Project Title: Amendment for Inventory and Verification and Validation (V&V) Activities at Defense-Related Uranium Mines

(DRUM) Program Mines in South Dakota

Location: DRUM in South Dakota

Proposed Action or Project Description:

LM is proposing to amend the National Environmental Policy Act Categorical Exclusion Evaluation (CXE) form LM 05-19 to include formal agreements such as memoranda of understanding (MOUs) between DOE and other agencies or access agreements between DOE and private landowners; the original CXE form LM 05-19 did not include access agreements or MOUs. These agreements would be established before DRUM Program mines were visited. The MOUs may contain special use restrictions that would be followed when accessing mines. The original project description is below:

LM is proposing to conduct inventory, mapping, and soil and surface water sampling at abandoned uranium mines in the state of South Dakota in accordance with the DRUM Program's approved V&V Work Plan. Section 3151 of the National Defense Authorization Act for fiscal year 2013 mandates actions to verify and validate abandoned uranium mines associated with the atomic energy defense activities of the United States. Activities include inventory and V&V visits. Inventory may be performed by state or federal agencies funded by LM.

Inventory and V&V visits: Full-sized vehicles, all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), or utility task vehicles (UTVs) would be used to travel to and from mines on existing agency-approved roads. The mines and nearby areas would be explored on foot and without entering adits or other hazardous areas associated with mine-related features. Mine features and conditions would be described and recorded with GPS. Identifying tags at mine features would be installed if necessary.

V&V-only visits: Gamma radiation measurements would be recorded using backpack-mounted instruments along transects within the mine disturbed area, in surrounding areas, at sediment shed areas, and at background locations. At large mines, ATVs or UTVs would be utilized to collect gamma radiation measurements on waste rock piles or disturbed areas. Vehicle use normally entails one vehicle pass along 100-foot transects throughout previously disturbed areas. Samples would be collected by hand from the upper 6 inches of soil on mine waste rock piles and background locations. Each composite sample would be less than 1 liter, and the number of samples would depend on the individual mine.

Surface water samples would be collected and preserved when surface water is present. Soil and water samples would be shipped to a certified laboratory for analysis and disposal. Sampling equipment would be decontaminated in the field, and small quantities of radioactively contaminated solid waste would be managed if present. Samples of plant material would be collected for the DRUM herbarium, excluding listed species. Unmanned aircraft would be used to supplement investigations at some mines. No aviation activities would begin until required flight safety plans are approved by a certified DOE aviation manager and permission is received from LM to proceed with aviation activities. Any follow-up aviation activities would require new flight safety plans approved by a certified DOE aviation manager.

Proposed activities are planned to occur between September 2019 and March 2027. Activities would normally take place between March 1 and December 15, but activities are possible year-round at some locations. Work would be performed by the Legacy Management Support contractor, and some inventory work would be performed by state or federal agencies with funding from LM.

Based on my review of the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (as authorized by the LM Director per DOE Policy 451.1), I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified classes of action, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is hereby categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
