undertaken immediately is for you to convene a task force to examine and evaluate trading in these markets. This task force should be comprised of officials at the highest levels of government, including the Secretary of the Treasury, the Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, the Chairman of the Commodities Future Trading Commission, the Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, the Chairman of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, and the Attorney General.

With the summer driving season quickly approaching, convening such a task force would not only send a strong signal to speculators, but would establish a coordinated and timely effort to protect consumers from skyrocketing energy prices. As such, we ask that the task force be convened and report its findings in no later than 60 days.

As you know, in the wake of the subprime mortgage and housing crisis, investors have flocked to commodities markets as a safe hedge against inflation and as a short-term speculative investment. Given that speculators and lenders in the commodities markets include hedge funds, brokerage firms, commercial banks, and other large financial institutions, we need to ensure that this increase in volume and volatility is not the result of unlawful manipulative practices. It is also critical to determine whether regulatory oversight agencies have enough tools and resources to maintain accountability over trading in commodity markets. Indeed, it has been reported that economists now posit that speculation, not fundamentals, is the dominant factor currently controlling these markets.

We believe that our government has an obligation to assure the American public that energy costs are not the result of market manipulation. We look forward to hearing from you on this critical issue.

Dear President Bush:

With Americans questioning the fairness of record high gas prices, we urge you to establish a new interagency Oil and Gas Market Fraud Task Force under the leadership of the Department of Justice to ensure that energy markets are free from illegal market manipulation and corporate corruption.

Oil and gas are irreplaceable commodities central to our economic prosperity, national security, and the health and well being of our citizens. However, with prices for these necessities more than tripling since 2002, families, businesses, and hard working Americans are struggling to make ends meet with ever shrinking disposable incomes. Airlines are going bankrupt and truckers aren't even getting paid enough to cover diesel prices that exceed \$4 dollar per gallon. Families have cut back on going out to dinner or the mall, further exacerbating our economic downturn.

Congress has received testimony from our nation's Attorneys General, energy market experts, and major oil company executives that the price of oil and gas can no longer be explained or predicted by normal market dynamics or their historic understanding of supply and demand fundamentals. Earlier this month, an executive from Exxon Mobil testified under oath that the price of crude oil should be about \$50 to \$55 per barrel based on the supply and demand fundamentals he had observed. Yet current crude oil prices, and crude oil futures, are expected to remain above \$100 for the next several years.

In the wake of the Enron and other corporate scandals, you initiated the Corporate Fraud Task Force at the Department of Justice as part of your Corporate Responsibility Initiative. By aggressively enforcing existing laws and regulations, the Task Force's actions have yielded over 1,200 corporate fraud convictions to date. In addition, the Justice Department has obtained more than one billion dollars in fraud-related forfeitures and has distributed that money to the victims of corporate fraud. We believe the Corporate Fraud Task Force should establish a new Oil and Gas Market Fraud Task Force and apply its considerable resources, initiative, and ability to coordinate federal agency efforts to help restore consumer confidence that energy prices are fair. We urge you to also add the Federal Trade Commission to the interagency Task Force.

The threat of oil and gas market manipulation remains real. For example, in its Congressionally directed investigation into gas price increases following Hurricanes

Katrina and Rita, the Federal Trade Commission found 15 examples of pricing at the refining, wholesale, or retail level that fit the relevant legislation's definition of evidence of "price gouging." In addition, last July, Marathon Oil Corp. agreed to pay a \$1 million fine to the Commodities Futures Trading Commission to settle charges that its Marathon Petroleum Company subsidiary attempted to manipulate crude oil prices in 2003.


As we learned from the 2000-2001 Western energy crisis, energy costs affect all sectors of our economy from transportation, to industry and business, to food prices and beyond. That electricity crisis took a serious toll on American consumers and businesses, causing a 1.5 percent decline in productivity that cost the West 589,000 jobs and a \$35 billion drop in domestic economic product.

How the federal government responds to the changing dynamics of energy markets is vital to our continued national and economic security. As members of Congress that aggressively sought consumer relief and accountability following the Western energy crisis, we learned that consumers are best protected when energy markets are subject to aggressive regulation and enforcement. And unless there is a cop on the beat vigilantly policing energy markets, sophisticated companies can fleece consumer pocketbooks without fear of penalty. We look forward to working with you to establish an Oil and Gas Market Task Force to root out fraud and manipulation in all corners of the oil and gas marketplace.

This is in reference to the letter of March 19, 2008 from Secretary Condoleezza Rice, Secretary Robert Gates, Secretary Samuel W. Bodman and Secretary Carlos M. Gutierrez to Senator Harry Reid suggesting the passage of legislation which would permit you to waive as to Libya the provisions of the Defense Authorization Act of 2008 facilitating collection of damages from terrorist nations.

The continued refusal of Libya to pay the amounts due American victims of terrorism in accordance with agreed upon settlements, Libya's arrogant denial of all wrongdoing in the face of overwhelming evidence of Libyan complicity in cases now coming up for trial coupled with the absence of any genuine settlement attempts for pending cases, all contradict the assertion in the Secretaries letter that Libya has been "cooperating with the U.S. legal system." Moreover, the underlying facts of those cases detail terrorist attacks in which hundreds of Americans were murdered upon order of Moammar Qadhafi who remains in power and will be the main beneficiary of this legislation. The actions to date of Qadhafi are not those of a person who has forsaken terrorism as a tool of foreign policy.

Libya is now off the terrorist list following lobbying of the White House by major American oil companies and other corporations doing business with Libya. It can only be a defendant in a suit brought in accordance with the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act for injuries resulting from a terrorist act ordered by Qadhafi which occurred during the time Libya was on the list of terrorist states. The Congress should not be asked to give Libya a legislative absolution from the consequences of murdering and injuring Americans to facilitate even higher profits for oil companies. Even more so, to turn our backs on American Armed Forces Members who were murdered or have been injured in these attacks while we ask their younger brothers, sisters and children to put their lives on the line in Iraq and Afghanistan would justifiably merit the most immediate and extreme disapproval of the American people.

Dear President Bush:

Americans are facing record-breaking energy prices. Today, with the price of oil above \$122 per barrel and regular gas prices around the country averaging \$3.77 per gallon, it is time to consider all measures that can provide short-term relief to American consumers. This week, the House of Representatives and the Senate passed bills that would halt the fill of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. Hopefully, this action will serve as a first step towards alleviating pressure on prices in the near-term. Later this week, during your meeting with the leaders of Saudi Arabia, you have an opportunity for even greater impact. Saudi Arabia could readily increase oil production by 1 million barrels of oil a day, and we strongly urge you to persuade them to use their enormous resources to help American consumers by increasing their oil output.

Energy independence and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions must be central to America's long term energy plans, and the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 puts America on a path to achieve that goal. That law pushes America's transportation sector to become more efficient and also embrace advanced and cellulosic biofuels, electric plug-in hybrid vehicles, and smart growth strategies that make our cities more livable and facilitate mass transit. Unfortunately, those changes, opposed for years by the Republican-controlled Congress intent on pursuing a reckless fossil-focused energy policy, will take time to yield benefits to consumers. That is why it is so important for the U.S. to stop taking oil off the market, and why it is even more essential for you to persuade the Saudi government to increase oil production.


