Proposed by: Bonneville Power Administration (BPA)

<u>Description of the Proposed Action</u>: Upgrade and improve access roads from Structures 23/3 through 24/6 on the Libby-Troy section of the Libby-Bonners Ferry No. 1 115-kilovolt (kV) transmission line.

Background

This project entails improving the several existing access roads along the Libby-Troy section of the Libby-Bonners Ferry No. 1 115-kV transmission line. Action locations for project access and road repair activities will include:

- Reconstruct and repair erosion damage to access roads along AXF-21-AR-4.
- Add access road dips and bumps to manage road surface runoff velocities.
- Upgrade rip-rap at the outlet of the Burrell Creek culvert to replace smaller rip-rap that was washed away.

The proposed improvements, reconstruction, and design activities will conform to the design and mitigation requirements as described in the 2009 Rebuild of the Libby-Troy Transmission Line Project Final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) (DOE/EIS-0379) and Record of Decision (ROD), July 25, 2008.

The BPA right-of-way was surveyed for cultural resources for the rebuild project in 2009 and cultural resources were found during surveys in the area. No new excavations below the existing fills are anticipated and this work does not represent a significant change in the project design or location which may trigger environmental concerns.

U.S. Forest Service terms used in Grizzly Bear Management areas define a "road" as "all created or evolved routes longer than 500 feet that are reasonably and prudently drivable with a conventional passenger car or pickup". For the duration of the proposed activities, the Kootenai National Forest is managing AXF-21-AR-4 (Sheep Range Road) as an "open road" which has no

restriction on motorized use. Species timings restrictions will be adhered to for grizzly bear, big horn sheep, bald eagle, and threatened and endangered fish.

Findings: BPA has determined that the proposed action complies with Section 1021.410 and Appendix B of Subpart D of the Department of Energy's (DOE) National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Regulations (57 FR 15144, Apr. 24, 1992, as amended at 61 FR 36221-36243, July 9, 1996; 61 FR 64608, Dec. 6, 1996, 76 FR 63764, Nov. 14, 2011). The proposed action does not present any extraordinary circumstances that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal. The proposal is not connected [40 C.F.R. 1508.25(a) (1)] to other actions with potentially significant impacts, has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts [40 C.F.R. 1508.25(a) (2)], and is not precluded by 40 C.F.R. 1506.1 or 10 C.F.R. 1021.211. Moreover, the proposed action would not (i) threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, (ii) require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities, (iii) disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that pre-exist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases, (iv) have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources, or (v) involve genetically engineered organisms, synthetic biology, governmentally designated noxious weeds, or invasive species, unless the proposed activity would be contained or confined in a manner designed and operated to prevent unauthorized release into the environment and conducted in accordance with applicable requirements.

The proposed project will not affect any listed threatened or endangered species or designated critical habitat under the Endangered Species Act, or historic properties under the National Historic Preservation Act.

This proposed action meets the requirements for the Categorical Exclusion referenced above. We therefore determine that the proposed action may be categorically excluded from further NEPA review and documentation.
