## Lusk Rural Communications Building Removal Niobrara County, Wyoming

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to remove a fiberglass manufactured building at its Lusk Rural Substation, near the town of Lusk, Wyoming. The building dimensions are approximately 12 feet by 16 feet by 8 feet. The building has become worn and dilapidated and is no longer used. The building was tested by Western personnel and a contract lab for asbestos-containing materials and lead-based paint. The building location is inside the fenced perimeter of the substation and has a well-used existing access road and no road maintenance or construction is necessary for its removal. The building may be removed by contractor supplied services, relocated to a staging yard, and later resold or otherwise disposed of according to Western's real property regulations.

# **B.** <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

# **B1,22 Relocation of Buildings.**

Relocation of buildings (including, but not limited to, trailers and prefabricated buildings) to an already developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible).

## **B1.23** Demolition and Disposal of Buildings.

Demolition and subsequent disposal of buildings, equipment, and support structures (including, but not limited to, smoke stacks and parking lot surfaces), provided that there would be no potential for release of substances at a level, or in a form, that could pose a threat to public health or the environment.

#### **B1.24** Property Transfers.

Transfer, lease, disposition, or acquisition of interests in personal property (including, but not limited to, equipment and materials), or real property (including, but not limited to, permanent structures and land), provided that under reasonably foreseeable uses (1) There would be no potential for release of substances at a level, or in a form, that could pose a threat to public health or the environment and (2) The covered actions would not have the potential to cause a significant change in impacts from before the transfer, lease, disposition, or acquisition of interests.

- C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
  - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

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- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a Federally-recognized Indian Tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

#### D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work for this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

The Western Office removing the building shall obtain the appropriate Federal, State, tribal or local licenses or certifications prior to disturbing any regulated asbestos-containing material. If a building or portion of a building will be demolished or renovated, you may obtain an Asbestos Notice and Permit for Demolition and Renovation from the Wyoming State Department of Environmental Quality, Division of Air Quality (or equivalent). The building shall be inspected by a Wyoming State-Certified Asbestos Building Inspector. The inspector shall certify the presence and condition of asbestos, or non-presence of asbestos, onsite as directed on the State Demolition and Renovation Notice/Permit. The inspections and notifications shall be submitted whether asbestos is present or not. All asbestos-related activities would be conducted in accordance with applicable U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA), State of Wyoming, and Occupational Safety and Health Administration regulations; by USEPA and State of Wyoming accredited personnel. The asbestos-containing material removal will be conducted by State of Wyoming certified removal contractors and technicians. The removal contractor and their employees will wear appropriate protective equipment.

This Categorical Exclusion is valid for the 2014 calendar year after the signature date. If construction has not commenced within that time, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review prior to construction.

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If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western's Regional Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

**E.** <u>Determination</u>: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