During the 2000 presidential campaign, you told voters that if elected you "would work with our friends in OPEC to convince them to open up the spigot, to increase the supply. . . use the capital that my administration will earn, with the Kuwaitis or the Saudis, and convince them to open up the spigot." You stated in 2000 that the next president "ought to get on the phone with the OPEC cartel and say we expect you to open your spigots And the President of the United States must jawbone OPEC members to lower the price"

Reality has been rather different. OPEC's production has been relatively flat since you took office and global demand has skyrocketed. Now is the moment when tough talk

needs to be supported with tough action. Saudi Arabia has the most significant surplus capacity of all oil-producing countries, and it amounts to nearly 1.8 million barrels per day. You should persuade the Saudi government to put this excess production capacity to work in the near-term, while American consumers are making the long-term transition to an economy less dependent on oil.

We hope your persuasion with Saudi leaders this week is effective. For the sake of Americans feeling the effects of climbing prices and declining real incomes, your mission to the Middle East is extremely important. This experience underscores that the days of oil diplomacy are numbered. An energy policy based on wishful thinking and foreign generosity is a recipe for disaster. The Energy Act of 2007 will change that, but until those good policies have a chance to work, consumers need the near-term relief that you can deliver.

I believe such a move would signal to Americans that their government is sharing the daily hardships occasioned by this turbulent, uncertain energy crisis.



With Americans questioning the fairness of record high oil and gas prices, we urge you to establish a new interagency Oil and Gas Market Fraud Task Force under the leadership of the Department of Justice to ensure that energy markets are free from illegal market manipulation or corporate corruption.

Oil and gas are irreplaceable commodities central to our economic prosperity, national security, and the health and well being of our citizens. Prices for these necessities however have more than tripled since 2002—families, businesses, and hard working Americans are struggling to make ends meet with ever shrinking disposable incomes. Airlines are going bankrupt and truckers are barely getting paid enough to cover diesel prices that exceed \$4 dollar per gallon. Families have cut back on going out to dinner or the mall, further exacerbating our economic downturn.

Congress has received testimony from energy market experts and major oil company executives that the price of oil and gas can no longer be explained or predicted by normal market dynamics or their historic understanding of supply and demand forces. An executive from Exxon Mobil recently testified before Congress under oath that the price of crude oil should be about \$50 to \$55 per barrel based on the supply and demand fundamentals he had observed. Yet current crude oil prices are more than double that amount and crude oil futures remain well above \$100 per barrel through 2016.

In the wake of the Enron and other corporate scandals, you initiated the Corporate Fraud Task Force at the Department of Justice as part of your Corporate Responsibility Initiative. By aggressively enforcing existing laws and regulations, the Task Force's actions have yielded over 1,200 corporate fraud convictions to date. In addition, the Justice Department has obtained more than one billion dollars in fraud-related forfeitures and has distributed that money to the victims of corporate fraud. We believe the Corporate Fraud Task Force should establish a new Oil and Gas Market Fraud Task Force and apply its considerable resources, initiative, and ability to coordinate federal agency efforts to help restore consumer confidence that energy prices are fair. We also urge you to add the Federal Trade Commission, which received new authority in the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 to prevent manipulation in the wholesale oil and petroleum distillate markets, to the interagency Task Force.

The threat of oil and gas market manipulation remains real. For example, last July, Marathon Oil Corporation agreed to pay a \$1 million fine to the Commodities Futures Trading Commission to settle charges that its Marathon Petroleum Company subsidiary attempted to manipulate crude oil prices. Similarly, in the summer of 2006, a manipulative scheme to game the natural gas market by the now defunct hedge fund Amaranth cost consumers upwards of \$9 billion. And a federal investigation led British Petroleum to pay approximately \$373 million in part for conspiring to corner the market and manipulate the price of propane carried through Texas pipelines.

As we learned from the 2000-2001 Western electricity crisis, rising energy costs hurt virtually every sector of our economy and drive inflation and losses in consumer confidence. That electricity crisis took a serious toll on American consumers and businesses, forcing a 1.5 percent decline in productivity which caused 589,000 Americans to lose their jobs and a \$35 billion drop in domestic economic product.

How the federal government responds to the changing dynamics of energy markets is vital to our continued national and economic security. If the Western energy crisis taught us anything it is that consumers are best protected when energy markets are subject to aggressive oversight and enforcement. And unless there is a cop on the beat vigilantly policing energy markets --especially when supplies are tight in markets with extremely inelastic demand-- sophisticated companies can fleece consumer pocketbooks without fear of penalty. We look forward to working with you to establish an Oil and Gas Market Task Force to root out fraud and manipulation in all corners of the oil and gas marketplace, and restore consumer confidence.

Dear President Bush:

American consumers are facing unprecedented gasoline prices, with the national average price of a gallon of regular gas at \$3.51, roughly \$.66 higher than last year and more than double since 2001. The price of diesel fuel has increased even more rapidly - reaching a record \$4.20 a gallon on Monday, over a dollar more expensive than 2007. The price of diesel fuel not only impacts truck drivers, but it pushes food and transportation costs higher for consumers too. The combined effect of these energy prices drags down our economy, which can serve to extend and deepen the recession even further.

Your administration has shown a callous indifference for the pain these high prices are inflicting on American families. At the same time, your administration has coddled Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) nations whose actions have contributed to this crisis.

We are writing to urge you to demand that OPEC members increase their oil production because they are currently producing well under their capacity. As you know, the first four months of 2008 witnessed extraordinary and historic increases in the cost of crude oil, which has impacted not only the costs of gasoline and heating oil in the U.S., but food and commodity prices, as well. Despite skyrocketing energy costs, OPEC members claimed that they saw no reason to increase production quotas. We respectfully urge you to call upon Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates (UAE), and other OPEC members to increase their oil production immediately.

OPEC's recent decision to not increase production before next fall at the earliest will surely cause prices to remain high and will lead to higher energy prices for Americans this spring and summer. Recently, Ali al-Naimi, Saudi Arabia's oil minister, said there was no need to increase supplies by "even one barrel of oil." And Abdullah al-Attiyah, Qatar's energy minister, said, "Is there a need for extra production? I don't think so."

OPEC members have no economic incentive to increase the supply of oil, because that would lead to a drop in price. The OPEC cartel is reaping the benefits of record profits at the expense of the American consumer and economy. Saudi Arabia was producing

roughly 9.55 million barrels per day (MBPD) in 2005, but it dropped production down to 8.72 MBPD last year. By their own estimates, they have the capacity to produce over 11 MBPD. Both Kuwait and the UAE are also producing below their total capacity.


