On behalf of our federation of state environmental organizations; I write to express support for the Plains & Eastern Clean Line and to urge the Department of Energy and the Southwestern Power Administration to participate in the proposed project.

We know you are aware of the urgent need to shift to clean, renewable energy. We need to curb carbon pollution and we need to do it fast.

The EPA's Clean Power Plan would cut carbon pollution from dirty power plants by 30 percent by the end of the next decade. We know it's achievable, as long as we act to capture the power of the wind and the sun and reduce the amount of energy that we waste. The Plains & Eastern Clean Line can play a critical role in deploying renewable energy.
