
## Purpose




## Oneida Land History

The Oneidas traveled to Wisconsin in 1822. During that time, the Oneidas fracture and this creates 3 separate Oneida Communities.




## CHANGES IN ONEIDA TERRITORY



- Menominee/Oneida Territory - 1822  
Approximately 8 million acres
- Oneida Territory - 1831  
Approximately 500 thousand acres
- Oneida Territory - 1838  
Approximately 65 thousand acres

The Original Reservation Encompassed 65,730 acres

## Location

Oneida Reservation is about 65,400 acres (approximately 100 square miles)

Tribe currently owns 36% of the land base

~17,000 members, 7,100 tribal members live on or near the Reservation (2012)

Multi-jurisdictional issues- Counties, Cities, Villages, and Towns within the Reservation



### ONEIDA TRIBAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Four major highways, several county roads, 6 retail stores and gas stations, 2 hotels, Main Casino and Bingo Hall, Mid size casino, 8 tribal communities.



### ONEIDA TRIBAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Oneida Police Department, Department of Public Works, Tribal Elementary School, Tribal High School, Two Volunteer Fire Departments, Tribal Health Center, Tribal Elder Complex.