At a time when high energy prices are causing widespread anxiety among American households, we question the merit of rewarding members of OPEC with lucrative arms sales. The perverse incentives created by this arrangement suggest a callous disregard for the devastating impact on the American economy of high energy prices.

We question why your administration would reward Saudi Arabia for its failure to increase its crude oil production with the sale of 900 Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) kits that could top \$100 million. We question why your administration would reward the UAE with a Patriot missile defense deal that could be worth as much as \$9 billion. And we question why your administration rewarded Kuwait by offering \$2 billion in arms sales. All told, in the past six months, your administration has proposed selling almost \$14 billion worth of weapons to Gulf members of OPEC who contributed to the global oil crisis.


While some of us have concerns in general about arming this region to the teeth, should Saudi Arabia or the UAE fail to significantly increase daily production of crude oil, we would be compelled to block any and all sales of weapons from the United States to Saudi Arabia and the UAE, and would consider exploring blocking additional weapons sales to other OPEC members.

While we are fighting an immensely expensive war in Iraq, which the administration intended to be paid for by Iraq's oil revenues, American taxpayers have ended up footing the bill in the form of rising energy costs. At the same time, the Department of Defense continues to ship billions of dollars in weapons systems to the very same OPEC countries enjoying the windfall oil profits. The American people deserve better. We look forward to your prompt attention to this matter.


I am writing to express my concerns about the rapidly rising price of home heating oil and its impact on households in the Northeast, especially in New Hampshire.

As you know, over the past few years, the price of heating oil has increased dramatically. According to the Energy Information Administration (EIA), for 2007, the average residential heating oil price was \$2.72 per gallon. This year, the price is expected to increase 45 percent to \$3.95 per gallon, and climb higher in 2009, to \$4.25 per gallon. In New Hampshire, heating oil is even more expensive, with a current average price of \$4.53 per gallon. Five years ago, heating oil in the Granite State only cost \$1.40 per gallon.

The Northeast is disproportionately impacted by these rapidly escalating heating oil prices, since 32 percent of residents depend on heating oil as their primary fuel source. New Hampshire is even more reliant, with 56 percent of residents using heating oil to heat their homes. Contrast that with other areas of the country, such as the Midwest, where only 3 percent use heating oil and the majority of residents, or 79 percent, use natural gas.

During the cold winter months, many households in New Hampshire must turn on their oil furnace to stay warm; however, rising prices can force them to choose between heat and other basic necessities. This is a choice that no American should face, and I respectfully request an update on what steps the Department of Energy (DOE) is taking to address this important and timely issue.

I write today with respect to the high cost of gasoline. Today, the average cost of a gallon of regular gasoline is more than \$4.10. This is an increase of well over a dollar a gallon from a year ago.

As you know, each and every day, Americans struggle to cope with this rapid, record increase in fuel costs. Across the United States, individual Americans are taking their own initiatives to find ways to reduce gas consumption through driving less, altering daily routines, and even changing or cancelling family vacation plans.

To date, as far as I can determine, the federal government has taken few, if any, initiatives to join in this national effort to help address this ever increasing crisis.

I believe it is essential that we continue to modernize our energy infrastructure and develop a reliable, commonsense American energy strategy – one that includes new supplies from domestic exploration and extraction, encourages conservation, and promotes the use and advancement of clean, renewable energies.

I am among a group of many senators today who are working in a bipartisan fashion to find a solution. For the past several years, I have supported permitting the Commonwealth of Virginia to explore and extract energy offshore if its Governor and General Assembly so desire. This concept has just recently gained the support of the administration and a growing number of colleagues in Congress.

However, the truth is that new technologies and new sources of energy will not provide meaningful relief for years to come as new technologies are developed and as new sources of energy are discovered and extracted. We must be straight with the American public and not raise hopes that these efforts will provide immediate solutions and possible relief.

There are ways to give some immediate relief. In my view, new conservation efforts are the quickest way to see an immediate reduction in the price of gas at the pump. The American public is already doing its part through individual means of cutting back.

On a federal level, on May 22, 2008, Senator Bingaman and I introduced, and the Senate unanimously passed by voice vote, a sense-of-the-Senate resolution (S. Res. 577) that urged the President to initiate, among all federal departments and agencies of the executive branch, a reduction of their daily consumption of gasoline - if only by a small percentage.

To my knowledge, the administration has not responded to the Senate's action. In the absence of pending administration action, Congress should join with the public and make the concepts in the sense-of-the-Senate resolution a mandatory law.

Turning to another concept, I call to your attention action taken by the Congress and the executive branch during a similar petroleum shortage that occurred in 1973 and 1974. In January 1974, the President signed into law "The Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act" (Public Law 93-239), which passed both the House and Senate unanimously. This law was enacted in an effort to conserve fuel.

Specifically, the law put forth inducements for states to reduce speed limits to 55 miles per hour (mph) on all major highways. Failure to do so would jeopardize the ability of states to secure federal highway funds. The law was originally intended to be temporary, ceasing to be in effect if the President declared that there was no longer a fuel shortage or on or after June 30, 1975, whichever occurred first.

According to a Congressional Research Service report, the law resulted in reduced consumption of 167,000 barrels of petroleum a day, a roughly 2 percent reduction in the nation's highway fuel consumption. In addition, the National Academy of Sciences found that the law saved up to 4,000 lives per year from highway accidents. Given the significant increase in the number of vehicles on America's highway system from 1974 to 2008, one could assume that the amount of fuel that could be conserved today is far greater.

Given the fuel savings of the act, and the resulting significant decrease in highway fatalities attributable to the national speed limit, Congress made the national speed limit permanent in December 1974. In 1995, the law was repealed.

The purpose of this letter is to ask you to study this era of conservation, as I have, to determine whether the administration, with the support of Congress, should take similar action today.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy Web site, engineering data shows that fuel efficiency decreases rapidly above 60 mph. Specifically, for every 5 mph an individual drives over 60 mph, that individual essentially is paying an extra 30 cents per gallon in fuel costs.

As Congress continues to look for ways to ease this national problem, I put to you the following questions. I will share your responses with my colleagues.

- (1) Given the significant technological improvements since 1974, at what speed is the typical vehicle traveling on America's highways today most fuel efficient?
- (2) If a national speed limit was enacted similar to the 1974 law, but the speed limit under that law was consistent with most fuel efficient speed for the typical vehicle traveling on America's highways, what would be a reasonable projection for total fuel savings? And, what would be the savings for the average citizen who owns and operates a vehicle?
- (3) If a new national speed limit was enacted consistent with the two questions listed above, how many fewer barrels of petroleum a day would Americans consume? Is it reasonable to believe that there would be a reduction in price at the pump? And, if so, what are the ranges you could project for cost reductions?
- (4) If the federal government took the initiative to reduce its oil consumption, consistent the concepts of the sense-of-the-Senate resolution (S. Res. 577) how many fewer barrels of petroleum a day would be saved by the federal government?

Given that Congress, upon its return next week, will be vigorously considering all options, your response to this request could be of great help to my colleagues and me. Again, years ago, the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act worked. The administration's advice, after examining this era and these concepts, would be helpful.

Dear Mr. President,

I am writing in regard to the unprecedented increase in fuel prices and its negative impact on the people of my congressional district and across the country. Mr. President, your immediate action is required to mitigate this problem.

Unfortunately, politics at its worst has raised its ugly head in the debate over high fuel prices. As you know, this will do nothing to lower prices at the pump nor will it help restore confidence in our government, both things you and I have a responsibility to address.

Specifically, the drumbeat from some public officials to expand drilling in the United States has become deafening. However, the fact remains that even if we began drilling in new areas today, it would take ten years for this oil to reach consumers. Moreover, there are 68 million acres of federal land under lease to oil companies where oil production could begin tomorrow, yet they remained untouched.

The simple truth is that opening further land to drilling has not worked in the past, and will have no impact on fuel prices in the foreseeable future. These facts are undeniable:

- Currently, oil and gas companies hold leases on over 90 million acres of federal lands on and offshore, yet are producing oil from only a quarter of this land, leaving recoverable oil in the ground to appreciate as prices rise;
- The five largest integrated oil companies used their record-breaking profits last year to buy back \$50 billion worth of stock rather than investing in infrastructure improvements that would reduce supply disruptions that cause prices to rise;
- Drilling for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) would not produce any oil for 8 to 10 years. If the best estimates of oil reserves in ANWR are true, this would only save consumers 1.8 cents per gallon of gasoline in 2030;
- The likely increase in supply from ANWR would not have as much of an impact as the reduction in demand due to increased corporate average fuel economy (CAFE) standards, which are estimated to save the average American family \$700-1000 per year by 2020; and,
- Opening all of the outer continental shelf, including the coast of California, to offshore oil drilling would save only three or four cents per gallon of gasoline several years from now while exposing our beaches and coastlines to potentially devastating oil spills.

Regarding the issue of speculation, I understand this activity accounts for up to 25% of the cost of a barrel of oil. It would benefit the people of our great country, who are buying gas and diesel to commute to work, travel, drive to the store or to see their doctor, for our offices to work together to stop this damaging profiteering at the expense of our economy and the people we represent. Currently, a speculator can trade a contract for the future delivery of 1000 barrels of oil (worth around \$135,000) by putting up as little as \$9,625. We must be careful that prices are not being driven beyond reasonable market levels by excessively leveraged speculators.

Releasing oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) immediately into the market would add to crude oil inventories, which, according to the Energy Information Administration, have dwindled significantly over the past several weeks. This would send a strong and meaningful message to speculators and would go far in dampening the intense volatility that we have seen recently in oil markets. As you know, the SPR was at 97% of capacity this morning, over 705.7 million barrels. Reducing the reserve to 90% of capacity would boost the supply of oil by 50 million barrels, approximately the amount that you attempted to secure from the Saudi government on your recent visit with King Abdullah. Using the SPR to temporarily increase the oil supply would help to counter the significant premium speculators are adding to the current price per barrel.

In addition to taking steps to provide relief for fuel prices in the short-term, I believe our long-term energy policy must also address:

- Extending tax incentives for renewable energy technology, such as solar, wind, biomass, and cellulosic biofuels;
- Encouraging the development of more fuel efficient cars and continuing tax credits for individuals who purchase hybrid cars;
- Incentivize the development of a filling station infrastructure to support hydrogen fueled vehicles;
- Increasing our investments in public transportation to allow for further conservation of fuel;
- Investment in expanding current refining capacity and requiring diligent development of existing leases that have already been permitted by the federal government for oil drilling; and,
- Ensure the consideration and development of other energy technologies.

In conclusion, please join those of us in Congress trying to solve this problem and encourage those spreading unproductive rhetoric to instead work with us to address the need for both short-term action and a long-term energy policy. It is incumbent upon us to take immediate action to address this crisis before rising fuel prices do any more harm to the American people.

Dear Mr. President:

The upcoming July 2008 G-8 Summit is an important opportunity to tackle the problem of rising oil prices on a global scale. We urge you to engage your counterparts in efforts to reduce global oil speculation and other questionable market activities that distort the supply and demand market equation and artificially distort the price of these commodities.

While we understand that global supply and demand issues as well as the weak U.S. dollar play a role in determining price – the fact remains that current supply and demand conditions do not add up to current market price increases. Speculation, in most cases by individuals that will never take a barrel of oil into inventory, is placing a distorted premium on the price of oil. This is evident by the nearly \$240 billion growth in oil future investments since 2000. On March 4, 2008, Guy Caruso, Administrator of the Energy Information Administration testified before the Senate that speculation was currently adding as much as 10 percent to the price of oil, a relatively conservative estimate compared to some from the private sector. As far back as March 15, 2005, Exxon Mobile CEO Lee Raymond was quoted in the *New York Times* saying "We are in the mode where the fundamentals of supply and demand really don't drive the price." Three years later, during questioning in April 2008 before the House Select Committee on Energy Independence and Global Warming, Stephen Simon of Exxon Mobil cited speculation as one of the major causes of the exorbitant oil and gas prices we've seen, while executives from Shell, BP, Chevron, and ConocoPhillips agreed.

The U.S. is not alone facing the effects of the recent high spike in oil prices. On May 28, British Prime Minister Gordon Brown wrote in *The Guardian* that "a global shock on this scale requires global solutions" and argued that a global strategy to address the impact of higher oil prices be on the agenda for this year's G-8 Summit. We agree with the need for greater international cooperation in bringing transparency to the global petroleum commodity and derivative markets and urge you to join with Prime Minister Brown and other G-8 leaders to discuss solutions to this critical issue.



The recent announcement by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission on May 29 that they have reached agreements with the United Kingdom Financial Services Authority (FSA) and the ICE Futures Europe for expanded information sharing on trading activities in regulated markets is a step in the right direction. However, this effort stops far short of bringing transparency to the currently unregulated markets. It ignores transactions currently excluded or exempted from CFTC oversight under Sections 2(g) and 2(h) of the Commodities Exchange Act. We remain concerned that it is impossible to draw realistic conclusions about market behavior when looking at only a fraction of the market.


Without a comprehensive review of activities in the entire petroleum market, it is unlikely that truly accurate assessment of speculative behavior and its impact on price can be made. This is particularly true in today's global economy, where strategic cooperation and coordination among nations is necessary to ensure stability and transparency in globally traded commodities. In the banking sector, the inter-governmental Financial Action Task Force (FATF) created at the 1989 G-7 conference to develop and promote national and international policies to combat money laundering and later terrorist financing has proved a successful model of international financial information exchange and policy development.

As you prepare for next month's G-8 summit, we urge you to discuss with your colleagues a similar effort focused on building international transparency in oil commodity transactions and developing policies to thwart speculative positioning or other manipulative behavior that impacts prices and undermines market fundamentals.

Hard-working Americans across the country are struggling to cope with the rising costs for energy. With crude oil at over \$135 a barrel and gasoline averaging over \$4.00 a gallon, Americans are spending ever more of their family budgets on transportation costs. In my travels across the state of Iowa, I've heard from farmers, small businesses, truck drivers and families who are desperately in need of help.

Because of the increased cost for fuel, American's are forced to take measures to reduce their consumption, either by driving less, combining errands, car pooling, or driving a more fuel efficient vehicle. These measures don't eliminate the burden of high gas prices, but they're small steps that can be taken to increase efficiency and reduce consumption. While people across the country are looking for ways to reduce their fuel burden by using less, the federal government doesn't appear to be taking the same steps to reduce wasteful energy consumption and save taxpayer money. I know you'll agree that the federal government should be leading in this area, not lagging.

Each and every day, there are likely dozens, if not hundreds of federal government SUVs and sedans idling for hours in Washington alone while waiting for their passengers. Some of the biggest culprits of this practice are vehicles attending to cabinet secretaries, deputy secretaries and assistant secretaries. I understand that in some cases the idling may be necessary. But, I would imagine that in an overwhelming majority of the situations there is no reason for a car or SUV to remain idling for hours on end. Surely there are simple and painless steps the federal government could take to do its part to reduce energy use, including eliminating this wasteful behavior.

Some might say these cases are a spit in the ocean of our energy problems, but the limousines and SUVs of high-level government leaders are important symbols of leadership and their actions are sending a message that they're out of touch. There are likely thousands of situations such as this where fuel is being wasted by federal employees who have never been instructed to use common sense to reduce fuel use in their daily job duties.



A 'do-nothing' U.S. Senate? Then, fight its use of arcane, unfair tactic

Sen. Arlen Specter

Last Friday, the "do-nothing" Senate adjourned for the August recess without taking any action on the prices of oil or gas at the pump and other key issues, because the "world's greatest deliberative body" is gridlocked.

The American people need to know why, so that public pressure can be applied to make the Senate do its job. A practice has evolved where the majority leaders, both Republicans and Democrats, have used a procedural device called "filling the tree" to bar any other senator from offering any amendment.

Until 1993, this tactic was seldom used, so that any senator had a right to offer virtually any amendment to any bill at any time. That, plus unlimited debate, made the Senate a unique legislative forum to air important public policy issues and to acquaint the public with the need for new laws.

The importance of allowing senators the right to offer amendments can't be overstated. It is through the amendment process that bad legislation is made palatable and palatable legislation is made better. That changed when majority leaders from both parties found they could gain partisan political advantage by using their power to offer a sufficient number of amendments to fill the tree. This arcane, inside-the-Beltway tactic needs to be understood so that the American people can insist on its being stopped.

When the Oil Speculators Bill was brought up July 23, Democratic Majority Leader Sen. Harry Reid of Nevada filled the tree. Reid then moved for cloture, which means to cut off further debate so that the legislation would move to final passage.

I joined in helping to defeat cloture, which required 60 votes. Even though I favored the basic principles of the legislation, I opposed it because I was precluded from offering an amendment to subject OPEC nations to our anti-trust laws, which would stop them from raising the international price of oil by acting jointly to lower production.

Then the finger-pointing began. Reid blamed Republicans for killing the bill by all but failing to defeat cloture. Republicans countered that it was the fault of Reid and the Democrats because Republicans were not all supporters of amendments. The public was understandably bewildered.

Nothing got done.

With the Oil Speculators Bill pending, no other legislation could be considered under Senate rules without displacing that bill. Republicans refused to set aside the bill, arguing that oil and gasoline prices were the most urgent problems facing the nation.

There was a significant element of politics in the Republican position, but it was also solid on the merits. This impasse resulted in the Senate's not considering other important legislation, such as Defense Department funding, tax credits for alternative energy, increasing grants for low-income heating energy assistance, and the reported child bill.

When the shoe was on the other foot and Republicans controlled the Senate, Democrats were adamant in denouncing their Majority Leader Sen. Bill Frist (R., Tenn.) for filling the tree.

On Feb. 28, 2006, Reid said: "Filling the amendment tree... is a very bad practice. It runs against the basic nature of the Senate. The hallmark of the Senate is free speech and open debate." Majority Democratic Sen. Christopher Dodd of Connecticut said May 11, 2006, that filling the tree "to basically lock out any amendments... runs contrary to the very essence of this body."

I have long opposed this tactic. In February 2007, I introduced Senate Resolution 83 calling for a revision of the Senate rules to prohibit filling the tree. Notwithstanding my frequent requests, the rules committee has failed to act on this proposal.

Once the American people understand what is happening to subvert the legislative process, sufficient public pressure could be mounted to change this tactic and restore equilibrium and fair play to the Senate.

Last year, the United States sent an average of 1.433 million barrels a day of oil and petroleum products to foreign nations. That number has since jumped to 1.806 million barrels a day in May 2008, the most recent month for which data is available. That export level amounts to nearly 10 percent of all the oil the United States consumes every day. In addition, the United States reached the highest level of oil exports in our nation's history in February of this year. Rather than being shipped overseas, that oil should remain here at home to help American consumers who are facing record energy prices.

Sending America's vital energy resources overseas during our time of need should stop. I am writing to urge you to determine whether you have authority to take action to immediately halt all export; of U.S. oil, and if not, to work with Congress to give the Executive Branch authority to protect America's vital resources. Continuing to allow oil companies to export domestically produced oil at a time of near record gas prices is only exacerbating our current energy crisis. It is imperative that action be taken to immediately halt all shipments of domestically produced oil overseas to protect American consumers.

You have called for lifting the moratoria on offshore drilling off our beaches on the East and West Coasts and Florida in order to produce more oil domestically. However, your own Department of Energy projects that at the height of production, in 2030, increased offshore drilling would produce only 200,000 barrels per day — one ninth the amount of oil we currently send to foreign countries every day. Moreover, at the current export rate, by the time the first barrel of oil could be produced from increased offshore drilling, we would have already exported the equivalent of nearly 40 percent of the oil that is projected to lie beneath protected areas offshore.

It is unacceptable to allow our domestically produced oil to be exported in such large quantities while America is facing an energy crisis. You must step forward to protect


Dear Mr. Secretary,

In light of recent diminished United States refinery capacity in the wake of Hurricanes Ike and Gustav, and the subsequent shortage of gasoline in North Carolina and across the southeast United States, action must be taken now. There must be relief to this energy crisis. The situation is especially critical in Western North Carolina, where our offices have been receiving disturbing reports regarding gasoline shortages. In the Charlotte area, an increasing number of gasoline stations are out of fuel, prompting motorists to wait in line for several hours and forcing some to abandon their cars after running out of gas. Police have been dispatched to several areas as long lines of hundreds of motorists have disrupted traffic. Schools in the area have closed for the rest of the week because of the gas shortage since many students and teachers have no fuel to drive to school. This is a harmful toll on our economy and security during an already distressed time.

Given these disturbing developments, an International Energy Agency (IEA) emergency release of gasoline and diesel fuel to the United States is justified. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, weekly gasoline inventories were at the lowest level since the agency started keeping records in 1990. We have been notified by your Department that there are still six oil refineries that are inoperable along the Gulf Coast, and many more that will take up to two weeks to ramp up to full capacity. This represents far too great a shortage, for far too long of a time, of refined product available to the country.

With an IEA release of emergency supplies of gasoline and diesel to the United States, we can help alleviate an increasingly dire situation in North Carolina and across the country. We respectfully request that you call upon the IEA for immediate assistance.

News reports indicate that the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) has scheduled an emergency meeting tomorrow in order to cut petroleum production. OPEC's current president, Chakib Khelil, was quoted as saying that he expects the cartel to decide in favor of a "significant" production cut at the meeting—as much as 2 million barrels per day. Any increase in energy prices right now would further compound our economic troubles and adversely impact American families. As a result, I am writing to urge you to use every tool at your disposal in order to pressure OPEC to not reduce production.

While oil and gas prices have declined in recent weeks, American consumers and our economy are still feeling the strains of the record prices we saw this summer. Earlier this year, oil hit record highs of nearly \$150 per barrel and gas averaged more than \$4 per gallon nationwide. Consumers have been spending more on everything from gas to groceries and are in desperate need of relief.

American consumers are also facing an impending home heating crisis this winter. According to the Energy Information Administration's (EIA) *Short Term Energy and Winter Fuels Outlook*, "Average household expenditures for all space-heating fuels are projected to be \$1,137 this winter (October 1 to March 31), a 15-percent increase over the estimated \$986 spent last winter. The largest increases will be in households using heating oil and natural gas." With consumers already facing home heating costs that will be significantly higher than last year, any additional increase as a result of OPEC cutting production could mean that many families will face choices between purchasing food or purchasing fuel this winter.

Meanwhile, according to the EIA, OPEC member nations have already earned an estimated \$821 billion in net oil export earnings through September and could ultimately earn more than \$1 trillion in 2008. It would be unconscionable for OPEC to cut production as our economy is reeling and its countries are already seeing profits gush into their pockets.

We write in regard to the two Draft Supplemental Repository and Rail Alignment Environmental Impact Statements (Repository SEIS and Rail SEIS) that were published in October 2007. The SEISs are incomplete; based on flawed assumptions; and lack essential environmental, technical, and economic analysis. While we are firmly opposed to the Department's efforts to obtain construction authorization for a repository in Nevada, we also believe that it would be dishonest and dangerous for the Department to rely on incomplete environmental analyses to support its license application.

Draft Repository SEIS

Below, we have highlighted several issues that bring into question the quality and completeness of the Repository SEIS. We are skeptical whether the Department can adequately address these issues by the time it plans to submit a license application for construction to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The Department's failure to examine the performance of a standardized transport, aging, and disposal (TAD) canister after the proposed repository has been closed is conspicuous. Although DOE has made TAD canisters a fundamental component of its spent nuclear fuel transportation methods, its interim storage plan, and its proposed geologic repository design, the Department does not even give proper consideration to how TAD canisters will perform after emplacement in the proposed repository.

While the absence of such analysis is troubling, it is not surprising, considering that the DOE does not yet have a final TAD design. Without a final TAD design, estimated impacts of TAD canisters are subject to change and are unreliable as a basis for determining long-term repository performance. Moreover, the Department cannot provide any reliable estimate of what percentage of spent nuclear fuel – they only offer a “goal of 90 percent” – will actually arrive in TAD canisters and what percentage will have to be repackaged by DOE at the repository prior to emplacement. It is clear that the Department’s proposal to rely on TAD canisters for shipping, aging, and disposal is still in the early stages of development and is not yet ready for serious NEPA analysis.

A second issue that DOE should reconsider in its final Repository SEIS is that the locations for several planned facilities are not specified in the draft SEIS. For example, the locations for an explosives storage area, cask maintenance facility, solid waste landfill, and borrow pits have not yet been fixed. These facilities would contain hazardous, explosive, and/or radioactive materials and could be exposed to seismic activity, flooding, and other natural disasters. As these facilities could have a significant impact on the environment, the Repository SEIS cannot be complete without specified locations and complete environmental analysis for each facility.

Additionally, the DOE has based its conclusions about post-closure environmental impact on the assumption that the government will install 11,500 titanium drip shields over waste canisters sometime in the next 100 to 300 years. This approach is extremely problematic – not only is it impossible to know whether these drip shields will actually ever be installed one to three centuries from today, it is also speculative to assume that we will have adequate titanium to do so or that the proposed repository will be in a physical condition that allows these drip shields to be installed. Simply put, it appears that DOE has crafted the idea of installing drip shields in an attempt to show that a repository could meet EPA’s Radiation Protection Standards for Yucca Mountain without considering the idea’s feasibility. While it may be prudent for the DOE to consider the technology and science behind using drip shields for geologic storage of nuclear waste, it is irresponsible for the Department to assume the application of drip shields in its NEPA and license application documents for Yucca Mountain.

Further, it appears that many statements in the Repository SEIS are unsupported. In several instances, there are no scientific references listed to support claims on topics such as volcanic eruptions, nuclear criticality, and radiation dosages for members of the public. In any final NEPA documents that DOE publishes, we are hopeful that the Department will ensure that references are complete so that statements and claims can be efficiently and effectively considered by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the public, and all interested parties.

Draft Rail SEIS

We remain deeply concerned with the Department’s plans for constructing a rail line through Nevada to Yucca Mountain. The Caliente Rail Corridor – the Department’s

preferred route – would send spent nuclear fuel over 300 miles through Nevada. With no existing rail line, the construction of the Caliente Corridor would have a significant impact on the environment and water quality and could interfere with new renewable energy development and mining. Worse, the trains could be exposed to rock falls, landslides, and potential earthquakes while carrying nuclear waste – a devastating possibility that warrants meticulous analysis by the Department. Unfortunately, such a level of analysis has not yet been completed.

The Rail SEIS lacks adequate analysis of fundamental aspects – from geology to land use and cultural resources to energy resources – and the Department has not fully considered how the Caliente Corridor will impact Nevada. The Rail SEIS leaves out critical information related to geologic events and seismic impacts that could disrupt the railway as well as nuclear waste shipments. Despite the fact that the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires a full disclosure of environmental impacts, with the goal of achieving transparency, DOE has not provided maps of surface faults or buried faults, which could threaten the integrity of the railway.

With respect to the environment, the Rail SEIS does not provide a complete evaluation of the Caliente Corridor's potential impact on the environment. The Department has failed to closely consider soil erosion and harms to water quality near the railroads, which suggests that DOE simply does not have a complete understanding of its rail alignment proposal. Railroad construction will necessarily dislodge rock and soil, induce erosion, and create a risky environment during flooding events for a railway intended to transport tens of thousands of tons of radioactive waste. The Department's SEIS disregards these potentially disastrous scenarios without providing a technical basis for all of its conclusions.

The Rail SEIS also fails to consider the flow into springs and wetlands of poor-quality water – water that has been mixed with chemicals, sediment, and petroleum products spilled from construction equipment.

Additionally, the economic impact on the affected communities must be thoroughly considered before the Department decides to break ground on the Caliente Corridor. DOE's preferred route would severely impact rural communities; disrupt livestock operations and grazing lands; utilize scarce water resources; and cross private residential, industrial, and commercial land with the railway. In addition, we are also concerned that the Caliente Corridor would interfere with mining and renewable energy development in Nevada. Although DOE acknowledges that there are potential wind, solar, and geothermal energy resources along the Caliente Corridor, the Department fails to consider the opportunity costs of constructing a rail line over this land. The Rail SEIS erroneously states that the locations of energy resources are unknown, despite the fact that publicly available maps (<http://www.unr.edu/geothermal/renewables.htm>) show that there are significant potential solar energy resources in the northeast corner and western boundary of the Nevada Test and Training Range.

Although the Rail SEIS does provide limited consideration of mining, it does not adequately assess the impacts that the proposed corridor would have on mine shafts and tunnels, mining safety, and the integrity and stability of the railroad itself. The Department must make a more comprehensive effort to assess the opportunity costs of lost mining potential caused by the Caliente Corridor, as well as the possible impact on existing mining activity.


Another area of concern is that the Rail SEIS ignores the impact that the Caliente Corridor would have on the Las Vegas metropolitan area. The Department is proposing to send one to two trucks each week carrying nuclear waste over Clark County's most highly traveled highway and interstates, yet has failed to consider the environmental, social, and economic impact that this action will undoubtedly have. This nuclear waste shipping campaign will include up to 13 rail shipments through Las Vegas each year, using the DOE's estimates which are likely low, and will proceed for up to 50 years. The state of Nevada has estimated that at least 95,000 Nevadans live, work, and entertain tourists on the Las Vegas Strip within one-half mile of the routes through Clark County to Yucca Mountain using the Caliente Corridor. It is inconceivable that the Department's Rail SEIS could be finalized without a much more comprehensive analysis of the impact that the preferred route will undoubtedly have on Clark County and the Las Vegas metropolitan area.


Finally, it would be impossible for the Department to issue a truly complete Rail SEIS without conducting a national scoping process. The Caliente Corridor would cause thousands of shipments of nuclear waste across national railways to deliver nuclear waste to Nevada. DOE has not adequately analyzed the impact of a national nuclear waste shipping campaign, despite the fact that states, cities, and communities home to millions of people will be significantly impacted by the transportation network made possible by the Caliente route to Yucca Mountain. The Department should perform a national public scoping for affected communities as part of the Rail SEIS. NEPA requires such a scoping process, and the Caliente Corridor is a primary component in this major federal action.


The Yucca Mountain Project has faced many controversies and management failures, and the science behind the proposal is questionable at best. As a result, the above comments provide a summary of only some of the most serious flaws with the Rail and Repository SEISs. We are confident that the public, the state of Nevada, and other interested and affected individuals will also provide thoughtful comments and raise issues that the Department has not yet considered. It is imperative that the Department provide each comment it receives on these SEISs thorough consideration, considering the magnitude and long-term impact of the proposed repository.



I understand that the Department of Energy (DOE) released its Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) for a Geologic Repository for the Disposal of Spent Nuclear Fuel and High-Level Radioactive Waste at Yucca Mountain, Nye County, Nevada in October of 2007, and that the public review and comment period closed on January 10, 2008.

Since the closure of the public comment period, I have been contacted by members of the public who are concerned that the draft SEIS does not consider the impacts of the planned repository on the people, natural resources or environment of California and other states. I have also learned that the Attorney General of California, Edmund Brown, Jr., sent a letter to DOE as part of the public comment process urging that DOE not approve the NEPA documents for Yucca Mountain until the transportation risks and impacts to California are addressed and included.

I share the concerns of Attorney General Brown, and would like to know why DOE failed to do the following in the draft SEIS:

- o Identify routes (both rail lines and highways) that will be used to transport nuclear waste from outside of Nevada to Yucca Mountain;
- o Analyze the impacts in California from the construction of the Mina or Caliente rail lines in Nevada;
- o Analyze the risks of likely routes and the effects of various transportation scenarios on communities outside Nevada;
- o Analyze the risk of terrorist attacks on likely transportation routes;

- o **Analyze the economic consequences of a successful attack or an accident involving waste being transported on likely routes;**
- o **Provide information on emergency response planning; and**
- o **Analyze the safety of using various highway routes, such as Highway 127, to transport waste.**


I am also concerned that the public was not given adequate opportunity to meaningfully participate in public meetings on these documents. I understand that DOE held one public meeting in California, in the community of Lone Pine in Inyo County. Given the large number of shipments of radioactive waste that are expected to travel throughout the state of California, greater public participation is both necessary and warranted.

In the omnibus funding bill that was reconciled and passed late in December, funding was restored for the Medical Applications and Measurement Science (MAMS) program of the Office of Science in the Department of **Energy**. That medical imaging program has been without funding since December 2005, leaving 85 peer-reviewed, competitive research **grants** in limbo without their subsequent year award letters. Of those 85 **medical imaging** research grants, three were active in Pennsylvania; one in Pittsburgh and two in Philadelphia

The language of the committee report **calls** for support of competitive, peer-reviewed research grants. I would be grateful if you would consider awarding the delayed subsequent year budgets for **all** of the 85 **grants** that are in a position to **resume work** immediately. In the meantime, solicitation and review of competitive new and renewal proposals can proceed normally.

According to this approach, the new appropriation can be put to use quickly, and support valuable medical innovations that have already been recommended for **funding** after competitive peer review. It is possible that funding of new and renewal proposals, **after** solicitation and review, will not even occur until the **beginning** of the next fiscal year.

I anticipate that scientists already peer-reviewed and **funded** under the MAMS project will rush to make up for lost time if they receive their missing subsequent year award letters in the near future. **Thank** you for your consideration of my proposal for the rapid re-start of the MAMS projects. We are writing to request your assessment of the impact to our national credibility and diplomatic relationships resulting from Congress' failure to fund the President's budget request for the U.S. contribution to the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor (ITER) Project in the FY08 Omnibus appropriations bill. In anticipation of the Administration's request for supplemental appropriations funding for Fiscal Year 2008, it is our hope that the Administration will include funding for the ITER program.

The United States formally joined the ITER project in 2007 after many years of intensive negotiations. At a time when we need to arrive at innovative solutions to increase available sources for abundant, clean energy, it is a serious and embarrassing mistake for Congress to renege on our commitment to the ITER Project. ITER was built as a model of cooperation on large, international science projects – the United States should be a leader in encouraging such endeavors rather than undermining them. We strongly believe that investing in international cooperation in the basic energy sciences will pay important dividends to our economy and the environment.


We have heard reports that Congress' failure to live up to our commitment to the ITER Project is already causing trouble for us in other areas of international cooperation. It would be helpful to know if the State Department is aware of specific difficulties our apparent lack of good faith on the ITER Project has caused in the diplomatic realm, such as efforts to negotiate or implement other international agreements.

First, we believe it is imperative that the selection criteria include an evaluation of each proposed plan to maximize both graduate and undergraduate education as a specific part of the proposal. If the DOE is going to be the major recipient of American Competitiveness Initiative funds, then it should require its major science procurements to include an appropriate education plan as a specific selection criteria. The report of the National Academies of Science, *Rising Above the Gathering Storm*, called for the nation to make a serious commitment to the investment in the physical sciences and the education of the next generation of scientists and engineers. We believe that leveraging such investments to maximize both their scientific and education impacts is critical.

Second, we urge the Department to ensure that the selection process is completely transparent. In this regard, we request that the Department's source selection decision include a meticulous accounting of how each evaluation factor was decided and how the final decision was determined. We also request that the technical report of the Merit Review Panel, including the Merit Review Panel Member evaluations and other documents associated with the decision-making process be made available at the conclusion of the selection process.

Third, while everybody wants to complete this competition in a timely manner, we also believe that it would be prudent to provide all proponents at least 45 days from the issuance of the final FOA for submission of proposals.

We thank you for your assistance in this critical matter and look forward to your reply.



Now that the Department of Energy's Office of Science has released the final Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) for the construction and operation of a Facility for Rare Isotope Beams (FRIB), we write to strongly encourage the Department to adhere to its proposed timeline for completing the selection process. Given the FOA's limit on the project's overall cost, further delays will only escalate construction costs and erode the proposed user facility's scientific capability, which is why we urge you to make an award by the end of this year.


The Department's decision to advance the FRIB project is certainly a welcome one, and one that has the support of the scientific community. As recently as December of 2006, the Rare Isotope Science Advisory Committee (RISAC) of the National Academies concluded that there is scientific justification for the United States to construct a rare isotope research facility, and that such a facility would allow the U.S. to play a unique role in rare isotope research. The RISAC found that a rare isotope research facility would "provide an important contribution to the education and training of future U.S. scientists," and lead to advancements in "medical research, national security, energy production, materials science, and industrial processes."

In addition, investing in such a facility is consistent with the recommendations of the National Academies' *Rising Above the Gathering Storm* report. Finally, the Department's own Nuclear Science Advisory Committee continues to make the construction of a rare isotope research facility a priority in its long range plan.

Clearly there is a compelling scientific need for such a national user facility to serve the broader nuclear physics research community and maintain U. S. leadership in the field. That is why we support the Department's current schedule for completing the selection process, and urge the Department to make an award before the end of 2008.

Thank you for your consideration. We are committed and prepared to work with you to make the FRIB project a reality. Please do not hesitate to contact us if there is anything we can do to be of assistance.

The purpose of this letter is to request your assistance to facilitate and help ensure uninterrupted progress toward the construction phase of the 12GeV Upgrade at the Continuous Electron Beam Accelerator Facility at the Thomas Jefferson National Accelerator Facility in Newport News, Virginia. As the project continues to meet all milestones and performance targets, and is now ready to begin construction, I am writing to request that the Department initiate a reprogramming of some of the project's fiscal year 2008 funds, sufficient to initiate the construction phase before the end of the current fiscal year.

As you know, the House Energy & Water Appropriations Subcommittee adopted language at its June 27, 2008 markup of the fiscal year 2009 bill which urged efforts to accelerate construction of the 12GeV upgrade. The language included in the House report follows:

"The requested funding will support operations of the Thomas Jefferson National Accelerator Facility and the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider. The requested funding will continue construction of the Electron Beam Ion Source at Brookhaven National Laboratory. An additional \$7,000,000 above the budget request is provided to initiate and accelerate construction of the 12 GeV upgrade to the Continuous Electron Beam Accelerator Facility at the Thomas Jefferson National Accelerator Facility (project 06-SC-01). The Committee encourages the Department to complete PED for this upgrade and move expeditiously into the construction phase; any remaining PED funds should be applied to construction activities."

Based on this language and discussions with the Committee, the staff of Jefferson Lab and I believe that the Energy & Water Subcommittee would favorably respond to a reprogramming request from the Department. It is widely expected that most of the Fiscal Year 2009 appropriations bills will not be enacted before the end of the current Congress and the programs of the Department of Energy will be funded on a Continuing Resolution until March, 2009 or later. Therefore, without the reprogramming and an initiation of construction in Fiscal Year 2008, the project will be delayed for many months. Not only will this increase the costs of

As members of the Indiana congressional delegation, we applaud your development of Energy Frontier Research Centers (EFRC), which will accelerate the scientific breakthroughs needed to create advanced energy technologies for the 21st century. We are writing to express our support for three EFRC proposals developed by Purdue University. These exceptional proposals will explore the building blocks of nature and advance the fundamental understanding of how nature works.

- **Advanced Materials under Extreme Conditions for Nuclear Energy Applications.** *A collaboration of Purdue University and Argonne National Laboratory.* Researchers at Purdue are establishing a state-of-the-art Center for Materials under Extreme Environments whose vision is to couple advanced computer simulations with the benchmarking of physical models. These models will be used to illuminate the expected performance of new materials in the harsher environments of new reactors, allowing researchers to predict material performance, efficiently conduct a rational design of advanced materials and nuclear technologies of the next generation of reactors, and also play an integral role in informing efforts to harness nuclear fusion.
- **Center for the Catalytic Conversion of Biomass to Bioenergy (C3Bio).** *A collaboration of Purdue University, Argonne National Laboratory, and the National Renewable Energy Laboratory.* The direct catalytic conversion of plant materials (lignocellulosic biomass) to transportation fuels and other value-added, bio-based products will produce new and economically viable technologies that offer "game-changing" improvements in the efficiency and sustainability of biorefinery operations. The goal is to maximize the number of carbon atoms that are derived from biomass in the final products, without losing carbon atoms as carbon monoxide or carbon dioxide and minimizing the energy inputs. Immediate targets are molecules that can be utilized as biofuels and other chemicals currently derived from oil.
- **Selectively Coupled Nanoscale Electron/Photon/Phonon Processes for Energy Conversion.** *A collaboration of Purdue University, University of California - Santa Cruz,*

Oak Ridge National Laboratory, National Renewable Energy Laboratory, and Brookhaven National Laboratory. Utilizing the unique facilities at Purdue's Birck Nanotechnology Center, the proposed program will involve the fundamental studies of electrons, photons and phonons interacting with each other at the nanoscale. The proposed work will provide a framework within which to understand the fundamental limits of a number of energy-relevant components and to enable significant breakthroughs in these technologies.

We share your goal of understanding the fundamental building blocks of nature necessary to meet the global need for abundant, clean, and economical energy. Purdue University is conducting cutting-edge research in these energy-related fields, and is well positioned to advance the goals of the Department of Energy.

It is our hope that you will give every due consideration to Purdue University's EFRC proposals.
